

#### First Alumnus President Issues Inaugural Message to Students


Eighty-one years ago today the State Legislature passed an act enabling the people of the City of New York to found an institution of higher learning as part of their public school system. That institution, now known as the College of the City of New York, was conceived by Townsend Harris and it was based on the principle that in a democracy all should have free access to such education as they are qualified to receive. There was the implication that the salvation of the race is to be sought in freedom and enlightenment.



#### New Award Given By Student Council

Subsequent to the publication in Monday's Campus of letters from Arthur Goodfriend '28 and Jack Rothenberg '28 notifying the Student Council of their refusal of minor insignia awarded them, the Council at a special meeting changed Goodfriend's award to major insignia.

A letter from Joseph J. Caputa '28, Editor of the Campus was read at the meeting requesting them to withdraw the minor insignia voted him. The letter follows: Gentlemen:

According to an announcement made last Friday the Student Council awarded Major insignia to three seniors for distinguished service in extra curricular activities. In making these selections the Council rejected the Editors of the College publications and gave the major award to one whose activities could not be construed by any measure to be of greater merit than those of the head of our newspaper or magazine.

Your presumably high standard is not borne out by the facts nor do you show by these elections a clear conception of the relative values of the several College activities, and I, therefore, feel constrained to request you to withdraw the minor award accorded me.

When a student organization which is entrusted with such a distinguishing function makes a practice of awarding recognition for meritorious service to the College on no definite principle, in fact as in this case, on a variable principle based upon a warped view of what service should be honored, it miserably falls down in the fulfillment of its purpose. President Robinson, the speakers for the day, the faculty, prominent public officers, alumni, and other specially invited guests, will constitute the official party, before which the military corps of the College will march in review. Six hundred students, specially chosen for the occasion, will make up the Reserve Officers Training Corps delegation, under the supervision of Captains Brown and Bolan.

Marking eighty-one years from the date of the signing of the charter establishing the Free Academy as an academic institution in New York City, the coming exercises will observe a custom which has been perpetuated throughout the long history of the College. On May 7, 1847, the Honorable John Young, Governor of the State of New York, signed the bill passed by the State Legislature authorizing the New York City Board of Education to establish a Free Academy, provided that the voters of the city, in a special referendum, approved the

On June 7, 1847, in accordance with the above act, the people of the City of New York, by a vote of 19,305 to 3,409, decided that the Board of Education should establish the Free Academy. And on June 16, 1847, the Board of Education, by a vote of 28 to 1, further resolved to erect and form a Free Academy.

On April 17, 1866, the Legislature of the State of New York passed an act changing the name of the institution to the College of the City of New York. In 1901, the College property was transferred form the Free Academy location on Twentythird street to its present home on the Heights. Charter Day has been observed and celebrated in impressive fashion during each year of the College's existence. Important ceremonies have often transpired during the holding of it, and famous personages of note have been present yearly to aid the College in the observance of its one yearly all-embracing ceremony.

Incidentally, in connection with several of the people of note who are scheduled to be present at the celebration, several former illustrious
