Many students feel that the School of Engineering should keep Afsar on the staff "because he cares about students and helps

According to some of the

Engineering resent Afsar's approach to teaching. They feel he allows too great a number of students the opportunity to successfully complete his courses, as opposed to their apporach, where at least 50 percent of the enrolled students either fail or are dropped from the course.

The dropout rate in engineering courses is frightfully high, especially in the electrical engineering classes. Some of them start with more than 150 students and finish with less than 70. And of the ones left, many get an F or D.

As Associate Dean of Engineering in charge of academic advisement for every department, Shee-Ming Chen meets every day with an average of 35 students who need help

because of various academic problems. His office is overwhelmed by the amount of students who need help.

"This office only has two people, myself and Professor Lehrenbaum, who is in charge of academic warnings," said Chen. "We talk to students and we try to advise them on what to do to remain in good standing.'

Last June, close to 800 undergraduate students in the Engineering Department were on academic probation because of their grade point average. When taking into account the other types of probation, remedial,

KAT, Dop and the like, close to 50 percent of the undergraduates studying engineering were on probation, according to Dean

He also pointed out that the rate of students on probation diminishes as they approach graduation. "Students on remedial probation are usually on the pre-engineering level," Chen said. "We try to advise them to take care of their problems. We also notify them by mail."

Nursing Prof. Reappointed **After Student Protests**

After student protests, and a "in-house" investigation, the college has reappointed a popular nursing professor after she was dismissed by the school for failing to meet its academic requirements.

Professor E. James, who was reinstated by the college earlier this month, has taught nursing at CCNY for eight years, and was promoted from instructor to assistant professor in 1981. Last fall, she was informed by the their flocks" into cohesive

"Prof. James is not being reappointed as professor of the School of Nursing because of her failure to meet the criteria for tenureship at the school," said Neumann, who talked to The Paper last December."Professor James was an instructor in 1978, and reappointed in 1981 to assistant.

Bishop Tutu Fund Merits Support

Established by Bishop Tutu countries, Bishop Tutu stated, shortly after receiving his Nobel Peace Prize in 1984, the Bishop Desmond Tutu Southern African Refugee Scholarship Fund held its first press conference on October 9, 1985, in New York

At that time, Phelps-Stokes Fund President Franklin Williams announced plans to raise \$1 million to finance approximately 100 Southern Africa refugee students through four years of study at U.S colleges, universities and technical schools.

The program has already selected and placed four students with full scholarships. They include a graduate nursing student at the University of North Carolina, a master's student in special education at N.Y.U., an economics and political science major at Upsala College in New Jersey, and an African Studies specialist in a master's program at Howard University.

A total of 23 scholarships have been donated thus far by institutions around the country. Private corporations and foundations have also recognized the importance of the Scholarship Fund's work through major contributions.

At the October news conference, Bishop Tutu emphasized the urgent need for the scholarship program. "So many of God's children are prevented by the laws of apartheid from attaining their fullest potential," said Tutu. "This program is essential for our future development."

Of the vast number of refugees, most of them young, who are living in surrounding

"They are among South Africa's best and brightest and must be educated to take positions of leadership when the horrors of apartheid have finally been put to rest.

The fund is presently seeking commitments on all levels, but corporate and foundation grants are vital. So too is the support of individuals, churches, community groups, and professional organizations needed to sponsor these students during their stay in the United States. Dramatic Cuts In Proposed Reagan Budget

To all City College students:

On January 5, 1987, President Reagan released his fiscal year 1988 budget proposal for Congressional consideration.

The budget contains dramatic changes for the student aid programs used by thousands of New Yorkers each year to meet their college costs.

Overall, the President's budget would eliminate an estimated 350,000 Federal Awards worth \$500 million for New York students. The Guaranteed Student Loan Program (GSL), the largest financial aid program, would be particularly HURT by proposals to increase interest rates and fees paid by students, and reduce government support provided to lenders and guarantee agencies. The GSL program, which now provides nearly \$760 million annually to New York students, would be reduced by an estimated 45%.

Several other Title IV financial aid programs would be eliminated entirely, and the budget proposes to stiffen (Continued on Page 7)



by Phillippe R. Montas Saturday, February 7, marked the one-year anniversary of the fall of Haitian dictator Jean-Claude Duvalier, who fled mass uprisings in Haiti for the comfort of "golden exile" in France.

Most Haitians at CCNY did not celebrate. Very few did in New York, a marked contrast to the wild and exhuberant rejoicing that marked the hated dictator's downfall.

Virtualy no one celebrated because Haiti is in a quagmire of problems that seem insoluble.

In Haiti, the National Government Council (CNG), declared a holiday even though many people do not work on Saturdays anyway.

Prior to that, according to informed sources, many people were arrested in a continuing campaign by the present government to control popular

The church has been at the fore of recent popular demands for better wages, schools and living conditions. Militant priests have literally "shepered


political entities to demand just and democratic treatment for

On the 7th, Haitian cabdrivers and transport workers held a symbolic strike to show their solidarity to the struggle being waged for a better Haiti.

Criminal incidents are rising alarmingly in Port-Au-Prince, the country's capital. Everday, new stories emerge about people losing their valuables and their lives, sometimes in daring house raids by armed bandits.

Many take advantage of the gripping fear to carry out sinister political strategies while citizens huddle together behind closed doors. Many of the former supporters and officials of the Duvalier regime are still living in Haiti. They are reported to be plotting a return to the "good old days" when they wielded power and earned riches.

"I thought about Haiti that day and I felt sad," said Errol Laraque, an engineering student here at CCNY. "I thought about the rest of the world, and I saw problems everywhere, including

City College's Minority Biomedical Research Support Program has received \$578,438 from the Division of Research Resources of the National Institute of Health.

The Minority Biomedical Program, designed to increase the number of minority students graduate and professional schools, intends to persue research careers in the biomedical sciences.

City College is one of the few institutions which provides broad based support of this kind at the undergraduate level to enrich, motivate and encourage students to enter research careers in the biomedical sciences," said Dr. Myer Fishman, the program director.

Minority Biomedical Research Support Program students participate in research projects which have been approved by the National Institute of Health.

from the City College Public Relations office, the projects involve a variety of subjects including: anti-tumoral agents and environmental pollution.

City College was selected to participate in the National Minority Research Program, now in its eighth year, because of its strong programs in the sciences as well as an historic commitment to educational opportunity and academic excellence.

Tuition is paid for graduate students, and Ph.D. candidates also qualify for additional financial assistance.



(Continued from Page 1) usually too large, and as a result, both students and faculty suffer. Students cannot get the individual attention they need even though most lectures have at least two graduate assistants helping them with the class.

According to some students, they must learn on their own using their own resources and ingenuity because they cannot get help from their professors.

"More sections should be added by either hiring more teachers or offering certain classes in both the fall and spring semester," said Leon Scott, president of the Society of Black Engineers.

According to Dean Chen, students wind up losing whole semesters having to wait for these courses in order to

A prevalent attitude is that Engineering Dept. are not sensitive to their students' needs.

"I believe it is true that some teachers don't care about the needs of the students. They are not sensitive to the students' problems," said Chen. "On any given day, I have to help don't help."

If You Go To One Movie This Year, See "Platoon"

by James Dascoli Platoon

(Orion) Rated-R

Written and Directed by: Oliver Stone

Starring: Tom Berenger, Willem Dafoe, Charlie Sheen, and Kevin Dillon.

Before I write anything else, I'd like to say--see this film. I know that many people might feel that the Vietnam War is a chapter in America's history that is better off put to rest, but the fact remains that there are many questions still left unanswered. Platoon is an ambitious film that gives us answers by plunging us into battle with its young protagonists.

Sure we have had movies

how the war was really like, or so they claim. For the first time we have a film that gives the audience a full view of what the ordinary combat soldier was experiencing in Vietnam. We feel the bugs and the raw earth on our face, unlike the poetic Apocalypse Now or the cartoonlike Rambo.

Cinema is at its best when it takes us places, and shows us things we never would have seen otherwise. This highlyentertaining film does this with startling brutal images that linger in our minds long after the film has ended. Director Oliver Stone, himself a Vietnam veteran, doesn't hold anything

insights and a tense feeling that will make you want to question yourself. (What if I weren't sitting here safe in my seat? What would I do?)

Stone is primarily know for his script for the 1978 film Midnight Express. One look at Platoon and you realize that he has brought another intense story to the screen. There are flawless performances from its three principal actors, Tom Berenger, Willem Dafoe and Charlie Sheen. Sheen is the innocent enlisted man who sees the war close-up for the first time. For example, years ago, blacks and women were forbidden to vote. After changes were made in the constitution, both groups were given the right as changes in the constitution took place.

Changes in the constitution are called amendments. An Any regulation that does not amendment takes place when three-fourths of the country agree that the new law should replace the old one.

The first ten amendments to the constitution are called the Bill of Rights.

Amendments are rights which guarantee citizens the right to privacy, the right to work, and the right of people to a fair and speedy trial.

By 1791 there were 10 amendments to the constitution, 13 in 1865, and 26 as of today.

The most recent amendment, passed in 1971 states, "A U.S. citizen shall not be denied the right to vote because (his or her) age if (he or she) is 18 years of age or older."

Throughout this year, the government has planned to celebrate the 200th birthday of our constitution. From Maine to Florida, and from New York to California, all of the 50 states will help celebrate the anniversary.

Some of the ways students can help keep the constitution alive are by obeying the law, exercising their right to vote, and by keeping informed about new events at all times.

Fight for your rights whenever youfell they are being violated. And remember: the constitution protects all of us. We should all be proud to have a constitution.

There is also the ego child. This child is bred by a male, or birthed by a female for supremacy reasons, or for show and tell. When asked what was the most influential factor leading to their present stance, their answers varied as did the characters themselves.

Gregg Thesa, a pre-law major, said the other fatherless fathers at the street corner persuaded him into more positive actions. He went on to say that all they ever did was flash dated photos and say what their kids will one day become. Yet for all their worthless preachings they would do nothing to insure their childrens' future, or the present. "I was fatherless myself, but hey, I guess I was one of the lucky ones. I'm in school, I work, and....I have no kids...yet." The same holds true for "Snake" and Steve.

These fatherless children, however, are being poisoned right before our eyes. They're constructing their foundations on
