ELECTION SCANNING

an you recall the shock the nation felt during the 2000 presidential election between Al Gore and current President, George W. Bush? Many felt the outcome was unfair for a number of reasons, but one of the larger issues of that election concerned disenfranchised voters and other irregularities with thousands of ballots. In that election, Florida's Supreme Courts determined the winner, not the voters. This became extremely controversial because the people who ultimately determined the outcome of that election were closely linked to President Bush and many individuals felt they handed him the election.

History always seems to repeat itself and although much has changed since that controversial election, much has remained the same and some of issues that affected the 2000 presidential election, appears to have compromised City College's recent election. On May 2-4th, City College held its first

On May 2-4th, City College held its first online Undergraduate Student Elections.

The candidates were Iqbal Mahamud who ran under the Diversity slate, Leon Abbo AAA's candidate and Chike Ukaegbu, City Unity's candidate.

The election was riddled with flaws. Deciding to move the voting process online without educating or informing voters about that sweeping change was just one of the problems. In addition, the elections were administered without any supervision in unregulated environments, which could have precipitated foul play on several fronts. Furthermore, many voters where not allowed the opportunity to vote due to a hitch linked to the registration process. This detail alone disenfranchised many potential voters, and it serves as a reminder to the many schisms displayed in the past two national elections.

To top all of that, the election's governing body, the Student Election Review Committee (SERC), will not certify the recent elections due to alleged claims of fraudulent activities committed by Iqbal Mahamud, the candidate with the majority

of votes. The charges claim that online registration was open to a hacker who accessed students email accounts and fraudulently cast 41 ballots, amongst other charges. Coincidentally, those ballots were made from a computer located within the student government office where Mahamud and others serves as a rep.

Another oddity involving this election is the tightly linked associations between some members of SERC and members of the AAA slate. Several of the candidates who ran for office feel that their association raises issues about their ability to arbitrate this matter objectively.

Gabbidon, O'Lanso, a member of SERC states that student elections will be redone in during the fall semester this September.

Mahamud states, "I have not committed any fraudulent act and this is not fair."

Thus far, Mahamud claims that no evidence has been furnished that unequivocally links him to any wrongdoing and he is totally shocked by the charges. He also states that everything said so far is only hearsay.

THE IMMIGRATION DEBATE

n the 1st of May, 2006, the passions of the immigration movement climaxed in what was termed "A Day without Immigrants". The event entailed that immigrants across the country stay home from school, work and refrain from buying or selling. The boycott aim was to show Congress and America, the might of the immigrant population in the United States. The boycott was accompanied with a series of marches across the country. In New York City, the march was held at Union Square. The May 1st boycott was the extension of marches held around the country on April 10th. The April marches drew hundreds of thousands of immigrants around the country.

Like its predecessor, the march on May Day targeted the HR 4437 bill which was passed by the House of Representatives in December. The bill, which is stalled in the Senate, would make illegal immigrants and their sympathizers, felons. Ever since, the immigration population has taken to the streets in a show of solidarity for the cause of humane

immigration reform. There are an estimated 12 million illegal immigrant in the United States. Thus the impact of HR 4437 is sure to be felt throughout the immigrant population.

The May 1st march and boycott comprised a total of 1 million legal and illegal immigrants.

Across the country from L.A to Chicago, D.C to New York, immigrants set out to instigate change by sending a clear message to Congress, *Legalization not Criminalization*. Around the county the move emptied immigrant neighborhoods, closing businesses and filling streets. Estimates placed the march at 400,000 in Chicago and tens of thousands in New York. Altogether millions took part in making it truly "A Day without Immigrant".

Though the protestors were predominantly Latino, there was ample representation from other immigrant groups as well. Many political analysts have argued that the rallies may have a counter effect on Congress. Immigrants' attempt to show their Americanization may be undermined by the overrepresentation of their differing nationalities. In addition, the boycott might challenge the standing among opposing figures who may view the actions as impudent. Still, the solidarity among immigrants cannot be brushed off. The boycott called attention to the immigrant's place in America. Surely the millions of immigrants that made May 1st "A Day without Immigrants" are a force to be reckoned.8.



OP-ED AID BLACK MEN - HOW ABOUT FIXING THE BOYS?

In the March 2006 issue of *The Paper* there was an article that revealed the City University of New York (CUNY) created a task force to aid Black Men. As a Black male, I applaud such efforts; however I am very skeptical about the success of this program since there are so many issues plaguing black men outside of academia. However, I feel programs dedicated to help boys become men would be more beneficial so society.

About three years ago, Medgar Evers College (MEC), whose student body is about 20 percent male, established a program aimed at recruiting and retaining black males What could be described as a freshman seminar course was divided into two semesters. The first part focuses on academic necessities such as study skills, enhancing interpersonal skills, learning critical thinking and balancing the demands of academic and social responsibilities. The second part focuses on problem solving skills in written and oral _expression. This synopsis taken directly from MEC's website sounds pretty ambitious and I praise them for taking the lead in the CUNY system, but I do have some concerns about the viability of the

First and foremost, college is not for everybody. Accepting marginal students only complicates matters. Higher education is not a right; it's a privilege for those who can do the work. If there are some marginal students that exhibit potential then let them demonstrate their abilities in the community colleges. If they earn the associates degree in satisfactory standing and wish to further their education then I will personally greet them with open arms. If they are unsuccessful, then it's quite obvious that col-

lege is not for everybody. According to the report, "Leaving Boys Behind: Public High School Graduation Rates," conducted by the Manhattan Institute, only 59 percent of African-American girls in New York State received their diploma in 2003. Their male counterparts stood with less than half at 49 percent. In the nation's 100 largest school districts, New York City - the pool which CUNY draws a majority of their student body, has the third lowest overall graduation rate, at 43 percent. The graduation rate for African-American boys is 33 percent. I'll contend that all surveys have some flaws but the fact remains that students who are ill prepared to deal with the academic rigors of high school are probably not suitable for higher education. Granted, there are indeed a few that buck the odds but those numbers pale to the reality that a majority will not succeed. Fact is work needs to be done at the grammar, middle and high school levels, which are the responsibility of the New York City Department of Education and not an institution of higher learning. The foundation for success at any academic level starts at home.

I've had the opportunity to converse with several educators at the grammar school level and they all echo the sentiments that no politician will dare say. The real education begins at home. Teachers can only do but so much and if the parents are not going to reinforce their child's education at home, then half the battle is already lost. One teacher recalled when one of her 4th grade students came to school with a different pair of new tennis shoes for a week but failed to bring a pencil much less the required assignments.Parents are continuously dumping their responsibility on the public school system and now higher education wants to absorb these issues? This doesn't make any sense. Parents need to share in the accountability of the education of their child. The external challenges, aside from substandard parenting facing black males are; the general obsession to immediate gratification, lack of sufficient role models other than athletes and rappers who promote individualism, materialism and excess and, the belief among black youth that an education and expanding ones knowledge is associated with being white. I want to be optimistic, however there are a number of issues that must be addressed and I strongly believe higher education is not a right but a privilege, where the only requirement (aside from finances) is that you demonstrate you can do the work. There are too many of these policy makers making decisions that fail to realize this. When you analyze the situation in reverse, you're inevitably punishing the individuals that went through the necessary channels and have taken the steps to get into

Young black males have the most difficult obstacles to overcome in America but some of these hurdles are self-inflicted, such as the mainstream use of a certain racial epithet. Though I have identified a number of issues that contributed to the plight of the young black male, there are slew, which I haven't addressed such as institutionalized racism. Indeed this is a tragedy and someday I hope a resolution is discovered but I seriously doubt the answer lies in higher education. You do not need a college education to become useful and a productive citizen in society. Wanting to achieve success in education is similar to a marriage. Both require commitment and drive that come from within, something that should be instilled from day one. Comedian Damon Wayans once quipped during a stand up routine, "I'd rather have my son be an out-of-touch nerd, than some cool mutherf***r in jail." This is something that young black men need to think about.

CCNY TOPS MODEL UN FOR THIRD STRAIG

EW YORK, May 10, 2006 - The City College of New York's dominance in the annual model UN continues: For the third year running, CCNY took top honors at the National Model United Nations (NMUN) Conference held last month at the United Nations and Marriott Marquis hotel in New York. City was one of 15 institutions to receive an "Outstanding Delegation" award, the equivalent of a gold medal, in the 2006 competition. which attracted 240 colleges and universities from five continents. Junior Kathleen Thomas and sophomore Jessica Sell, both majoring in International Studies, served as Head Delegates for the 15-member CCNY contingent. "It's the depth of our diversity that makes our team so unique and strong," said Ms. Thomas just one of five Americans in the City College delegation. "We come from different backgrounds and cultures, but of course, we also work extremely

hard." Other CCNY participants came from the Caribbean, Europe, Asia and Latin America. The CCNY team represented the Bahamas in the competition and prepared for the conference by studying the island nation's position on a number of international issues."The students prepared for 45 different topics including HIV/AIDS, disarmament, terrorism, human rights, development and the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction," said CCNY Assistant Professor of Political Science Isidro Medina, the team's Faculty Advisor, who taught the students how to research and debate the topics.In addition, Professor Medina, who teaches a "Model UN" class, which the students took before the conference, took the team to the Bahamian Mission to the United Nations in Manhattan for a briefing on how the country votes on the issues. "The students did the research and defended Bahamas' positions on the issues very well," he proudly noted. Two of the CCNY envoys, Ms. Sell and International Studies junior Jeanette Mitchell, who graduated from high school in Trinidad and Tobago, were on last year's team. The other 2006 CCNY delegates were (major and homeland in parenthesis): Freshman Alvin Bradbury (International Studies/Jamaica); junior Joylyn Beresford (International Studies/Guyana); sophomore Mario Patino (International Studies/Colombia); Reuben Zorilla (International iunior Studies/Dominican Republic); sophomore Frisch (International Studies-History/United States). Freshman Annie Durang Deng (Chemistry/China); sophomore Javier Smith (Engineering/Puerto Rico); senior (Political Science-Lauren Fasano English/United States); senior Josela Reales (Psychology-Political Science/Panama); junior Elyse Kreuser (International Studies-History/dual France-Germany); senior Ana Vlahov (Economics/Croatia) and senior Daniel

Sherman (Political Science/United States) NMUN, which is organized by the National Collegiate Conference Association, a non-governmental organization of the United Nations, is the world's largest university-level simulation of the United Nations. Every year, the conference educates more than 3,200 students (50% from outside the United States) about the United Nations and other contemporary international issues. Other American universities represented during the five-day conference included Pace University, Brigham Young University, University of Miami, Georgia State University, Syracuse University, Florida International University, University of Denver, University of California at Los Angeles and University of Colorado. The international participants included universities from Canada, Guyana, Mexico, Venezuela, Germany, England, France, Italy, Sweden, China, Korea, Japan, and the Philippines.

Op-Ed You Can't Fool All The People All The Time!

emocracy remains the most persistent and recurring challengeof our time. One thing for certain is that democracy requires participation; and on May 4th City College students declared their participation by casting approximately 1350 votes over the internet during this year's student government elections. This was the first time in the history of the school that the internet was used to facilitate voting. While this sudden and unannounced change in procedure seems to have had good intentions of accommodating students and increasing participation, the total number of votes decreased since last year's elections. The 2006 elections made history for several reasons, and will continue to provoke questions concerning the motives and effects of the changes in procedure.

There were three slates/teams vying for positions during this year's elections: AAA, a slate that has dominated the student government for the last three years; City Unity, a new slate launched a year ago, and Diversity, a newly formed slate. The results of the elections were astounding. Iqbal Mahamud from the Diversity slate came out on top as the President elect, wining by 62 votes. City Unity won four of the nine executive seats, and AAA won four executive seats, with three of the four wining by default since they had no contenders. Nevertheless, the results demonstrated that a radical change in power was eminent. Unfortunately, this change may never become a reality because the Student Elections Review Committee (SERC) denied certification, and declared the results null and void due to alleged fraudulent misconduct.

SERC is responsible for overseeing the entire student democratic process, and is comprised of faculty, staff, and student members. Currently the two known student representatives on the committee are Roberto Gordillo and Tahmeed Ahmad. Roberto Gordillo has been the Chair of the committee for the last three years, and Tahmeed Ahmad is the current student Ombudsman who won his position as a AAA member during the 2005 elections. These gentlemen played a part in the decision to invalidate this year's election results, based on an investigation that was prompted by student complaint. SERC claims that several students reported that they were unable to vote, because the voting system had already registered their votes. Following an investigation, SERC found that 46 votes were cast from a computer in the student government's office, which is a major violation of the election rules. SERC also claims to have the testimony of three students who accuse Iqbal Mahmud (Diversity President elect) of misconduct.

The extent and nature of the students' testimonies, and the claims made by SERC cannot be verified because SERC has yet to publish the minutes from past meetings. Although the committee is still in discussion, the elections remain uncertified and the entire Diversity slate has been disqualified with Iqbal Mahmud facing possible disciplinary hearing. These punitive actions taken by SERC demands a thorough investigation of all allegations and the corresponding evidence related to them. While no evidence has been published to support the claims made against the Diversity slate, the judgment has been made.

What we do know for a fact is that SERC made three major adjustments to the elections procedures this year. First, by changing the election days from April to May, SERC violated Article II of the Charter for Governance, which states that Senators should be elected during the month of April. Second, by reducing 50% of the total amount of money slates could spend on their campaigns (from \$500 to \$250), SERC limited the participants' abilities to campaign effectively. And Third, SERC approved internet voting with full recognition that it required the use of a CCNY e-mail address, and fully knowing that most City College student do not use their CCNY e-mail addresses. In consideration of these facts, as conscientious students, we are forced to examine the timing for these procedural changes and their relevance.

SERC's purpose is to supervise and facilitate the student electoral process, while providing policies for efficiency and maximum participation. Is it then a coincidence that their actions on face value seems to be contrary to their true purpose? Or, did the committee have

legitimate reasons for making the elections closer to final exams, limiting the individual slates' ability to campaign effectively by reducing their funds, and alienating students from the process by using the internet? Beyond the committee's intentions, a more ominous assessment revolves around the manifestations of their actions. Why did SERC declare the elections null and void? Why was the entire Diversity slate disqualified? And why is Iqbal Mahmud facing possible disciplinary hearing? In attempting to answer these questions, we can make one of two speculations. First, we may assert that the actions by SERC are merely unfortunate coincidences, which were done in the best interest for participation and integrity. Second, we may cautiously assert that SERC suspiciously changed the electoral rules, and subsequently nullified the election results in serving the interests of particular individuals. Whatever the case may be, it is reasonable to conclude that the entire SERC electoral process needs a full investigation and revi-

When we consider the fact that Student Government possesses the greatest power we have as students, we cannot be complacently ignorant of the process involved with electing its membership. Rather, we must be increasingly vigilant and committed to ensuring the most effective process for elections, while catering to the greatest potential for integrity. In light of the fact that enrollment has decreased for students of African ancestry, and in memory of the struggles that opened the doors of City College for today's minority students, we who remain possess the mounting responsibility for those who follow. Hence, the time is at hand for us to come together in city unity, and support the brave among us who stand up against injustice knowing the potential consequences. Let us give Iqbal Mahmud our full support during this very uncertain time, and seek always to be empowered by the conviction of truth and justice. In the words of Bob Marley,

"YOU CAN FOOL SOME PEO-PLE SOME TIME, BUT YOU CAN'T FOOL ALL THE PEOPLE ALL THE TIME, SO NOW YOU SEE THE LIGHT, STAND UP FOR YOUR RIGHT!"

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
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Young Gifted & Black





The Jamaican born MFA student Marlene Smalling has graced the gallery space at IRADAC (The Institute for Research on the African Diaspora) with her one-woman show Mother and Daughter. The show exudes a power that reflects the indescribable bond between mother and child. The use of shrouded images leave to the imagination of the viewer what is taking place beneath the precisely folded fabric that encapsulates the two linked figures. What exist is known only to the artist but is open to the imagination of the observer. The bond that exists between mother and daughter is not visible to the naked eye; that which holds a child to its mother creates a bond intrigicattely intertwined is shrouded in illusion and mystery.

Imagery is the driving force behind her work. Smalling was influenced by Greek mythology and Western Religion to create her shrouded images that focus on the mysterious and universal connective bond between mother and daughter.


"In my most recent works, which consist of mostly oils on canvas and wire sculptures, I am depicting shrouded images that initially represents my experience of motherhood. These images then recalls the Madonna and Child, the Pieta and other similarly iconic effect. I usually pose with my daughter, covered with beautifully crinkled sheets that hide our faces and bodies that serve to heighten the sense of drama and mystery. The sheets have a Tran formative effect and began to take on a monumental and sculptural appearance, enhancing the sense of religious iconography."

"Greek myths such as Demeter and Persephone, is one of the most profound and important myths for me because it celebrates the relationship between mother and daughter and the primary aspects of life - the great mystery contained in the processes of birth, growth, death and regeneration, which the pair governs."

The artist choice of a Madonna and Child figure as a model suggest the absence of a father the bond is strictly one-sided. The use of the color red in three paintings is in shocking contrast to the black and white of the other pictures. The shrouded figure in three painting uses the persimmon to suggest fertility, which is explored in the other paintings of this series.

The artist selected Bobby McFadden's "Twenty Third Psalm" which continuously plays in the background, this and the lighting serves to catapult the viewer into another time and space. The show must be viewed more than once for the audience to truly get the total effect of this new emerging artist.

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Life, Sex and Education

ublic health issues, specifically HIV testing has been on the rise in recent years. There are slogans such as BET's 'Rap-it-Up' and the NYC Public Health Education Department (NYC Dept. of Health) slogan 'Test Early, Live Longer', all advocating and encouraging people to get tested. Millions of dollars and people's time are being spent educating others on HIV testing, yet for some reason millions of people are infected each year. If all this time and money are being invested to advertise HIV testing, why is it people still not getting the message? According to Gwendolyn Wilson, Supervisor of Public Health Education with the Department of Health of New York City, fear is the number one reason why people are not getting tested.

One thing people are fearful of is being discriminated against and disowned by their family. Worries of revealing their sexuality to their family prevents them from getting tested. It can be very difficult for teen boys tell their family that they are gay or for married men to tell their wives they have to wear condoms. To them, disclosing this type of information to their family can equal loss and that's a loss they essentially don't want to take.

HIV 'positive thinking' is another reason why people aren't getting tested. They already believe they're positive and are fearful their belief will become a reality. Wilson stated "sometimes, they know the probability that they are infected is great, so their rationale is I'm already positive so why take test if I'm going to die anyway? These types of people are usually promiscuous; don't always practice safe sex, abuse intravenous drugs, and/or homeless". Too many times people let their personal beliefs hinder them from finding the truth. The

only way to know if you are 'positive' is to GET TESTED!

Shifts in attitudes have also stalled the testing rates for HIV. Since, HIV/AIDS was first announced to the world in the early 1980's up until today, testing rates has steadily decreased. On the contrary, HIV/AIDS infection rates have progressively increased.

It is Wilson's belief that the rate of HIV testing is also steadfastly declining because of people's mind-set concerning the disease. She stated "because of medical advances, some people are not taking the disease seriously despite the deadly consequences". In today's day and age, you can just take 1-2 pills daily instead of the normal cocktail of 27 pills. "HIV is not taken as seriously, because they know that if they are positive medication will help them live longer so they aren't as concerned. HIV is there, but it's not really there".

HIV/AIDS is no longer a "gay disease". Everyone is being infected and at alarming rates. Your parents, siblings, friends, professors, you, meeverybody and anybody can be and are being infected. The lat-

est statistics put forth by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's website (www.cdc.gov) shows that in 2004 over 12,000 new infections were from heterosexual contact, over 18,000 from MSM sexual contact and over 5,000 from intravenous drug use. Data from the Department of Health Public Library suggest that people from the ages of 13-29 have the highest infection rate. The infection rate disparity among different ethnicities is alarming. According to international AIDS charity Avert (www.avert.org), the number of people infected with HIV for 2004 are Whites 11,806; Blacks 19,206; Hispanics 6, 970; Asian 394 and

American Indian 208. With all the attention given to HIV/AIDS awareness these types of disparities are mind-boggling.

An explanation for those disparities could be the various definitions as to what is sex and what is not sex. It should be known that HIV/AIDS could be transmitted sexually 4 different ways. The first is orally. Antibodies in precum and blood from gum disease can easily transmit the disease from the mouth to the penis (vice versa) and, the mouth to the vagina (vice versa). The second is anally. During anal sex the rectum can bleed giving HIV a gateway to be transmitted. The third way is through fingering. Undetected cuts on the fingers when inserted to the vagina or rectum can also be a transmitter of HIV. The fourth and last way HIV can be sexually transmitted is through intercourse. Unprotected intercourse has the highest risk rate of sexually transmitting HIV. To many,

testing in high schools across for Chlamydia and Gonorrhea. Although, it does not specifically target HIV/AIDS it is a valuable resource that provides young people with information and an alternative to their family doctor. Education has improved testing rates, but education has to start in the home. Parents need to be more open and honest with their children from an earlier age. School them as to what's out there, so they will be armed with the knowledge needed to make wise decisions.

Immediate test results have also improved testing rates. Now you don't have to wait 2 weeks for test results. They can be given back in as little as 8 hours. The wait time is shortened and the 2 weeks of worrying is no longer necessary. This can have its drawbacks. "Since the results are so quick, people don't have time to think about their reaction if the results are pos-





oral, anal and fingering are not considered sex because there is no penetration. So, many participate in these types of sexual activities without use of protection and in-turn only using protection for actual intercourse.

With all that is being done is increase HIV testing awareness; people are still being infected too frequently. Something has to be done to increase testing. Wilson stated education is the key. Along with many other programs the NYC Dept. of Health has many programs that are aimed at improving HIV/AIDS awareness, for example the Pilot Project whose slogan reads "Test Early, Live Longer". The Pilot Project

itive, and a lot of time when positive results yield suicidal behaviors", said Wilson. Bottom line is, HIV/AIDS along with countless other sexually transmitted dieses (STD) are out there and will probably be out there for countless years to come. If you love the air you breathe don't take part in careless behaviors that will make you vulnerable to HIV/AIDS and other STD's. Protect yourself! Practice safe sex, don't use drugs and stay informed, educated and aware of your surroundings. If not, your actions will have you feeling like it's your judgment day as you sit in a clinic's waiting room anxiously anticipating your test results.

Nuestro Himno: Our Anthem

Spanish version of the national anthem has recently emerged on Spanish radio stations. The Anthem is entitled, *Nuestro Himno* which when translated means "Our Anthem". The song is appears on the album *Somos Americano* which features musical artists Pitbull, Wyclef Jean, Poncé and Olga Tañón. While the gist of *Nuestro Himno* is identical to the Star Spangled Banner, the words are different. The anthem has had much airplay on Spanish radio stations drawing critics from all around.

The "Star-Spangled Banner" was written in 1814 by Francis Scott Key. Key was inspired from the war of 1812's battle at Fort McHenry in Baltimore. Some Americans believe that the new version of the anthem disrespects the legacy of the Star Spangled Banner. Among them is the great grandson of Francis Scott Key, Charles Key. President Bush has also opposed the song, saying, "I think people who want to be a citizen of this country ought to learn English. And they ought to learn to sing the anthem in English."

Many believe that the song uses the national anthem to push the immigration agenda. They may not be far from the truth. Adam Kidron, the producer, claims the version was written for the immigrant movement. In addition, the Associated Press states that a new remix version of the song is scheduled to be released in June. The new song will include a few English lines that specifically address the immigration issues of the nation, calling for immigration reform.

Biology major, Jessica Sano, a native of the Dominican Republic stated, "I am a very patriotic person. I wouldn't like people to come to my country and change my national anthem. [Immigrants] want rights but changing the national anthem is going too far." The question of conformity to the United States has always been an issue facing new immigrants. In the past, immigrant groups have tried to adopt the Star Spangled Banner in German, French and Yiddish. How much of their own lives should new immigrants be willing to give up in order to be part of a united nation? The song was used during the civil war for inspiration and courage on both Union and Confederate sides. It is this same ability of the Star spangled Banner to inspire and encourage that moves immigrants to use the song in their plight for humane immigration laws. Still, for many, Nuestro Himno remains merely their individual way of paying tribute to the land they call home.

Update on Anti Bear Hunt Court Case

n December 10, I was arrested during a demonstration against the New Jersey black bear hunt. I walked around a barricade and, in an act of civil disobedience, refused to go back behind it. An hour later, five others also were arrested for similar behavior. In late April, our court case was finally concluded—at least rural Vernon, where the bear hunt occurred. The judge pronounced us guilty of interfering with the functions of the police.

After the judge declared us guilty—but before he handed down the specific sentence—he gave us a chance to say something on our own behalf. I began reading a brief statement, but the prosecutor objected that it was political, and the judge told me to stop. I explained that I wanted to convey my thoughts and, besides, I only had three sentences left to read. In a resigned tone, the judge said, "Go ahead." My statement was:

"My actions on December 10 were peaceful attempts to call attention to a moral principle—the need to respect the worth and dignity of all living beings.

"Black bears have not caused the death of any human in New Jersey for 150 years. But because real estate development encroaches on their territories, they are coming into conflict with humans and have sometimes become a nuisance. In response, the Division of Fish and Wildlife has authorized bear hunts, killing over 600 bears in three years. In other words, it has put human convenience—people's right not to be bothered—above the bears' very lives.

"If we want to be humane people, it's not enough to be humane toward our own kind. We must start showing full respect for the other species who also live on this Earth." As I was walking back, the judge asked, "Feel the same way about deer?" I replied, "Yes, all living beings.

The prosecutor said that after hearing my statement, the judge should impose the maximum fine of \$1,000. But the judge fined each of us \$505. (Without jail time) However, because there are questions about the legality of the barricade, our lawyer has filed an appeal with the New Jersey Superior Court. So this story isn't over yet.



CCNY Sports Round Up



ohn Jay College defeated the CCNY Beavers 12-3. The CSI Baseball Complex on the campus of the College of Staten Island hosted the semifinals of the CUNYAC Tournament. The Beavers' Darlyn Nunez was tagged for 10 runs on six hits and walked four in 5 1/3 innings. magine a world where the "Terminator" was the president of the United States. Well, if Sen. Orin Hatch, R-Utah gets his way this could


