Mr.Larry Payton informed The Paper that the five week deadline had passed. He also

stated that on November 15th, 1990 there will be a health fair, here at City College, that will take

place at the rotunda of the NAC

building.

When asked about how the department will deal with students who have not shown proof of immunization, Mr. Payton responded that the record of every student attending City College is on a computer which is hooked-up to the college's mainframe. The students who are



not cooperating will be notified and urged to come in to J-15 as soon as possible.

No Space for Clubs, But Hope for Better Security

On Thursday October 15th, the President of the Day Student Government, Mr. Rafael Alvarez, met with the CCNY media and student leaders to discuss current issues relating to City College. Guest speakers at the meeting were Mr. G. Crinnon, Assistant Director of Special Services, and Mr. Jon Yellin, the Vice-President of Finance and Management of CCNY.

The first topic of discussion concerned club rooms. Finley Center was once the main student center, where all the clubs held their meetings and activities. But since the demolition of the old Finley Center several years ago, the

school administration has not tried to replace it. It was suggested that each club on campus should be assigned a permanent room where meetings and activities may be held on a weekly basis. Vice-President Yellin explained that this would not be possible in the immediate future, since the college is undergoing widespread construction. Due to limited space, the clubs are unfortunately forced to make the best of the situation. Vice-President Yellin said that the construction will be completed in the next one and a half years, hence, we still can look forward to future inconveniences.

Once again, the issue of

security surfaced in the meeting, and both Mr. Dandridge and Mr. Crinnon were interrogated by the students. Mr. Dandridge informed us about the twenty student aides who are working in conjunction with the security to protect our campus. These student information aides patrol most of the campus including the Cohen Library and are always at the students' disposal. The President of the Nurse's Association of City College expressed her concern on behalf of all the students nurses, about the lack of security guards after 4 p.m. the Harris Building. Are We Really Free? Or Just Free To Do the Wrong Thing?

The land of the free and the home of the brave is supposedly the essence of the American society. But for whom? The dregs of Europe came over about 450 years ago and took a hold of this vast piece of land, that stretches over 3.5 million sq. miles, known today as the United States. They stole it from the natives in the name of European Nationalism. They brought slaves over from Africa in the name of European Nationalism. They set up a judicial system and constitution to protect what they stole, also in the name of European Nationalism. So here we are as African-Americans, approaching the 21st century only free to do the wrong thing.

Our freedom as African-Americans, which stems from slavery, and being denied certain rights to read, write, and develop linguistic skills, is a freedom that is in vain. We were denied the right to develop our analytical and thinking skills so that we could become a self-governing people again. As a result, upon analyzing the behavior of Black people in expressing our freedom, our expression always seems to lead us into supporting the European. We express our

freedom by doing what He says, by buying his goods, by moving into his neighborhood, by reading his books and working on his job. Therefore, we live in a society that makes us feel the freest when we are more enslaved, and makes us think of our enslavement as the essence of freedom.

The same act by two groups of people existing in two different strata of society has different effects. So one cannot just look at the acts that people perform in terms of freedom, you must look at the effects of their acts. Moreover, since our destiny as Black people is controlled by the European, our freedom of expression is an act of destruction and the Europeans freedom of expression is an act of conservation or construction. Also, as African people we have become embedded into the European value system to the fullest extent of self-alienation.

Our destructive freedom of expression can be witnessed from the brothers and sisters on the street corners, to our brothers and sisters on the highest rung of society. On the streets we express our freedom by selling death to one another in the form of drugs.

We randomly assault one another for no apparent reason or motive. Some of our Black women express their freedom by wearing braless and pantyless clothes that cling so tight to the body that they are fully exposed, and in doing so do not realize that they are prostituting themselves in the name of freedom.

We, as Black students, just blindly pursue a college education and never fully understand that we are in the hands of our slavemaster's children---in the name of that very same freedom. Our Black middle class and intellectuals have abandoned the masses as a result of their so-called freedom; and here in 1990, the majority of them still have not made a serious attempt to give back to their communities because they are too busy trying to make an alliance with the European, again in the name of freedom. Mayor David Dinkins has probably lost half of his Black constituency because he has refused to do justice by his own people first, as his predecessor has done time after time.

Now, many may argue that we are free because we can do what we want to do. And I'll

say that your statement is a fallacy because brothers and sisters, since we operate under the European value system, what we want to do has already been artificially implanted in our minds. Remember that our freedom was given after the brainwashing had occurred, and as a result we will continue to do the wrong thing from our own free will.

Furthermore, during the period of slavery, the Blackman had been denied the desire to read and understand, and even up until today when you put a book before his face, he experiences a lack of desire to read, and thinks that is freedom of choice. So he is left with his theoretical proposition of freedom because he is not familiar with the original implantation of his lack of desire.

So we must remember that this is the way the American system is designed and it is set up for our destruction—we will destroy ourselves thinking that we are expressing our own freedom.

Fads and Fallacies.

Active and not so active participants in the "Black Movement" regularly experience tremendous ups and downs in all emotions regarding progress in "the struggle." We sometimes feel as if the masses of African People may never get it together. There there are the other times when we feel that major strides toward "freedom" are just around the corner. Presently, any of Us are understandably ambivalent about the current wave of Blackness among larger numbers of Our folks.

Some of us do not believe that future victory is necessarily

aided by periodic upsurges around Black pride, African History, demands (requests) for respect, or reactions to racism. We should only expect to win through a well organized, calculated and sustained effort which manifests enough force to supersede the complex of forces which produce Our lack of Self-determination and genocide.

Appearances, even Our own, are often misleading. Individual action, including dress, talk and attendance at events, does not represent participation in the process required for Our movements success in the long

run. Such action does not even indicate an individual's recognition of the process. All off the things We do entail personal motives, regardless of how "Afro-centric," and should not be mistaken for the probability of consistent, long-term, effective movement work./

"We must do something!"
This expresses the psychological need to get one's s__t off. What ever We feel motivated to do stems more from a combination of factors impacting on Our physical, mental and spiritual states at that time, and far less on prerequisites of Our victory.

To often, We're not even clear on what victory is. A case in point is Our perpetual preoccupation with racism. Whether We associate the word with prejudice and discrimination, or we define it in the context of an ability to exploit people, the attention given to racism clouds Our recognition of the basic issue shaping the situation of African people in the world today.

That situation is the lack of Self-determination resulting from the tremendous and forceful disruption of African People's

historical development. Any wide-spread mistreatment dealt against members of one group is based upon the ability of other to act that way. We expend too much energy focusing on what others do to or say about Us, and not enough energy on eventually eliminating the powerlessness that makes Us subject to other people's attitudes, sections and agendas. We must re-establish Our history, and not remain simply an addendum in someone else's historical process. We must achieve Power and Total Liberation from all foreign (as well as any internal) exploitation of human by human, or continue to be threatened with genocide as victims of any and everything. Therefore, to be treated nicer or more respectfully, while it may feel good, would not alter the fundamental problem.

Returning to the topic of feeling... standing up and being heard may make Us feel better. Telling "them" about themselves in an articulate and/or well documented manner may make Us feel good. Marching, rallying, talking bad, or issuing warnings or ultimatums, or otherwise displaying outrage may make Us feel important... all of this and more, often done in the name of struggle.

But, even if the pursuit of immediate satisfaction leads to a beneficial action right now, or tomorrow morning (or a few minutes from now, for that matter). There are always things to be done which We want to do, that sound good, which, however, do not need to be done, or worse need to "not" be done. Feelings fluctuate and are usually not in optimum positions to serve

Our long term goal at given points in time. And it's normal for people to tend towards doing what We feel like doing. The advancement of Our cause, therefore, can not depend upon the motivations of individuals separately responding to factors outside Our influence.

On what, then does the advancement of Our cause depend? We need a sound, clear ideology which affirms what We should be about, in connection to who We are, what the deal is (and has been), and what We intend to ultimately achieve. We need step by step planning around obtaining Our goals, reflecting the most accurate, up-to-date information available. And. we coordinated in carrying out Our plans.

All of this requires systematic thinking and problem

solving, of which We need to cultivate a greater supply. For example, some of Us say, "What We need is economics." Or, "What We need is Our own Schools," etc. Ideas about building needed institutions obviously are not new. But, how often do We develop the analyses to explain why certain efforts failed in the past, and to guide Us in doing things more successfully. Effective struggle demands well thought out theories which are to be tested in practice, and not tired movement rhetoric, or fads.


We who are students of Scientific African Nationalism endeavors to better understand, conform to, and further the process of a logical approach to Black Liberation. To Our fellow activists in the struggle: prepare to have many apparent truths challenged.

will be present in that area on a regular basis.

Mr. Crinnon explained the new security systems, some of which have been installed. For example, panic buttons are present in the Harris Building and they are directly connected to the main security office. Calls may be answered twenty-four hours daily. Future projects will include, emergency telephone systems, whereby security may be contacted with the touch of a button; improved lighting in North and South campus, and a state-of-the art system where cards will be used to allow easy access to the Aaron Davis Hall. This new system will enable dance students to enter the building on weekends or late at night.

In ending the meeting, Mr.Dandridge made a special appeal to all students to report all incidents of assault, even if they appear minor.


All Negroes Should Protect Africa

stringent, great emphasis has been placed on the need to have the entire population of City College fully protected from mumps, rubella and measles, which again is on the uprise. Tuberculosis (TB), another highly communicable disease, is also increasing rapidly. Tests for exposure to TB will be conducted at the health fair.

Concerning the question as to whether any complications may arise from being given a second dosage of any specific vaccination, Mr.Payton stated that there is no evidence that such has

most painful diseases that ails the human body. Ulcers are open sores on the skin or mucous membrane. Ulcers are most commonly associated with the gastrointestinal tract, but in reality they can occur anywhere in or on the body. The location of the ulcer can be determined from the name. For example, corneal ulcer is the ulceration of the eye region. Varicose ulcer is the ulceration of varicose veins. Ulcerations are generally caused by continuous irritation-as in bedsores which are also considered ulcers- or by undue stress- as in ulcerative colitis.

Gastrointestinal Ulcerations

Within the digestive tract there is a large array of ulcers that

ever happened; therefore, for the sake of safety and of having an updated immunization record, there is no harm in having a second dosage.

Evidence has shown that about 1 in every 10 persons who has received only one of two vaccines against measles have contracted the disease.

Considering that the city has two epidemics on its hands, it should be in the interest of every student to be fully immunized for the sake of him/herself and fellow students.

can occur. Peptic ulcers in the esophagus, stomach and duodenum are the most frequent. Peptic ulcers are a result of enzymatic- primarily hydrochloric acid- erosion of the digestive tissue. Peptic ulcers are most commonly due to stress and poor dietary habits. Hemorrhagingbleeding-, abdominal pain, vomiting and nausea are among the symptoms associated with peptic ulcers. If abdominal pain is recurrent, this may be an indication of continued bleeding, perforation, or that the ulcer has failed to heal. In the case a broken ulcer, perforation or bleeding into the gut, leads to the poisoning of the blood and body. poisoning is termed peritinisis . Peptic ulcers occur most frequently in the stomach and the duodenum and less frequently in A large the esophagus. percentage of stomach ulcerations can be cancerous, therefore early detection is vital.

Peptic ulcers should be treated with care. Persons with peptic ulcers should avoid pepper or spicy foods, fried foods, and alcohol (including wine and beer). Meats should be avoided, if not the skin should be removed. Anything that produces hydrochloric acid should be eliminated from the diet. Bran, grits, Cream of Wheat, and oats are some of the recommended foods for roughage. Tigermet, malox, mineral oil, milk and molantin are antacids which sooth the ulcerated region. Most of all stress control is necessary.

Ulcerative Colitis

Ulcerative colitis, as its name indicates, is the ulceration of the colon. It occurs mainly in the upper and lower regions of the colon. The symptoms include continual excrement, loose bowels, bleeding, inflammation of the colon area, and pain during bowel movement. The primary cause of ulcerative colitis is stress. John Douglas Dulles suffered from a severe case of ulcerative colitis due to the stress endured in the process of striving until the age of 63 to gain the title of Secretary of State.

Ulcerative colitis, like peptic ulcers, can be cancerous and again early detection is vital. Cancerous ulcerative colitis requires the removal of the infected region. In some instances a colostomy- the

artificial forming of an anal opening- is necessary. Some doctors find it necessary to place patients with ulcerative colitis on special diets and relaxation therapy. Foods like cream of wheat (without butter) give bulk with out being harsh on the colon.

Varicose Ulcers

Varicose veins have been found to be due to inherited physical structure as well as poor circulation. Veins, since they do not have the elasticity of the arteries, become stretched or varicose and they remain stretched. Varicose ulceration is the rupturing of varicose veins. Varicose ulcers can be treated by using bandaging, antibiotics, and in more severe cases vascular surgery (venous striping). The process of venous stripping requires that the vein is drained and cut from the groin to the ankle. The saphenous vein is then removed. Although the procedure does take a long time to heal, the vein that is removed in not missed by the body. Tributaries form to replace the function of the removed vein. Although vascular surgery is one of the recommended treatments of varicose veins and varicose ulceration, it is only recommended when the vein is located in certain regions.

Prevention

Ulcers are caused by a variety of circumstances. The most common are stress and poor dietary habits. The old saying 'prevention is better than cure' is the key to health. Instead of grabbing a bite to eat, take the time to sit and have a healthy meal that will enable to avoid those common diseases that slow you down. Instead of rushing to all those seemingly important things that you never have enough time to do, take the time to relax. You may find that while you are relaxing you can plan effective time management maneuvers that will give you time to do all the things you have to do, while maintaining your health. Remember ulcers not only eat away at the body but also at a productive life.

The Brooklyn Boycott Lives!

On January 18,1990 a Haitian woman was beaten at a vegetable market on Church Avenue in the Flatbush area of Brooklyn-- home to the largest African American and Caribbean American community in the United States. The owner claimed that she had stolen from form his store, but her bags contained only meat purchased at another store. A crowd of people quickly gathered outside the store, which is owned by a Korean family and a boycott was organized which has lasted until now.

The political establishment and the corporate-owned media say the boycott of the Family Red Apple grocery store should end. Elected officials (including New York City's mayor, David Dinkins), have crossed the peoples' picket line! They accuse the Black Community of "going to far" and of being "racist." Judges have issued orders forcing the picketers further and further from the store; some demonstrators have been arrested.

The fact is that the boycott is not anti-Korean. There are many Korean-owned businesses in the city; often they are located in the Black community, and while racial abuse occurs in some of them-- and they are boycotted (some have closed down as a result- Nostrand Avenue boycott)-most have a decent relationship with their neighbors and customers.

The fact is that the boycott is not about Black people being racist towards Korean people. It is a protest against the failure of elected officials to attend to or to allow the community to attend to the economic and social needs of the African American community, which they have abandoned, a community which has no political representation. It is a protest against the absolute failure to give any economic representation to the people of Flatbush, or to any of our Black and Latino communities.

What started out as a protest against a single racial incident has exploded into a life and death struggle for the empowerment of a community which is insisting on its right to use the economic weapon of the boycott, forged by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in Montgomery, Alabama thirty-four years ago, to defend itself from economic genocide. Economic Independence is the key to the survival of any society. The Boycott Lives.

Organization of African Peoples Participation in Technology (O.F.A.P.P.I.T) by Johnny Pugh


On Tuesday October 23, 1990 at NAC room 1/211 there was a symposium honoring Dr. Obraga, Director of Industrial Technology, and his colleagues Prof. Fubareq Captain Tooji, Mr. Asem of the Ministry of Science and Technology of the Federal Republic of Nigeria at Lagos. This symposium was a positive outlet for those students who desire to go into technology and science, and develop opportunities for Africans in America and abroad.



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
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STUDENT CULTURAL EXCHANGE HONOR
