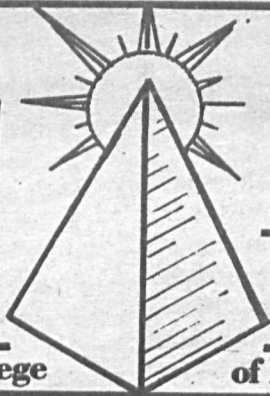

## FINANCIAL AID TURNS BILINGUAL

NEW FINANCIAL AID  
FORMS IN SPANISH

City College students with Spanish backgrounds can now fill out financial aid applications in their native language, says Dr. Dolores Cross, President of the New York State Higher Education Services.

"The applications will be printed in Spanish on an annual basis. The Spanish language translation of the student payment application will also contain the revised TAP award schedules for undergraduate and graduate students."

Funding for this change was officially approved by Governor Mario Cuomo.

Shirley Rodriguez, an executive in the Governor's Office for Hispanic Affairs, said that she applauded HESC's decision to print the TAP application in Spanish, and that this should en-

courage more Hispanic students to apply for the kinds of financial assistance they sorely need.

"This is the first time the State elaborates forms in the Spanish language to encourage ESL and foreign students to apply for financial aid," said Mr. Oppenheim, Assistant Director for the City College Financial Aid Office.

Twenty-two thousand Spanish forms of financial aid are being handed out in high schools, public libraries and colleges.

Last year the New York State Higher Education gave \$1.5 billion dollars in aid to New York students, either in forms of grants, scholarships or educational loans.

City College students from Spanish backgrounds should take advantage of this new opportunity.

Freshman, international, and bilingual students are all qualified and welcomed to fill out their financial aid applications in Spanish.

## "NO WHERE FAST" HELPS CENTER

The Vocational Guidance and Workshop Center is all about faith and love. It started with a dream 36 years ago by the late George Hicks and his wife Kate, a certified guidance counselor.

Housed at 467 West 140th Street, the Center provides remedial instruction in math, science, reading and IBM computer training to Black and Hispanic students. In previous years, the Center had a GED program for adults to study for their H.S. equivalency.

Schools and community groups started referring children to the Center. Through its work with the Board of Education the Center became eligible for Title I grants. Reagan's cutbacks have affected supplies, materials, salaries and maintenance.

Larry Woods who wrote, directed and starred in the play, "No Where Fast", read of their plight in an article in the Amsterdam News. He contacted Mrs. Hicks and offered to help the Center raise funds by using the play.

"No Where Fast" was presented on November 1st at the Aronow Theatre as a benefit performance for the Vocational Guidance and Workshop Center.

It's a gospel comedy based on Andraye Williams' trek on the road to salvation and the obstacles in his path. They were Ego, Fear, Greed and Half-Steppin'. However, through Faith and Love, he "let go and let God" into his heart.

The characters were very powerful and moving in their portrayal of Andraye's emotions. Faith — Tonila Ware - in her elegant white dress, tried to make him believe. Ego — Preston Vismale - was devilish and "had Andraye looking for all the answers in all the wrong places." Gordon Gatherer was hand-in-glove as Half-Steppin'. A spectacular rendition of "We Shall Overcome" was given by Philip Mann whose previous musical experience includes The Wiz and Your Arms Too Short To Box With God. Love — Karen Ann Jones used her splendid vocal abilities to win over the emotions.

The Spiritual Emotions and the band members kept everything flow-

ing beautifully. The lyrics were by Eustace Johnson.

"No Where Fast" is described by Mr. Woods as part fiction and part autobiographical. Having worked in theatre for the past 12 years, he wanted to do a family play. Something that presented a positive image. This play is also reflective of his Baptist church upbringing through its rousing gospel songs and his preaching. Working through this medium Mr. Woods feels he has made an impact on others and helped to turn some people around.

At the end of the show, Mr. Bennie Giles, a board member for the Center, presented Mrs. Hicks with a letter from Mayor Ed Koch. In part, "as the director of the Vocational Guidance and Workshop Center, Mrs. Hicks has inspired countless minority youths to reach for the highest educational goals for over 36 years." Mayor Koch went on to commend Mr. Woods for his willingness to help the Center.

Mr. Giles would like to contact CCNY about a possible internship with the college for the Center. This

type of student support will give the CCNY students an opportunity to teach, learn and be role models. By working with youngsters, CCNY can help to sustain and support an existing organization in the community.

Mr. William Anthony Rogers, is the Director of the Cooperative Education and Internship Program, of CCNY. He said, "It's possible and I would be glad to try to set up a program." Mr. Rogers stated there's a few courses in education as well as other areas that can be used for credit. He's willing to be the liaison between the college and the center.

"No Where Fast" will be at the Aronow theatre on Nov. 23rd. A portion of the proceeds from future performances will be donated to the Center.

## STUDY IN PUERTO-RICO AND SANTO DOMINGO

City College has a new International Program for its students, according to Dr. Elizabeth Hansen, assistant to the President for International Education and Special Programs.

Among the many agreements undertaken by the City College of New York and other foreign universities, we have the ones with the University of Puerto Rico (Rio Piedras) and the University of the Dominican Republic (Universidad Autonoma). According to the office of University relations here in New York, Rio Piedras University is particularly well known for its strong departments of Spanish, International Studies, and the School of Tropical Medicine.

This program will allow City College students to go to Puerto Rico or Santo Domingo and see the many human and cultural problems there. The Autonomous University of Santo Domingo has expressed special interest to exchange knowledge in areas such as science, computers, public health, and public transportation.

City University Chancellor, Mr. Joseph S. Murphy, affirmed that the exchange program will bring new opportunities for research in the areas of History and mass migrations.

City College professor, Iris Lopez, who teaches the course "Puerto Rican Children In Their Urban Setting" is the director of the Caribbean Ex-

change Program. Professor Lopez stated regarding this program that... "There are many benefits to participate in an "International Exchange Program."

"In my view, the most enriching experience is having the opportunity to live and learn in another country," she further stated. She added that all City College students are Italians, Chinese, or belong to any other culture.

International studies done in foreign countries are part of a major curriculum located in the Social Science division that is opened to all City College students like any other academic major.

By taking part in the International Exchange Program, students have the chance to participate in an off-campus internship, be involved in an overseas studies year, and be part of an advisory committee to the director on overall objectives.

Students will be selected according to their academic achievements here at City College.

This program is one of the many academic programs offered by CUNY which has nine senior colleges, seven community colleges, one technical college, a graduate school, a law school, and a medical school.

More than 180,000 students are enrolled in CUNY programs.

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## WRITING FELLOWSHIP

If someone had asked me six months ago, I wouldn't have hesitated to believe my mediocre life savings that City College students who are well-acquainted with current employment trends, know that the day has long gone when a college degree represented a sure-fire path to obtaining a job. I would have been positive that those same students are aware that experience in a chosen field of study, far from providing only additional leverage when applying for employment, has become a bona fide prerequisite for many jobs.

But recently, the head of City College Co-Op Education Department, Mr. Tony Rogers, revealed the difficulty he has had in getting students to take advantage of a Writing Fellowship that his office and *The Village Voice* have put together for minority students at CCNY. I can only assume that students here are either unaware that the program exists, or worse, that they are discounting the value of this particular opportunity in co-op education.

As a CCNY journalism student who went after the Fellowship with all haste when I heard about it; I was fortunate enough to be chosen as the 1986 recipient, and found it to be an invaluable experience, I would like to clear up any uncertainties about the merits of the Fellowship program.

For the past three years, *The Voice* has extended its services as an institutional mentor to minority students at CCNY who wish, beyond anything else, to write. Students from any ma-

yor may apply, and must submit three writing samples — essays, short stories, term papers, poems and three recommendations to be considered.

Once chosen, you enter into a six-month internship that provides, among others, the opportunity to strengthen or cultivate journalistic skills. You get to write about issues that interest you; issues that may not get the coverage they deserve in other newspapers. *The Voice* facilitates this quite well because it is a newspaper that chooses to take a progressive stand on any major issue of the day.

For the duration of the internship, you get to work alongside respected journalists, such as Nat Hentoff, an award winning writer and noted First Amendment expert.

You are also granted the opportunity to be a part of editorial meetings; to gain insight into the politics and pressures involved in being part of a newspaper.

For all this, you are paid a stipend of \$100 a week — with an additional fee for every story published by *The Voice*. You operate from your own desk, with your own phone, and you earn twelve credits for the semester you put in at the newspaper, plus any additional credits obtained by taking classes on campus. And if this is not enough, consider that the only interns who are paid at *The Voice* are those who intern through the City College/*Village Voice* Writing Fellowship Program.

It is my understanding that unless the response from CCNY improves, the program will have to undergo a forced expansion to other schools, or be scrapped all together.

So what so you say, City College students? Or, perhaps more to the point: What will you do?

 O'Brien passing the way he has, the Jets have become an explosive team which can score from anywhere on the field.

# INTERNATIONAL TRADE COMES TO HARLEM

Within four years Harlem will receive an economic face lift. An International Trade Center built on 125th Street and Lenox Avenue, directly east of the Adam Clayton Powell Jr. State Office Building.

Balzi Harvey, the Executive Director of the Harlem Third World Trade Institute, reveals that he is on a "mission to see the execution of this project."

Representative Charles B. Rangel made the proposal for the project along with other legislators in 1978. They are the architects and the creative forces behind the endeavor.

Harvey came from upstate in 1982 to execute the elaborate strategy of building the center.

Funding for the Trade Institute comes from an unnamed source in Geneva, Switzerland, which contributed 53 million dollars. The total projected cost reaches up to 153 million dollars, and Congressman Rangel has introduced a bill in the House of Representatives for 100 million dollars in funding to help meet the cost of the project.

"This would be a Harlem Renaissance." Harvey contends, "Employment opportunities for many brothers and sisters who need jobs here in New York."

Small entrepreneurs within the Harlem community will have a chance to be organized under one roof. They will engage in trading between Third World nations and other businesses in the U.S.

The trade complex will provide a multi-use, round the clock activity center for international trade. It will strengthen trade ties, and help development in Third World countries.

It will also serve as a catalyst for social and economic revitalization of the community.

Foreign language instructions will also be provided, and participants in

the center will learn international trade, trade law and international politics.

The center and its facilities are expected to encourage technological development in health and agriculture through trade.

## SOCCER TEAM REWRITES CCNY RECORD BOOK

The City College Soccer Team has completed the 1986 season with an unprecedented fifth straight City University of New York Championship and a record breaking 14-1-2 season.

The boosters kicked off the season with a five game winning streak but their chances for an unbeaten season was sunk by the Cadets of the United States Merchant Marine Academy (USMMA). The Mariners handed City its only loss September 24, with a 4-3 overtime win at Kings Point. But City came right back and started an eleven game unbeaten streak which included crucial victories over Stonybrook, Concordia, and N.Y.U. to close out the season.

The boosters 14-1-2 record represents the most wins ever in a single season in the history of CCNY soccer. It surpasses the previous mark of 12-3-1 set in 1983.

Since taking over direction of the team in 1979, Coach Gus Naclerio has led the Beavers to six CUNY titles and one Metropolitan Conference Championship. In eight years he has equalled the City College record of 83 career wins held by his own former coach, Harry Karlin, who guided the team from 1954-64.

CCNY Athletic Director Paul Bobb, discussing the team's success, said: "Gus is extremely knowledgeable and an outstanding teacher. He's also very concerned with the overall well being of his athletes and possesses very strong leadership qualities."

The boosters averaged 3.5 goals per game. The potent attack was paced by center-forward Hector Escobar's 21 goals, just one short of the CCNY single season record held by former CUNY MVP Assadullah Nawabi. Escobar's career total of 41 ties the college record.

"A center-forward must never give up," Naclerio explained, referring to the man he's chosen as a 1987 co-

captain. "Escobar is aggressive, he's relentless, and that's why he scores so consistently."

Staten Island transfer Peter Aro added 11 in his first season as a Beaver, and co-captain Eddy St. Vil netted six.

Starting goalies Nicholas Papavassillious and Harry Jean-Michel garnered three shutouts while limiting opponents to only a goal per game. The Lavender & Black defense was anchored for the fourth and final year by Senior co-captain Fenelon Bouzi.

"Many times when the team was in trouble I said thank goodness for Fenelon," recalled Naclerio. "Everything in sports is timing, and he knows exactly what to do, and when to do it. He's an excellent player and an outstanding person who really cares about the team."

Freshmen don't always make the team, let alone the starting lineup, but this year's squad was blessed with a bumper crop of talented newcomers. Ten first year players made the team, with Staten Island transfer Peter ARO bringing the total to 11.

Garfield Daley, Paul Sanon, and Aro all earned full time starting positions. Three other newcomers were part-time starters. One, Justo Chica, is expected to be a future satr for the Beavers, provided he has the time. Chica had to work and started in only three games, but still scored four times, including a three goal outburst versus the USMMA.

As many as eighteen players could be back in 1987 and Naclerio doesn't expect to lose many to academic eligibility.

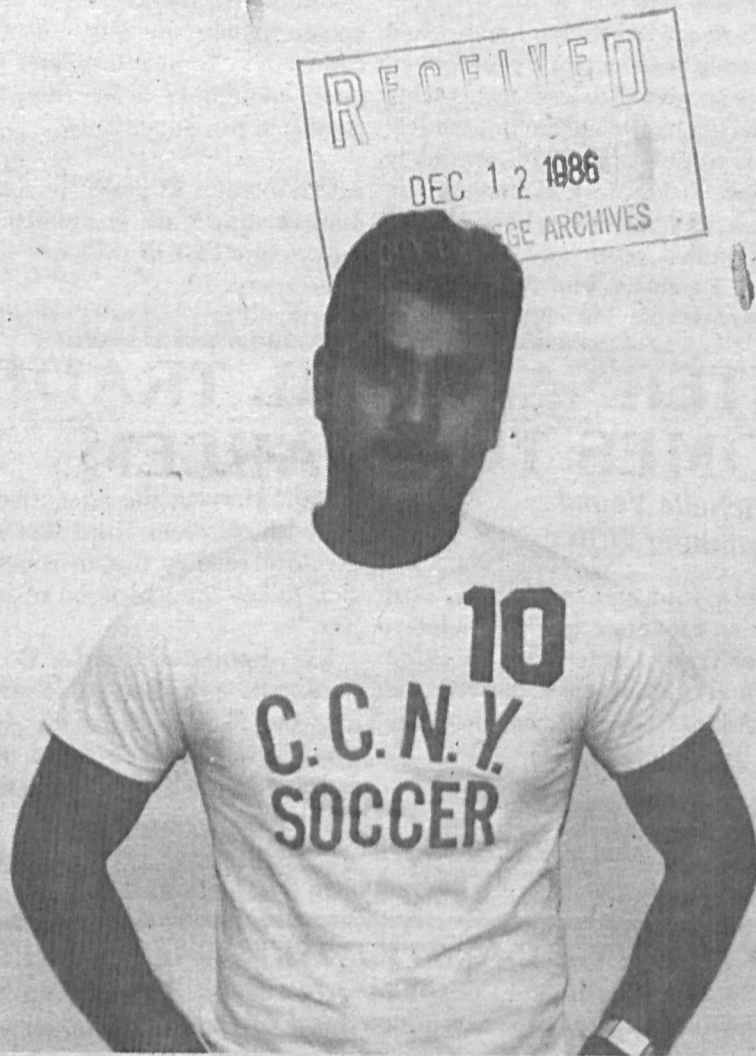
"Education comes first," explained Naclerio. "I'm always very careful to make sure that the players are doing well academically before I put them on the team. I encourage them to study during the season and after the season is over to make sure they make progress toward their degree."

### JETS ON A ROLL

Are the New York Jets for real? After ten weeks in the NFL the Jets are 9-1 and sending a powerful message throughout the American Football Conference (AFC) that they are a very legitimate contender.

Why have the Jets been so successful in 86? Kenny O'Brien quarterback of the Jets has thrown for 2,512 yards with 20 touchdowns and is the

#1 ranked QB in the AFC. He is simply burning the league up. The emergence of wide receivers Al Toon and Wesley Walker has given opposing defensive backs more problems than the IRS. Toon leads the NFL in receptions with 63 adding 8 touchdowns to go with it. Walker does not have the amount of receptions Toon has, but he still has the speed and 9 touchdowns to show it. The Toon-Walker combination together with O'Brien tossing the football have been money in the bank for the Jets so far this year.

Joe Walton, the coach of the Jets, said in recent article, "This team?" "They play hard, it doesn't seem as if anything bothers them. They've got a good temperament, good leadership. And they've overcome a lot." Overcome a lot is right since early in the year at 4-1 the Jets had a major injury list with center Joe Fields on injured reserve with a sprained knee; halfback Freeman McNeil had a dislocated elbow; quarterback Kenny O'Brien had to miss two games because of a sprained knee and Defensive End Mark Gastinneau who has been playing all season long with groin and abdominal muscle pulls, which showed his pass rush to the tune of two sacks.

Despite all these injuries, the Jets prevailed against the 1985 AFC Champion Patriots 31-24 at New England and the previously unbeaten Denver Broncos 22-10 on Monday Night Football to push their record to 6-1. This had to be a boost to the team because they won those two games without Kenny O'Brien and star running back Freeman McNeil. When RB Freeman McNeil went down Johnny Hector the reserve back came in and basically took over. Hector is currently fourth in the AFC in rushing with 532 yards on 136 carries and 7 touchdowns.

On Sunday, November 9th against the Atlanta Falcons, O'Brien completed 17 straight passes during one stretch, and this mark tied him with Bert Jones, former Baltimore Colt QB, for fifth place on the all-time list for consecutive completions. Wesley Walker WR in a recent article had this to say, "I've been here 10 years, and we have never had a quarterback of Kenny's calibre throwing the football the way he has." Over their last five games, they have outscored the opposition 112-13, in the first half, 85-0 in the second quarter alone. Suddenly, with Toon and Walker running circles around every defense and
