Staten Island Cops 3rd Straight CUNY Title

The 18th annual City University of New York (CUNY) basketball tournament, which was sponsored by Con Edison, was held at the Nat Holman Gymnasium on February 21, 23, 25 and 28. For the third consecutive year, The College of Staten Island walked away with the championship. They defeated John Jay in the finals by a score of 74-56. Our own CCNY Beavers were eliminated, in the quarterfinal round, by John Jay 87-70. This followed City's victory over Medgar Evers in the qualifying round February 21.

The tournament, which returned here after a 2 year absence, got off to a very exciting start. Led by Michael "Jelly" Richardson's career high 42 points, City defeated Medgar Evers 106-95 in the qualifying round. The 106 points scored by the Beavers represented a new tournament record, as did the combined total of 201 points by both teams. This was to be City's last hurrah because John Jay, led by CUNY Conference most valuable player James "Pookie" Wilson, soundly defeated the Beavers 87-70 in the quarterfinal round.

In other quarterfinal action, Baruch, on the strength of Roger Miller's 38 points

and a 15 foot jumper by Aubrey Smith with one second remaining in overtime, defeated Queens College 93-91; Lehman defeated York 54-43, and Staten Island (with eventual tournament MVP Ron Chase scoring their final 11 points (41 points in all)) defeated Hunter 88-87.

The matchups for the semi-finals saw John Jay go against Baruch and Staten Island matched up with Lehman. With Wilson leading the way, the Bloodhounds of John Jay managed to offset a 29 point performance by Miller and defeat Baruch 77-68. Wilson poured in 30 points for John Jay. In the other game, Staten Island, with Greg Whitehead scoring 26 points and Ron Chase adding 22, was able to hold off Lehman 74-62. This set the stage for the championship showdown between the 2 number one seeds of the tournament, Staten Island and John Jay.

In the beginning it appeared that Pookie Wilson was going to personally run Staten Island out of the gym. He led John Jay to an early 21-8 lead by doing almost everything humanly possible. Staten Island went to a man-to-man defense to start the game, but changed into a 2-1-2 zone when they realized that guard Greg Whitehead could not hold Wilson by himself. This was the move

that gave Staten Island the championship. Wilson could no longer drive to the basket, nor could he hit his jump shots. His 3-17 shooting in the second half summed up John Jay's frustration. On the other hand Ron Chase, who is only a freshman, played as well as anyone could have possibly played during the tournament and he definitely deserved his MVP Award.

For those of you who were not fortun-

ate enough to attend the games, you missed some very exciting and competitive basketball. There were also very good turnouts each night and the fan support was first rate. Best of all, we saw CUNY competition at its finest right here at City College. Congratulations to Chase, Coach Evan Pickman, and to the rest of the Staten Island Dolphins basketball team on another outstanding year.

Student Services Corporation Needs Executive Director

As of February 8, 1983, the student services corporation failed to approve the Finley Student Center proposed budget for the academic year 1982-83. You as a student may wonder, "What does this have to do with me?" The facts are Finley Student Center receives \$13 out of the student activity fee from the full-time undergraduate, evening and non-degree students; \$7 from the part-time undergraduate, evening and non-degree students; and \$2 from graduate students. The fall 1982 enrollment of undergraduate f/t and p/t students was 7,956 and 1,061 respectively. These figures reflect the day student contribution to the Finley Student Center at approximately \$110,855. The figure for the total proposed budget is \$241,396, which was supposedly collected from the fall 1982 session. What does the SSC (Student Services Corporation) do with this money? The answer is in the SSC constitutional by-laws, article I sec. 2: "The Corporation shall provide service to the educational, social and recreational needs of the students of the City College of New York without regard to membership in or affiliation with any social, fraternal or honorary society or organization and shall advance the educational programs of City College by encouraging, generating and promoting good fellowship and the ideals of the democratic way of life." Also article IV sec. 1 of the by-laws states: "One of the items on the agenda for the March meeting must be the budget for the next fiscal year, with adoption at the subsequent June meeting."

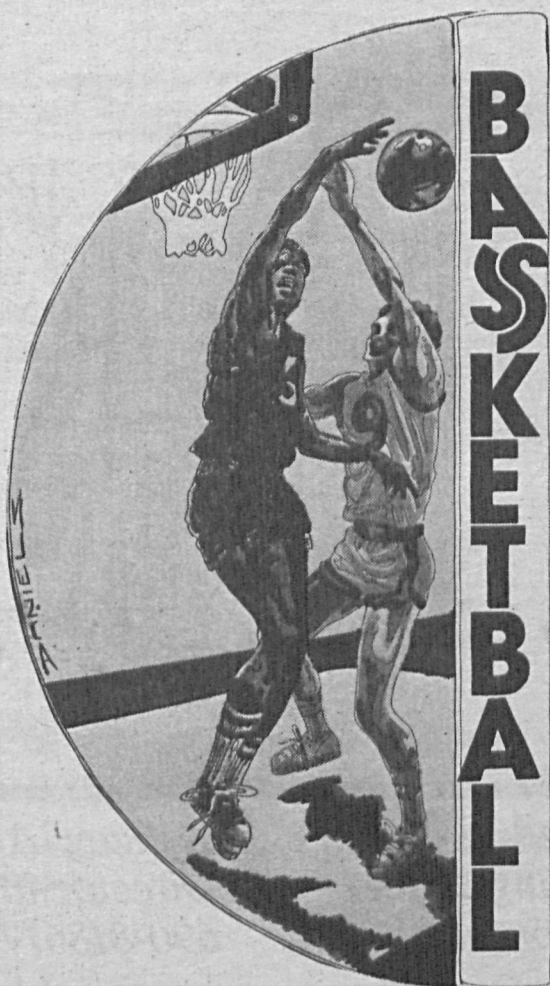
It is now March 1983 and the budget for the 1982-83 fiscal year has not been adopted. One reason for the budget not being adopted was given by the President of the Day Student Government Mr. Ernest A. Hannah, who claims there is no student input into the budget. Another reason expressed during the meeting was that the budget was not formulated by the budget committee of the SSC, as stated in the SCC by-laws, article VI sec. 3: "There shall be a four member budget committee, three of whom will be students, and one of whom will be a faculty member. The budget committee

shall be appointed by the President of the Corporation with approval of the Board. The committee will work with the Executive Director in the preparation of the annual budget request for the Campus Center to be submitted to the Board of Directors."

Mr. Malcolm Robinson, past faculty chairperson of the committee said that students don't show up at budget meetings. One student member of the budget committee, Student Ombudsman William A. Allen said, "I was never invited to or received any notice of any budget committee meetings." It seems there is a lack of constitutional procedure, organization and management in the SSC, which brings up another concern, the absence of an official Executive Director. Ed Evans, Director of Co-Curricular Life, is the secretary of the SSC and also formulated the budget. He said that officially he is not the SSC Executive Director, but does perform some of the duties of the position. The duties of the Executive Director are: To service as secretary and executive officer; he shall be appointed by the president of the College; and is responsible for planning, implementing and administering all phases of the Corporation's operations and programs and must prepare financial statements.

Mr. Hannah said in an interview, "student activity fees have been abused by past administrators, and since there is no one to handle the affairs of the Corporation, it will be possible for further abuse and possible juggling of the books." Mr. Hannah also raised concern as to whether the Executive Director should be a paid employee of the College or paid through the Corporation.

The position of Executive Director serves an important function to the SSC and would pose a formidable challenge for any one brave enough to accept it. Mr. Evans says that his position as Director of Co-Curricular Life is "comparable" to that of Executive Director. Maybe he would like the position on a full time basis, but there would probably be some who'd object. Or perhaps the SSC should be dismantled because of all of the by-law infractions that exist.

Dear Editor:

As a member of the CLAS Ad-Hoc Committee on Writing, and as the Chairman of the English Department, I want to respond to Luis Cordero's December 14 "Viewpoint" on the proposed writing plan.

Mr. Cordero states that the proposal fails to explain the origin of the writing problem. However, a glance at the part of the proposal called "The Need for a Writing Plan" shows that the committee locates the chief source of the problem in what it calls "the media culture," the aural and visual world of radio, television, telephones, and computer games that surrounds all of us.

Mr. Cordero suggests that the proposal does not "place any responsibility on the city's educational system (the real culprit)," and he is right, because that kind of scapegoating does not produce change. On the other hand, the English Department has held an annual conference with high school English Department has held an annual conference with high school English department chairpersons for more than ten years. Called "Our Mutual Estate," its purpose is to deal with the common issues that confront high school and college English teachers.

Finally, Mr. Cordero asks why there hasn't been a recommendation for "a comprehensive analysis of the remedial writing program." The answer is that English Department in fact has requested just such an analysis: and in-depth evaluation of the program to be conducted by a team of outside experts. The President and Provost have supported the department's recommendation, and it is my hope that it will be implemented

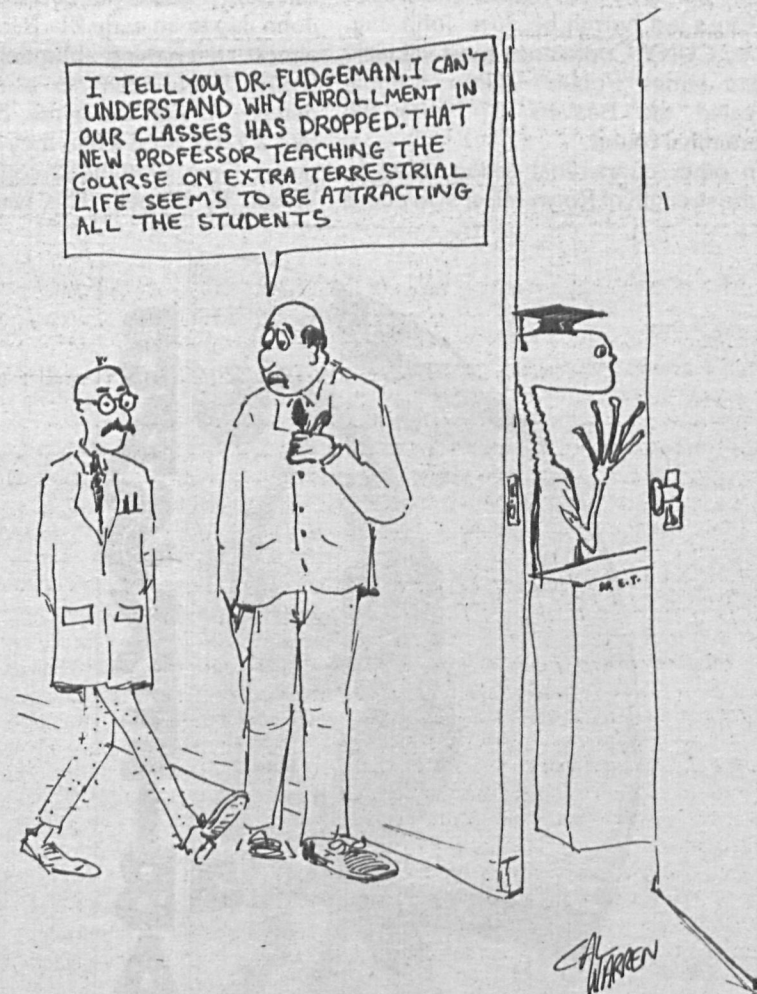

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The Student Services Corporation (SSC) has moved forward with a resolution to grant all Student Governments' Executive members stipends. This resolution has not had sufficient public attention. Most student leaders had not been informed about the issue until after the meeting. The traditional method of deciding such an issue has been through the process of referring to the electorate (public) for approval of any proposed new earmarking of student activity fees. Since the funds are supposed to come from the Student Services Corporation's budget, some folks have argued that a referendum may not be necessary. . . or is it?

The Student Services Corporation is the body largely responsible for administering student activity fees. Its powers are derived from The Board of Higher Education by-laws, section 15.9. The present earmarking of Student Activity fees to the Day Student Government is four dollars per student. Will the Student Services Corporation increase the allocation or will the student clubs suffer a decrease in operational funds. Eight students serve on the SSC: The Presidents of the three Student Governments, four students elected by the Day Student Government, one student elected by the Evening Student Government, three members of the Administration and four members of the Faculty.

This resolution as proposed, grants the Presidents of the Student Governments stipends of \$1500.00 per semester, and the pay scale of other Executive members may be in the range of \$1000.00 to \$500.00, respec-

tively. While other Colleges may be giving stipends or academic credit to their student leaders, are we at CCNY seriously ready for such a move without prior consideration of the entire student body?

This reporter asks the question of how will this resolution be implemented and will there be sufficient accountability? Sanford Bobb, a student said, "Why not?"

As Leo Bumpus noted, "it's an idea that has always come up, and that it may be a good one, when you consider the amount of responsibility and the scope of the duties of each Executive member, yet there must be a tremendous improvement of these individuals' performance which would justify their stipends." Nana Natwi, Vice President of Campus Affairs, stated, "a stipend for Executive members of Student Government will better enable me to serve my constituency. We do not even get a decent lunch for the work we do. This stipend will help me pay for some of the expenses that occur during the course of my stay in office." Tony Stone, a third year SEEK student said, "I don't see any effort on the part of the Day Student Government in behalf of students. Why should they receive stipends and if they are to receive a stipend, the entire student body should decide it by a referendum next spring." On the other hand, Edward Evans, Director of Co-Curricular Life, agrees with the principle, saying, "That's exactly what the resolution is, a principle. There is no method of implementing this resolution. We ought to look into many options and methods and there ought to be a thorough examination of this issue before a decision is rendered and not after it is made."

FILM REVIEW

"Losing Ground"

City College is shown to good advantage in the movie, "Losing Ground." Its writer, director and co-producer is a member of the faculty. Its cinematographer and co-producer is a former DCPA student in the Picker Film Institute. Several members of the cast and crew are current or former students, and much of the movie was filmed on north campus.

At a recent screening at the Museum of Modern Art, Filmmaker Kathleen Collins told the enthusiastic full house that she wants to tell "good stories . . . different stories about black people" in her movies. She does that memorably in "Losing Ground."

The movie is well written, well cast and pleasing to the senses. Essentially the story of a young black woman's search for a more complete sense of identity, it encompasses a range of relationships and emotions.

The plot unfolds with humor, energy and subtlety. The characters are believable—often profound, sometimes profane. This independent film made on a minimal budget with a small crew breaks new ground in filmmaking.

The movie opens in the classroom of Sara Rogers, Professor of Philosophy. Portrayed by Seret Scott—an actress of considerable range, noted for her performance in the off Broadway production, "My Sister, My Sister"—Professor Rogers is well liked by her students and appears comfortable with her scholarly role.

As we see her interacting with her husband, a free spirited abstract painter, and her mother, an eccentric actress, we begin to sense her insecurity about being such an intellectual in the presence of artists who can express their feelings easily. As Sara does research for a paper on the ecstatic experience, she runs into trouble and begins to lose ground. We are treated to some urban "Scenes From A Marriage" as Sara and Victor's comfortable ten year relationship suddenly becomes unfamiliar. As Sara finally manages to release some of her repressed feelings, she forces her husband to relate to her more aggressively.

Bill Gunn is charming as the handsome Victor Rogers, whose recent success prompts him to start painting people—particularly the Latin lovelies who live near the house he and Sara have rented for the summer. Victor is confused by his wife's anguish over her personality and stumbles into a new liaison when Sara briefly leaves him to stay at her mother's and act in a student's film.

Sara finds herself totally out of character on the set of George's college film project. She has

been cast as the notorious vamp Frankie of the "Frankie and Johnny" legend. Her co-star—whom she has previously met in the library and exchanged philosophical theories with—is the debonair Duke Richards.

The situations the characters get into and their dialogue are often humorous. When Sara brings Duke to the summer place only to discover her husband relaxing in the company of his current model and his mentor, she is cryptically polite with the introductions: "This is Carlos, an old family friend, and this is Celia, a new family friend."

Shot in the City and upstate in Rockland County, "Losing Ground" is visually delightful. Ronald Gray's cinematic techniques and his use of space and lighting give the film clarity and strength. His closeups capture the tenderness of Sara and Victor embracing while asleep and the poignancy of Victor huddled beside the pool in his underwear after being chastised by both his wife and his new lover.

Michael Minard's music is another reason the movie is so enjoyable. Based primarily on Latin rhythms, the music also supports some good dance sequences: Celia and Victor in an energetic mambo alongside the Hudson River; "Johnny" and "Nelly Bly" shimshamming and dipping on George's set; and a real crowd pleaser—Celia and Victor doing a funky slow drag in the summer house. Pepsi Bethel's choreography and Lamont Foreman's costumes also enhance the film.

The supporting cast is excellent, with veteran actors, Billie Allen (Sara's mother), Norberto Kerner (Carlos), Duane Jones (Duke), and Gary Bollings (George) being joined by newcomer, Maritza Rivera (Celia).

Although it is definitely an adult movie, "Losing Ground" is tastefully done and would appeal to teenagers. There are some hilarious sexual references, only a couple of expletives, and no nude scenes. Despite Victor's wandering eye, there is a real commitment between husband and wife. The final frame marks not the end of their relationship, but a chance to establish new ground.

"Losing Ground" has the same sensitivity and emotional appeal that made people flock to see "ET." However, these are your basic terrestrial beings, elevated on screen, hauntingly portrayed and memorably produced without big budgets, special effects and Hollywood hype. Producers Collins and Gray trusted their vision enough to make this film, and those lucky enough to see it will not be disappointed.

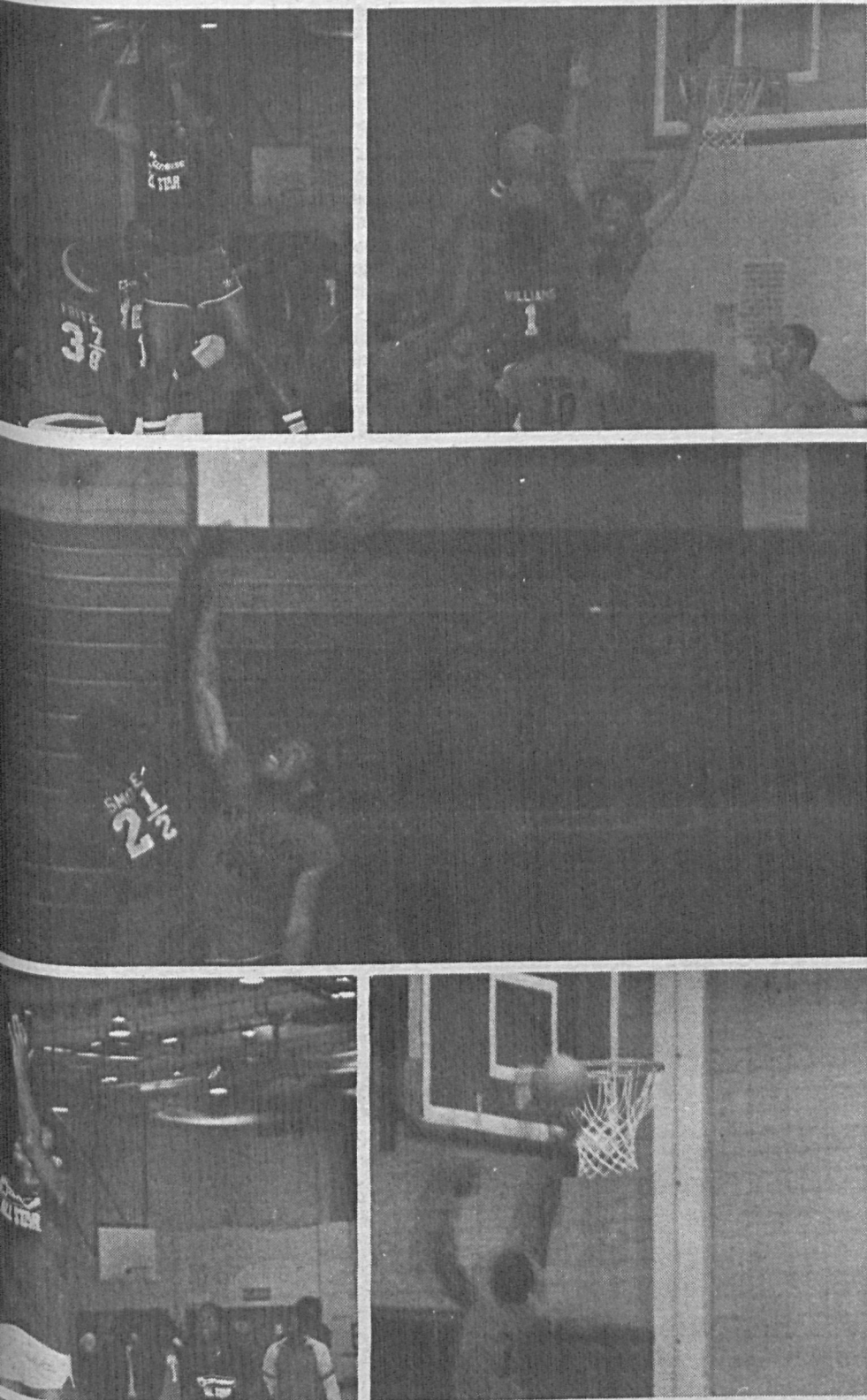
season.

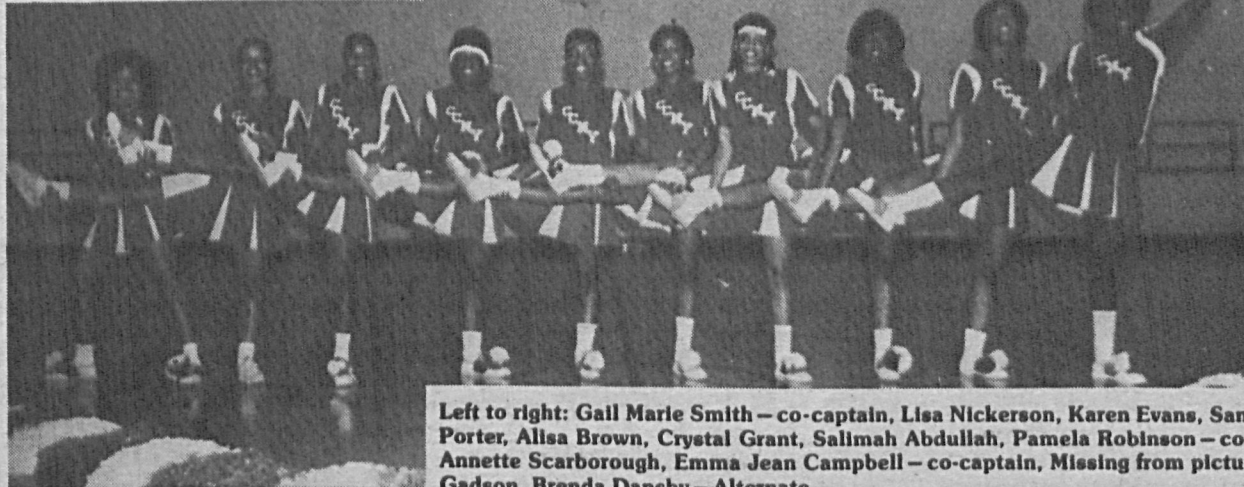

TRACK TALENT LOST IN THE SAUCE

On December 11, City College hosted the CCNY Chemical Bank Relays. This is the largest event of its kind and it was nice to have an event of this magnitude here at City. Lost in all the excitement however, was the fact that the host, our own City College men's and women's track team, showed their outstanding talents and gave great performances.

The women, with the strength of 4 first place finishes, won the overall events with a score of 22 points. Standouts were Stacey Williams, who also won the 600 yard run with a time of 1:32.9 (one minute, thirty-two point nine seconds), Patricia Butcher, Valeria Thompson, and Theodora Moorehead. This relay combination combined for 3 first place finishes. They won the distance medley relay with an overall time of 14:24.38 (fourteen minutes. Twenty four point thirty-eight seconds), the sprint medley relay with a time of 4:35.32, and the 2 mile relay with a time of 11:04.03. Jacqueline Ventour replaced Moorehead in the college 1 mile relay and CCNY came out on top in that event as well with a time of 4:24.7. The women also finished third in the 4 by 1 Lap relay. Participants in this even were Williams, Butcher, Thompson, and Edwige Crevecoure and their combined time was 1:23.4. For the women it was definitely a blue ribbon performance and one that showed just what type of talent there is on the women's team.

The men had nothing to be ashamed of by landing a 3rd place finish in the overall scoring with 8 points. Brooklyn College took first with

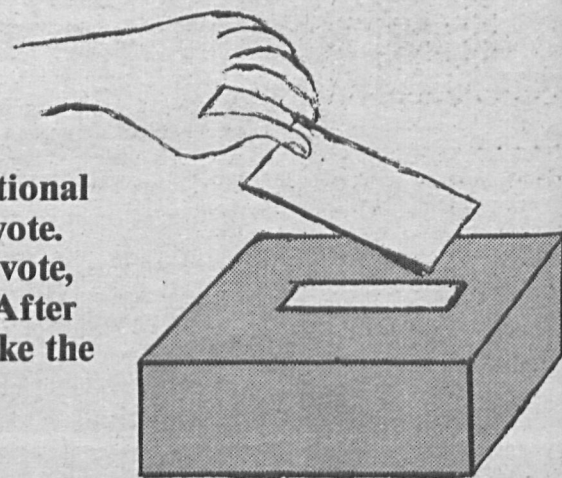
14 points and Kings Point came in second with 10 points. They, too, had some stellar performances.

The men took first place in the men's shuttle hurdle relay. Daniel Lisbon, Peter Averkiou, Andrew Clarke, and Courtney Anderson combined their efforts to bring home the bacon with a time of 41 seconds flat. Clarke also took first in the high jump with a jump of 6 feet, inch. Anderson took second in the same event with his jump of 5 ft, 10 in. He also finished second in the shot put with a distance of 32 ft, 8 1/2 in. The men also took 3rd place in the two mile relay, with the team of Anderson, Allen Griggs by, Julian Richards, and Terence Samuel recording a time of 8:23.6. Peter Coore replaced Griggs by for the 1 mile relay and the team came in fourth with a time of 3:38.62. Eddie Odom placed 5th in the 60 yd. dash with a time of 6.73 seconds.

There are also others who should be commended. Professor Castro did an excellent job in supervising the activities and keeping everything in order. Head Coach Errol Anderson should also be commended not only for preparing his teams for this event, but for his overall coaching job. He has brought both his teams together by instilling a family type atmosphere. "Everyone is family here. I am not able to attend all the workouts, but the team is to the point where they can do the workouts on their own." That is also a sign of discipline. Dr. Zernick can also look at this event as "another feather in his cap" as well. Job well done guys and gals.

Professor Bard to Receive Scientific Achievement Award

Professor Allen J. Bard of the University of Texas, Austin, TX, will receive the Scientific Achievement Award of City College's Chemistry Alumni Association and deliver the Association's 31st lecture on Thursday, March 17 at 1 P.M. in Room 2 at CCNY's Robert E. Marshak Science Building, 138th Street and Convent Avenue.

Dr. Bard, one of the world's foremost electro-analytical chemists, will speak on "Solar Energy Conversion through Photoelectrochemistry." He is a 1955 graduate of City College.

Dr. Bard is the Jack S. Posey Professor of Chemistry at the University of Texas and also editor of the *Journal of the American Chemical Society*. In addition, he is editor of the annual series on "Electro-Analytical Chemistry," published by Marcel Dekker.

Dr. Bard received his master's and doctorate from Harvard University in 1957 and 1958. He is a member of the National Academy of Sciences and has received the Harrison Howe

Award of the American Chemical Society and the Carl Wagner Memorial Award of the International Electrochemical Society.

In honor of Dr. Bard, two other distinguished scientists will speak on related topics. Professor Mark Wrighton of Massachusetts Institute of Technology will discuss "Catalysis of Electron Transfer Reactions by Rational Modification of Electrode Surfaces"; and Dr. Norman Sutin of Brookhaven National Laboratories will speak on "Light-Induced Electron Transfer Reactions in Solution."

The Scientific Achievement Award and Bicentennial Lecture Series were initiated by the Chemistry Alumni Association in 1948 to mark the 100th Anniversary of City College.

Thirteen of the 31 recipients are Nobel Laureates, including last year's lecturer, Ronald Hoffman.

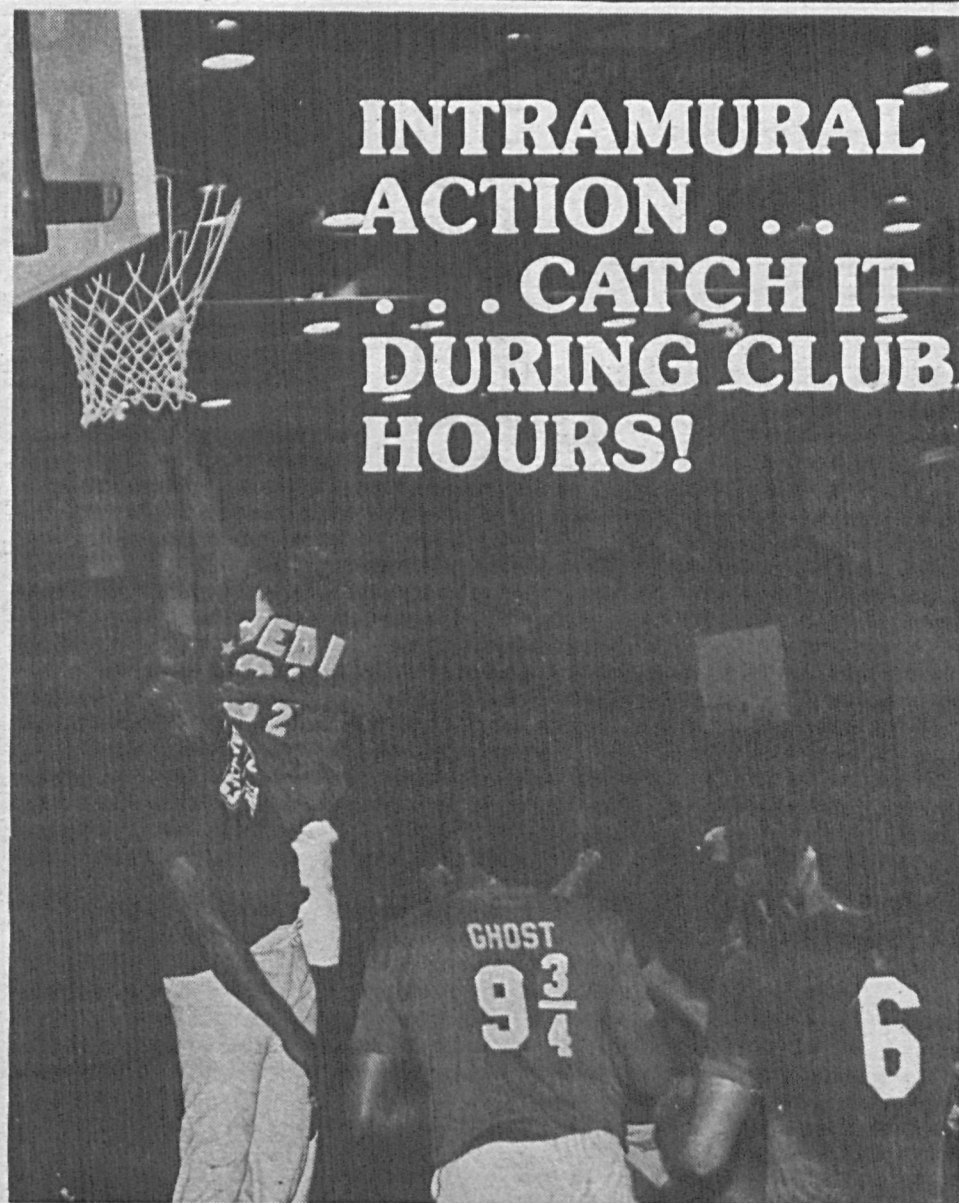
