The poll, which used a sample of 200 students representing a crossection of the college, was conducted after the start of classes.

The results show that one third of the students did not receive packets informing them of early registration.

Two thirds of the juniors and seniors found that early registration conflicted final exams. Further, a sizable amount felt that without knowing the results of the finals they could not plan their programs adequately.

99.5 percent of those polled favored having the name of the instructor and the section he or she will teach printed in the schedule of classes.

50 percent of the students felt penalized for missing classes while standing on line for lenghty periods, trying to late register or change a section or course.

COMMENTARY: HAITI IN TRANSITION

hortly before elections to select a national Assembly in Haiti, Simeon Benjamin sang two of Haiti's favorite numbers in a solo performance reminiscent of better days in his youth. His aged voice reflected both the vivacity of a youth left far behind and the considerate effort it required from the sixty-eight years old candidate for the presidency of Haiti to stand, and face a challenging audience mainly composed of members of the Haitian Student Association of CCNY.

The candidate reflects the incongruous and often hilarious nature of politics in present day Haiti. A hilarious and deadly game that many hoped would end with the flight of Jean Claude Duvalier after the people took the streets in mass protests.

These days, the streets are patrolled by heavily armed military personnel in a de facto state of emergency that emerged due to a reported rise in "criminal and destabilizing acts," according to spokespersons from the **Council for National Government, the** governing body that has ruled the country since the flight of the deposed dictator.

The ruling council took power after the former president flew to safety aboard a U.S. Air Force jet. It is headed by Lieutenant General Henry Namphy, the Army Chief of Staff during the Duvalier regimes, and his right hand man is Colonel William Regala.

Most of the leading candidates for the presidential elections scheduled for 1988 have denounced the election for the constituent assembly as worthless in the present atmosphere of intimidation. They have cited the arrest of Charlot Jacquelin, one of the directors of the Alpha campaign against illiteracy in the countryside, along with some if his associates as examples of the intimidation fostered by the ruling council. continued on page 7

A BIT OF HISTORY:

COCAINE: A HISTORICAL VIEW

outh American Historians believe that Coca leaves were first discovered and used by the Incas to stimulate their spirits. The use of Cocaine dates back to Thousands years before Christ. On top of Machu Picchu the Incas chew Coca leaves during special ceremonies to contact the moon and the stars.

Coca leaves' use was not a social problem at that time; on the contrary, it was a mild -if not an eventful- social issue.

The work Coca means "Body of a tree" according to the Incas. Coca leaves were distributed to other near by tribes by Bochica, an indian leader; it was in this way that Coca trafficking started between tribes.

The trafficking of Coca between countries began right after the Spaniards invaded South America. A monetary system had not been developed yet; the South American Indians bartered goods and services so as to fulfill each other needs. for example: A blanket was traded for a sack filled with cotton; a larger blanket was exchanged for two coats; have a Coke and smile." Thereafter, the Coca leaves exchange became a much popular trade. In 1555, A Spanish cronist wrote a

letter from Peru to the government of Spain where he described his studies about the Indians: "Here grows an strange plant more popular than gold and silver; the Indians say it stops the hunger, thirst, and cold." From then the U.S. during the prohibition years on the trafficking of Coca became popular between American and European continents.

Three popes, eighteen presidents and thousands of doctors approved its use. Later on, a chemist, Friedrich Wolter, succeeded in separating an alkalid from the Coca leaves.

In 1884, Cocaine was used as an anasthetic for medical purposes by an numb our society today. Cocaine is Opthamologist.

In 1886, John Smyth wanted to create something more popular than wine. He invented the first soft drink with Cocaine in it: Coca-cola. Cocacola helped stimulate people's brain and it was also considered the "Real thing."


Dear Club Presidents,

Playing the piano is not an easy task. Imagine a surgeon perfor ming delicate open-heart surgery and then witness the marvelous hands of Joseph Villa as they liberate the Keyboard of a piano. The similarity is astounding.

Joseph Villa, born in the United States, studied with Sacha Gorodnitzski at the age of fifteen. At age eighteen he formed a duet with violinist Joseph Fuchs.

In 1970, Joseph Villa demolished his competition performing Liszts' Second Piano Concerto in A major.

In 1972, he made his first recital debut in Alice Tully Hall at Lincoln



Center.

From there on Villas' career soared, and he performed with many great musical groups, including The Pittsburgh Symphony, the Norwegian Chamber Orchestra, and The Polish Chamber Orchestra.

The great pianist also recorded "Carnival Of The Animals", along with Beethoven and Schuberts' "Liszt Visits Vienna".

In 1976, Villa was invited to play at the Festival de la Chaise Dieu in France.

He has also collaborated with artists Victoria de los Angeles and Jessye Norman.




