Vote Part A

The Observation Post is smug and confident today. It thinks it has, by blatantly turning its pages into a propaganda sheet, killed a single daily newspaper at City College. The student body must prove OP wrong when it votes tomorrow.

Forty-nine colleges and universities in the United States have single daily papers: Columbia, NYU, Harvard, Yale, Princeton. City College, with the largest undergraduate body in the country—it is the third largest school—definitely needs and deserves one daily newspaper also.
