STRIVERS CENTER About to become a reality

With Strivers Plaza, the first stage of the Strivers Center Development Project already being constructed, the \$14 million Harlem tourism project is on its way to becoming a reality.

The Strivers Center Development Project, conceived by the Greater Harlem Chamber of Commerce (GHCC), is a revitalization project that seeks to develop centers of culture, entertainment and cuisine in Harlem. The project consists of the renovation of three blocks of vacant buildings on 135th Street, from Adam Clayton Powell Jr. Boulevard to St. Nicholas Avenue.

When completed, the buildings will house ethnic and specialty food restaurants and cafes; shops, boutiques and specialty stores; jazz clubs, a jazz hall of fame museum and a jazz walk of fame; affordable apartments; and travel agencies and an airline ticket office.

Strivers center was conceived as a catalyst for the revitalization of Harlem as a major New York City tourist attraction. Developers hope that the appeal of jazz entertainment will make Strivers center an important tourist center, equal to lower Manhattan's South Street Seaport.

The larger cultural aim is the recreation of the Harlem of the 1920s and 1930s - a Harlem famed for its jazz clubs, "speak easies" and world-renowned cuisine. A Harlem that was the mecca of Black New York.

Through its E c o n o m i c D e v e l o p m e n t Corporation (EDC), the city of New York, a major land owner in the project area, is working with the GHCC to make the center a reality. If Strivers Center does

attract tourist dollars, the City stands to boost its income from tourism, which now stands at about \$12 billion. Angela Hendrix Terry, chief of staff for the EDC says the idea is to get tourists to spend their extra dollars in Harlem. "All those tour buses come up to Harlem and just drive around, " she said. "The idea is to get the tourists off those buses so they can come in and spend all those disposable dollars."

The project will be completed in two phases. Phase One, called

Strivers Plaza is already underway. When completed, eight buildings would have been renovated. The building will house 48 residential rental units for families and approximately 11 thousand square feet of ground floor retail rental space.

In the second phase of development, scheduled to begin in September, work will begin on a brand new streetscape, the jazz hall of fame, and other entertainment business. The new steetscape promises to give the area a much-needed face-lift. It entails the installation of distinctive lampposts, planters, kiosks, benches, banners and musical motifs.

The success of Strivers Center may be the beginning of future investment in Harlem. The GHCC hopes that the center will be the catalyst for a thriving tourism business in the Harlem of the twenty-first century.





In Honor of Freedom - In Pursuit of Progress Ghana's Day of Independence - March 6,1957

On March 6, 1994, the progressive nation of Ghana celebrated thirty-seven years of independence from British rule. As the first African nation to gain independence, Ghana continues to function as a country filled with ambitious goals; as a middle aged country, it is currently experiencing reorganization and other adjustments in hopes of continued and accelerated progress.

The Ghanaian Students Association of City College commemorated the Independence Day celebration of the African West Coast nation on Thursday, March 17,1994 with a forum addressing various issues of concern to people of Ghanaian descent. The Consul-General of Ghana to the United Nations, Mr. Adotey Anum was the special invited guest. In addition to informative historical background given, the students and invited guests addressed the issues outlined on their agenda. Among the specifics discussed were the political changes in Ghana over the last year, freedom of the Ghanaian press, the execution of the

Our senior Thais Palmer held Barach's star, Sybil Smith, to a total of 10 points. She is definitely the defensive player of the year. 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Popular Music or Popular Drivel?

In America, our contemporary music is usually reflective of what is occurring in society. In many ways music represents what our current state of mind is, or perhaps what "vibe" we are on at that particular time. I believe this is especially true of rap music, or "hip hop". IT continues to thrive on young people. Many rappers have successfully captured a crossover audience, and artists such as Hammer, Vanilla Ice and Doctor Dre have sold millions of records.

However, the impact of these three artists, I believe, is considerably different on their audiences. There is a current trend in hip hop that has become wildly popular. It is known as gangster rap. This brand of rap is considerably different from that which many popular rap artists-past and present have used. Hammer and Vanilla Ice, certainly not the prime representatives of the hip hop world, nonetheless are a part of the industry that lyrically does not contribute very much to social development. The usually talk of nothing particularly insightful, yet they have thumping bass beats and dance tunes that can be very marketable; it would almost evoke the image of Michael Jackson as a rapper. These artists

are neither politically correct or hardcore street rappers.

Therefore, who are these gangster (gangsta) rappers? There are a few who are not widely known. However, the artists that have popularized gangsta rap is the West Coast conglomerate "Death Row". The prime progenitor of Death ROw is Dr. Dre, formerly of the controversial Los ANgeles rap group N.W.A. (ask a knowledgeable friend what that stands for) and his self-produced, double-platinum album of 1992, "The Chronic." HIs protege is Snoop Doggy Dogg, a former gang member, whose much awaited album "Doggystyle" debuted at number one on the pop charts late in 1993. Together they have popularized a style of rap that has inundated the radio airwaves, and captured the ears of millions of young people in America in the progress.

Whereas many rappers in the past have talked about the many struggles of living in the inner city, the crime, the destitution, and racism, Dr. Dre and his cohorts have done the opposite in glorifying the usage of guns, drugs and the disrespecting of African women. There is a skit on Snoop's "Doggystyle" where two young men, strangers to each engage in an

argument over a girl, which ends with Snoop shooting his antagonist in cold blood. Profanity is the norm everywhere these days, yet the expletives and the constant use of certain derogatory terms identifying women are used in abundance on various hip hop albums, not only by Dr. Dre and Snoop Doggy Dogg. With these artists being given considerable air time on radio and television, what is the younger generation learning from these images?

Hally and Ricardo, both music majors at City College, have similar views about the effects of these messages on younger people. "Kids idolize these artists and what they represent, "says Hally. "Adults are responsible for what children listen to. These are glorified images, and being of Haitian descent I know that even the kids in my community are affected." Ricardo agrees. "This music has an impact on younger audiences. However, it reflects that society also has a problem. I do not listen to rap, but the same chauvinistic attitudes exists within Merengue music. The same old patterns are reinforced in many types of music."

Therefore, there is a feeling among many people that violent and misogynistic lyrics have no place in music. Several prominent figures in entertainment and politics have spoken out against gangster rap and some radio stations have begun to stop playing any music with violent and misogynistic lyrics. These may be the first steps in ultimately getting these artists to change their material.

Personally I believe that gangster rap is a dangerous type of music. It promotes and encourages violence and disrespect, primarily among young African-Americans and innercity youth. I have listened to rap music as long as it has existed. I have also noticed how the soulful and unifying African music of the 1970's by such artists as Earth, Wind and Fire, Marvin Gaye and Minnie Riperton have given way to disco and hip hop. African-American music has always been popular in the United States; it has been used to convey different messages such as love, peace, discontent or heartbreak. However, it has never been used as a vehicle to popularize violence among African peoples or any other group of individuals. It is a frightening and disturbing trend. Would these artists like their children to emulate what they preach?

The acquisition of the almighty dollar is a poor excuse for misguiding the people.

Zionist Logic

Maybe the solutions to a lot of life's problems are not the conventional ones like prisons and other institutions. Perhaps we have been aiming at these problems from the wrong angle and maybe sincerely caring and motivating a person is a better tool.

Crime, drugs, alcohol and homelessness are known problems in the Black community. Now suicide, a dilemma thought of mostly in Caucasian communities is making itself known.

Our major combat for most of these situations have been in use for decades; we see a drug user or an alcoholic, and we have him/her arrested. If they are financially well off, they can get treatment instead of a jail term, which is more than likely what the common person will get. Rehab is usually not an option. These methods are supposed to deter the above mentioned activities. The problem is that, drug and alcohol abuse are still major problems in the Black

community. Most of us are aware of the statistics when it comes to Black men in the prison system. It's obvious that the traditional method of dealing with drug and alcohol abuse is not working.

Homelessness is affecting virtually every city in the country, and in cities like Chicago, New York and San Francisco where the natural elements can prove quite deadly, homelessness can be a fatal problem.

As a rule, the homeless are scorned. Almost every place they create as a shelter is denied to them and destroyed by the police.

Then the people are usually carted off by the police to public shelters where they are subject to inhumane treatment, primarily due to over-crowding. Often, they are even taken to jail. Some are physically attacked and killed. Some time ago in a major city a homeless man was killed when he was set on fire by a group of teenagers.

When you enter college your life begins to change, As you learn to accept more responsibilities, you become independent. Last semester I decided to try living closer to City College in order to be closer to my new job, and to become more active in the community.

My roommate and I moved into what we thought was a quiet apartment, situated almost on the City College campus. We later came to call it "The Apartment from Hell." My friends can testify that every week there was a problem. I soon missed my parents' home, where all I had to do was clean and do some cooking every now and again. My roommate and I lived with alternating schedules, which makes living with a roommate ideal. But although we were able to schedule chores between us, other things plagued us. Rent and Utilities became our major concerns. Now I understand why my father always wanted us to turn off the extra lights. After all those years of thinking that Con Edison was my friend, I was coming to the rude enlightenment that we were just associates. I also

realized that the "nice man" who rented us the apartment was a "business man" first, nice guy later. Rent, rent & Mo Rent was the only thing this man was interested in.

He was definitely not interested in the problems that we were having with the apartment. First we were locked in and out of our apartment because of a faulty door. Then we had to deal with drafty windows... and a rodent problem. As it got colder the inconvenience of NO heat made conditions unbearable, especially when the landlord forgot to order oil for the burner and there would also be no hot water. Sometimes, without notice, the maintenance workers would finally decide to fix something which would result in their shutting off the water while one of us was in the middle of a bath. We were angry at the conditions, for it seemed that only our apartment had these problem. The other tenants seemed so content.

I decided to change my destiny. I called the Central Complaint Office of the Housing Department. They immediately recognized the owner's name because they had received other complaints. Relieved that we were

not the only ones "with the psychological problem" as the building manager had commented, I decided to find out more about managing buildings.

I signed up for a free building mangement class that was offered by the Housing Preservation and Anti-Anbandonment services. I also went to the State Attorney General's Office and got a tenant's handbook. We found out what our legal rights are and what is expected of the building's mangement, in terms of upkeep and the like. We made photocopies of this information and distributed it to the other tenants. In addition I realized that Housing Preservation provides a necessary service because they work to prevent building abandonment by stressing proper management, to preserve housing for families with low and moderate income and to pass on the skills of building management to the people within the community.

I need to add that my apartment is livable. Its convenience to City Collge and 125th Street is definitely a plus. I'm also happy to be a part of the Harlem community. So I'm happy that I've spread my wings and moved

on uptown. But I'm also happy that I decided to improve my situation by seeking information that was enpowering. If you have a similar problem, make sure you do the same thing to ensure that your building is improved. Enlighten yourself on your rights as well as your landlord's. It's up to you to make sure that your community is secure. When your community is secure, your neighborhood becomes a better place to live. Either you are part of the problem or part of the solution.

If you are concerned about similar problems, here are some places you can call:

Sacrifice of Mmabatho

The Sacrifice of Mmabatho is a bittersweet experience for the informed viewer. Although performed by an all-Black cast that communicates the richness of Black South Africa's culture through action, song and dance, the play is scarred by its presentation of an aberration as the norm.

Drought, famine, disparity... the scene that overshadows Nebo, a newly established village in South Africa's Eastern Transvaal region. Enticing Mother Nature to send rain seems a problem that cannot be solved. Not only is a rain-ritual unsuccessful, but it seems that the ancestors have abandoned the village and its inhabitants. In addition, there is conflict among the villagers that centers around what must be done to ensure their survival. Some advocate that the ancestors must be further appeased, while others endorse the western viewpoint that the ancestors are no longer in control. The primary action of the play revolves around one man's solution to the problem; David Thobela resolves to appease the ancestors by sacrificing his daughter, with the hope that Nebo would once again flourish.

David Thobela has recently returned to Nebo after losing his job

in the city. Like every other villager, he is unable to make a living in Nebo. No longer having a salary, and unable to till the soil, Thobela is unable to provide for his two wives and his malnourished daughter, Mmabatho. He falls into a deep depression, only finding solace in his childhood memories of the festivities that bountiful rain and produce would inspire. Taunted by friends and family for not returning to the city to seek work, Thobela becomes consumed with breaking the dry spell. In his deep introversion, he hears the voices of the ancestors calling on him. Consultation with the chief sangoma (spiritual healer) of the village, Mogase, reveals to Thobela the ancestor's desire to have him sacrifice a cow in order to appease them. But during the ritual ceremony that Mogase performs, Thobela's soul is consumed by Umthakathi, an evil spirit. After the ceremony, Thobela conducts a frantic but unsuccessful search to find a cow. In his desperation, he is led by Umthakathi to sacrifice Mmbatho in order to finally break the spell. At the final climax of the play, Thobela is turned over to the white authorities for trial and sentencing. A village elder decrees that in order for the village to once again be successful the old customs must be once again


incorporated into everyday life. The ancestors are appeased and it rains.

The resolution of the play suggests that the core issue was the conflict between the ways of the old and the new - traditionalism battling an intruding western lifestyle. Although the play's resolution indicates an endorsement of the ancestral ways, the body of the play indicts traditionalism - it is because of his incessant quest to appease the ancestors that Thobela is led to kill his innocent daughter. In addition,

Thobela's act is not presented as an aberration. The action suggests that just about any distraught villager would commit this act if it means that the ancestors would be appeased.

Sacrifice of Mmabatho is written by celebrated White South African Playwright/ Director, Hilary Blecher. The play is based on the true story of David Tshethia who cut his two year-old daughter's throat in order to use her body for

The lenient sentence indicates the Pretoria court's belief that Tshethia really believed in witchcraft and the supernatural. blamed for such a horrible act. The non-South African audience member immediately believes that appeasing the ancestors at any cost is the hallmark of Black South African traditionalism.

Although the story failed to deliver, the cast did. Led by Max Mgcobo (who received recognition when he toured with the Tony-Award winning production of Sarafina!) as David Thobela, they attained a realism that must be acclaimed. Extremely memorable were Baby Cele who played Mmakhudu, Thobela's first wife and Thembi Mtshali who dominated the stage as Ma Thobela, David Thobela's mother. The most laudable achievement of this production, however, was its music.

The music composed by Victor N'Toni with Rashid Lanie was executed by only two musicians who occupied a small part of the stage. They employed drums, calabash, chymes and triangles to provide accompaniment that perfectly complemented the dialogue. The vocals were simple but explicit. Repetition of lyrics connoted the importance of whatever message was being conveyed. Mthandeni Mvelase and Mduduzi Nzuza, the two musicians responsible for the enchanting sound that was the produce, captured the ambiance and essence of Azaania in a way that was truly unique. The two constantly switched instruments between them - each displaying their dexterity. Asked how they were able to attain and communicate such spiritual sync, the two brothers replied, "through prayer and patience all
