Tech Writing Makes Debut

Offered In Fall

Approval was given Monday by Professor Johnson, Chairman of the English Department, Dean Allen for an accreditation writing course to be given in the fall. The technical writing course will be open to all engineering students and will be a two credit, two hour class. English 1 and English 2 will be prerequisites. The course will be incorporated in English 11, section B, which is to be held on Mondays and Wednesdays at 10 A.M. Professor Wasser, a faculty ad-

viser, will be the instructor. Only one section will be offered next term but Professor Wasser said that more sections will be opened in following terms if enough students are interested. Professor Wasser said, "Twenty students would be a fair number to make it a success."

The course can be offered in the fall because it does not have to be approved and accredited as an addition to the curriculum by the Board of Higher Education. The BHE does not meet again for reviewing new applications until the fall term. Since the technical writing course will be incorporated in English 11 sections, it does not have to be reviewed by the BHE. The English 11 course which is offered in the School of Liberal Arts and Science is an advanced composition course with a stress on training and preparation of factual material.

Chemical Engineers may use "Technical and Scientific Writing" in their liberal art's electives with approval from Professor Schmidt. All other engineers will be able to apply for the course, but they might be required to pay for the course.

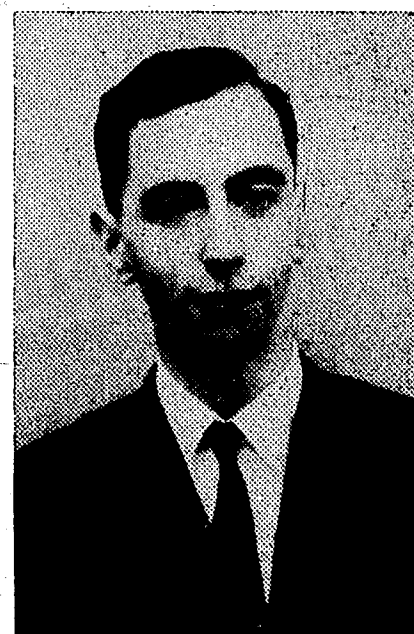

Because of the large reply to a mimeographed supplement and short form in TECH NEWS, the English Department has decided to give a technical writing course. It is unfortunate that those tech students who are not ChemE's may have to pay for the course but maybe something can be worked out in the future. Arming a hand to Ted Semegran.

Election time is here again and this term we believe that we have endorsed those students who we thought were the very best for the job. 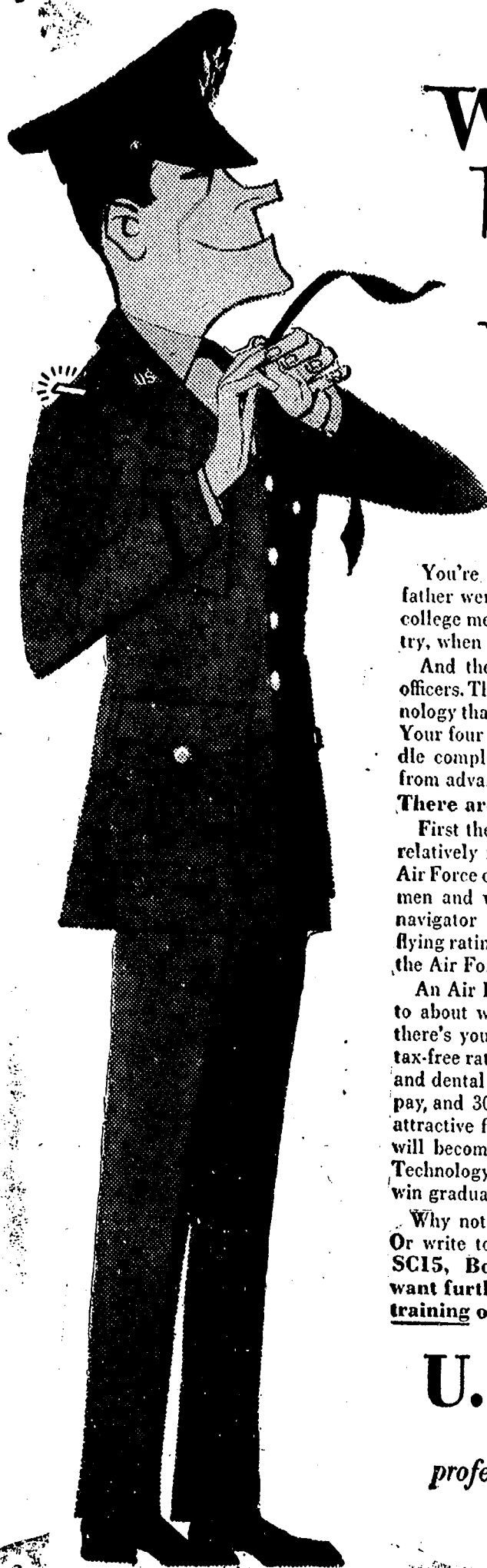
