# SG Fee Raise, Campus' S-F Comms. sg Pres..... On Ballot

By Barbara Ziegler Referenda concerning two. student-faculty groups, and a 25 cent Student Government fee, will be put before the student body in the SG elections tomorrow.

The referendum on the fee proposes that SG be allowed to "petition the Board of Higher Education for authorization to create a 25 cent SG fee to be used and administered by our agent, the Student Government."

According to Bill Brown '57, SG Treasurer, "with the fee, SG would be able to pay by itself for many should rest with the students, and things, such as honors, awards and NSA dues, and would not have to get the money from SFFC. ### **DeMaios Accuses** OP of 'Negligence;' Denies Resignation

Joe DeMaois '57 denied yesterday that he had resigned as president of the Inter-fraternity Coun-II. DeMaois' resignation reported in yesterday's Observation Post.

The OP story, which appeared on page one, went on to report that DeMaios had resigned at a special IFC meeting last night.

"There was no IFC meeting last night," DeMaios declared. "The story was completely incorrect and wasn't checked by OP. It is an example of sheer negligence on the part of OP."

DeMaios also announced the revamping of the Finley Center Board of Managers, of which he is chairman. The new body, composed of four divisions, will be known as the Finley Center Managers Agency.

The Personnel branch will be concerned with the hiring of student employees in the Finley Center, he explained. The House division with facilities and the Social Coordinating division will attempt to facilitate the integration of social activities with party facilities in the Center.

The fourth division is concerned with the operation of the Finley Center snack bar.

Voters will have a choice of candidates for only one of the four Student Government major offices in tomorrow's SG election. The sole competition is for SG secretary which is being contested by Stan Wissner '57 and Louise Shacknow '57, both SG representatives.

Jared Jussim '56, former SG treasurer, Bill Brown '57, present SG treasurer, and Arnie Deutchman '58, SG rep, are running unopposed for the posts of SG president, vice-president and treasurer.

#### Other Contests

Student Government reps and officers for each of the four classes will also be elected in tomorrow's balloting at 11.

A three way race shapes up for the senior class presidency involving George Lazarowitz, Todd Lewis and Howard Sherman, while Larry Warick and Buddy Rosenberg vie for the class of '56 vicepresidency.

labeled "ridiculous," "absurd," and "a farce" by responsible student leaders. The reasoning behind this name-calling is not hard to understand.

The primary fault, lies in the Committee's membership. Student and faculty members, alike, have repeatedly displayed complete ignorance of organizations' financial requirements. Time and again they have taken the allocations made by the Student Government Fee Commission after hundreds of man-hours of careful study and in a matter of moments, after only superficial consideration, decided upon unjustified changes.

The first major step towards reorganizing SFFC is embodied in the election referendum. It provides for selection of all but one of the student members by Student Council. However, they can not choose anyone who is a member of Council. The fifth student would be Student Government's treasurer. Presently he is the only student member of SFFC who is truly representative of the entire student body and deserves to sit on the Committee.

The adoption of the referendum would assure clubs and organizations on campus of a well-considered and therefore more equitable distribution of Fee Plan money. For this reason we urge you to vote YES on the SFFC referendum.

## Yes on SG Fee

In a previous editorial we stated our opposition to any raise in fees without a thorough investigation of all other possible means of raising money. Other sources have been satisfactorily investigated and we now feel certain that the referendum calling for a creation of a 25 cent Student Government fee is the best possible way to finance the many activities at the College. The money is not an activities fee raise, but will establish a separate Student Government fund of about 17000 dollars. At the present time SG receives its money from fee plan. If SG receives this fund it will mean that the money it is normally allotted will be used to finance-other activities.-

We have long stressed the urgency of getting more money to finance student activities. The benefits of these activities affect YOU, the student. The activities are planned for your enjoyment and for your cultural, educational and social benefits. Good intentions will not finance a well-rounded activities program. Students are always hesitant to give out of their own pockets and we don't blame them. Nobody likes to give something and receive nothing; but reflect a few minutes before you make your decision. Look at the benefits you are going get for one quarter.

No security on the market can earn you better dividends. Student activities are a fulfledged security. Invest in them by voting YES on the SG fee referendum.

## The Candidates Speak

### President Jared Jussim

Two of the problems facing the Student Government next semester will be the student membership of SFCSA and the Student Faculty Fee Committee. The present organization of both of these committees violates the basic precepts of democracy, which means assay for all in their government; not just a few special interest groups. There is no question that the student representatives to these committees are capable and houest

However, the present representatives to these committees only represent the major organizations, and the vast majority of the students who do not belong to these organizations go unrepresented, except for the SG officers. In addition, the fact that people may be long to two or more of these major organizations means that there is multiple representation. Only by electing students to these committees, either directly by the student body or through their elected representatives can we hope to achieve a democratic system.

### Vice-president Bill: Brown

There are several reasons for my seeking the position of vicepresident. The primary reason is the belief that SG should consolidate the agency before system expansion is undertaken. The second is the lack of a working definition for Student Government. Without this, it is very hard for people inside and outside of SG, faculty and administration to properly evaluate the functioning of SG.

The agency system has been criticized by some students; the reason for this situation was (1) a dearth of qualified responsible people; and (2) the confusion caused by the moving from North Campus to South Campus. The former can only be solved when students become interested in working for Student Government.

The tone for next term, I feel, should be moderation and diplomacy. This should be the guiding light in dealing with students and administration.

With three games played this season, the College's basketball team is still looking for its first victory, but the chances for getting it won't be good when it meets Lafayette in the Main Gym Saturday night.

Lafayette has a well balanced veteran team which has taken three of its first four

games this season. The Leopards downed Swarthmore. Princeton and Delaware before bowing to Manhattan at the Garden last Saturday night.

However that game may have turned out, the team from Easton, Pa. would seem to have a little too much of everything for the shaky, inexperienced Beavers.

The Leopards are strong in all departments. They have height, good shooting and ball handling and plenty of savvy. Although the Beavers' Syd Levy at 6'8", George Jensen at 6'4", and Bill Lewis at 6'3" can match their foes' height, they don't have equal experience.

Lafayette has all its starters back from last year when they compiled a 24-2 mark over the regular season. Although they were knocked off by Niagara in the first round of N.I.T. play, they were so impressive overall as to earn Coach Bill Van Breda Kolff the "Coach-of-the-Year" award of the New York basketball writers.

Their backcourt combination of Ernie Peters and Ed Knapp is what really makes the Leopards go. Both Seniors are slick, fast floormen.

The 5'9" Peters, team captain for the second straight year, is one of the best little men in the East. Besides being a valuable playmaker he averaged 12.5 points per game last season. Knapp, who is 6'1", averaged 10.5.

Up front Lafayette will go with 6'5" junior Jim Radcliffe and 6'4" Senior George Young at the forwards. Another Senior, 6'6" Todd Walker will be at center.


