# "Black behind the Ears:"

Candelario Speaks on Blackness and Dominican Identity

n Thursday, November 16, 2006, the Institute for Research on the African Diaspora in the Americas and the Caribbean (IRADAC) in partnership with the Dominican Studies Institute (DSI) brought Dr. Ginetta E. B. Candelario to CCNY to discuss her forthcoming book, Black Behind the Ears: Blackness in Dominican Identity from Museums to Beauty Shops. Candelario, an Associate Professor of Sociology and Latin American and Latina/o studies at Smith College, has been studying Blackness as it pertains to Dominican identity for many years and cites her mother's experiences as a Dominican immigrant to the United States as a large part of her inspiration for wanting to research the topic and focusing, by and large, on the experiences of women.

Candelario began by building the framework of her research for the audience,

explaining why she asserts that, more than many other Latin Americans, Dominicans have a strong "desire to whiten" despite their recognition of being "Black behind the ears." She points to the Dominican Republic having a contrapuntal relationship with Haiti - Haiti touted as the "Black republic" and the Dominican Republic touted as the "white republic," which in turn has spurred strong Negrophobic and anti-Haitian sentiments amongst Domincans over the years. Candelario explained that this was by design, largely under the tutelage of Rafael Leónidas Trujillo, former president and dictator of the Dominican Republic, himself of mulatto parentage, who sought to create a white Dominican identity, chiefly for purposes of gaining geo-political and economic clout.

In her presentation, Candelario explained that sources like travel narratives and museums were used to increase anti-Black sentiments in the Dominican Republic, despite the large number of African-descended peoples in the Republic. She

spoke of how the existence of slavery and African ancestry in the Dominican Republic is virtually denied, while "Indio the identity Dominicans is strongly played

up; she referred specifically to the *Museo del Hombre Dominicano*, the National museum of the Dominican Republic, which relegates any mention of African identity and slavery to one quarter of one floor out of a four floor museum.

a Queens nightclub, just hours before his wedding. Apparently, the Kalua Cabaret, where Bell and two friends went to celebrate his last night as a bachelor, was under suspicion for prostitution and drug dealing. Due to searches at the door, the two undercover officers left their weapons and badges in the car as they entered the club, and for the next few hours did their best to blend in, having drinks and observing their questionable surroundings.

The situations turned ugly when one of the undercover officers alerted backup on the grounds that one of the men was armed; apparently a member of Bell's bachelor party was involved

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# Barak Obama: Set to Change Washington

blacks living in poor neighborhoods. This experience opened Obama's eyes to the legislative change that was needed to fully change the lives of impoverished Blacks not only in Chicago but in America.

To this point, Obama graduated from Harvard University in 1991. During his years at Harvard he served as the schools' first African American president of the Harvard Law Review. Following College, Obama returned to Chicago as a civil rights lawyer. This led him to run and consequently serve in the Illinois legislature for seven years. In 2004, Obama was elected as the country's third Black senator since the Reconstruction era of the 1800's. Ever since, he has emerged as a mainstay in American politics being featured on the cover of an October issue of Time magazine.

During the recent election, he was one of the more glitzy Democrats circulating the country lending his prestige and notoriety to fellow democrats both Black and White.

Whilst touring and promoting his new book *The Audacity of Hope: Reclaiming the American Dream*, the New York Times bestselling author of *Dreams of My Father* made time to speak on the behalf of and endorse fellow democrats. Along with this widespread popularity, Obama has emerged to be seen by many as a possible candidate for the 2008 presidential nomination. The New Amsterdam News reported that Obama is considering a run for the

Whitehouse. Obama states, "I am still at the point where I have not made a decision to – to pursue higher office, but it is true that I have though about it over the last several months."

In the meantime Obama will serve on four committees during the upcoming 110th Congress. According to obama.senate.gov, he will remain on the foreign relation and Veterans' affairs committee but will also serve on the Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee and the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs. Fingers crossed, hope against hope, that Obama's honesty, dedication and sincerity endures the sway of Washington. 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# "Black behind the Ears"

In reference to the museum, one of the students present at the discussion who had been there expressed her dissatisfaction with the fact that tour guides took their time through the rest of the museum, mostly dedicated to "Indio" identity, and quickly rushed through the small African section, actions that support many of Candelario's assertions about Negrophobia as a Dominican cultural phenomenon.

good portion of Candelario's research for her book was done at a beauty shop in Washington Heights. The beauty shop is an integral part of Dominican culture and Candelario found that there are more beauty shops in Dominicaninhabited areas of the city than in any other area - one on almost every block. She interviewed many women and had them look at different photos in hair books to find out which beauty standards they subscribed to and which people they would find the most aesthetically pleasing. Time and again, the women tended to

lean toward images that were neither "too white" nor "too Black," which in many cases meant more of a mixed-race or "Indio" appearance. Candelario explained that this is indicative of preference towards a look that is "distinctly Dominican" — although there are large variations in what that "distinct" look actually is.

Dr. Candelario's talk was candid, thorough and informative - it covered enough of her research to arouse curiosity and left enough questions to raise interest in reading her book, which will be available through Duke University Press next year. She, and many in the audience agreed that despite the reasons for it's inception and the mechanisms used to perpetuate it. the Negrophobic attitudes among Dominicans should be a thing of the past because African identity is a part of Dominican identity and that "Black behind the ears" isn't going anywhere - no matter how many trips one takes to the beauty shop!

in an altercation that evening and was over heard saying, "Yo, get my gun." Officers responded not by following protocol, but by retrieving their weapons from their car and confronting Bell and his party as they entered their Nissan Altima. It is still unclear if the officers did, in fact, reveal their identities as they approached the men – what is clear is that Bell panicked and smashed his car into an unmarked police van, as well as into the approaching undercover officer. These actions initiated the hail of gunfire that would soon end the life of one man and injure two others.

In light of the 1999 shooting of unarmed, 23 year old immigrant, Amadou Diallo, who died from 19 out of 41 shots fired by New York City Officers, many are questioning the actions of the undercover officers taken that Saturday morning. A total of 50 shots were fired at Bell's vehicle. Given the fact that standard procedure calls for officers to fire at most 3 shots and reassess the situation, questions surround the 11 initial shots fired by one of the undercover officers and the 31 shots fired by a 12 year veteran on the force. "It sounds to me like excessive force was used," stated Mayor Bloomberg in reference to Bell's shooting, "I can tell you that it is to me unacceptable or inexplicable how you can have 50 – odd shots fired."

Bell was pronounced dead upon arrival at Mary Immaculate Hospital, while one of his friends, who was shot 3 times remained in stable condition and a second friend, shot 11 times remained in critical condition awaiting surgery.

Bell's family and community members are grateful for the support and concern government officials such as Mayor Bloomberg have shown this tragic event. However, as Rev. Al Sharpton stated on their behalf as he exited City Hall, their main interest is not just to be "treated politely [but] in being treated fairly and rightly. And that will happen when police are held as accountable as anyone else." Though there are some who believe the officers were justified in the shooting, such as President of Detectives' Endowment Association, Michael Palladino who stated "If the driver of the vehicle had responded to the detectives' command this would never have

happened – he would be a married man today," many are hopeful that justice will prevail and Bell's death will not have been in vain.

Bell is survived by his fiancée Nicole Paultre and their two daughters.



passions. Here are a few title suggestions to get you started:




# Fiction





# Non-Fiction

# Fix that Resumé & Get the Job

s another semester comes to an end, it may be time to update that resumé for the various internships many CCNY students are applying for. However before sealing that envelope, here are a few common resumé blunders to look out for, blunders that can ultimately be the deciding factor in whether you get the interview or become a part of the recycling bin.

The beginning can be the end if you find yourself starting a resumé with an extremely vague and overused objective. Instead of writing "I'm searching for a position that will enable me to enhance my skills while contributing to the company" try something a little more catchy. Statements that reflect what your expertise is are stronger than those reflecting what you hope it to be.

While your past experience is vital in getting whatever job you're applying for, your resumé should not reflect a boring list of responsibilities and job duties. Meaning rather than showing the common duties that went along with your past position, list how you made a difference in the company by using specific examples. And while you may feel the need to include you're interest, only mention those that relate to the job you're looking for.

You're probably wondering how are you to fit all great things you accomplished at your past job on one page; breathe easy in knowing there is no page limitation to a resumé. However keep in mind, your resumé should sell your best

qualities without overdoing it.

Attempt to think of a resumé as your assistant, a formal business partner selling you to future employers. With that in mind, you should refrain from using words such as "I" or "me" when referring to yourself. Instead of "I helped organize functions and events for major clients" it should be changed to "organized functions and events for major clients" its stronger statement and overall it's more professional.

Now that some of the major issues are out of the way, look out for some of these little errors that ultimately have big consequence. Beware of the evil typos, while a simple mistake, its makes your resumé look unprofessional. Have several friends re-read the final product as a precaution to catch whatever you may have missed. - · Header (name, address, email address, phone number)

# "Throw His A--

ichael Richards, better know as 'Kramer', the eccentric neighbor on the sitcom "Seinfeld," shocked audience members at the West Hollywood Laugh Factory last Friday when he veered off his comedy routine and went into a tirade of racial slurs.

According to a video posted on TMZ.com, the incident occurred after two African American audience members heckled Richards during his performance. Richards in turn replied by saying "Shut up! Fifty years ago we'd have you upside down with a f----- fork up your a--." As if that wasn't bad enough Richards reportedly paced across the stage and continued by saying "You can talk, you can talk, you're brave now motherf-----! He's a n----! He's a n----! -! He's a n----! A n----! 'A n----!" Audience members weren't sure what to make of Richards' rant, which was only brought to an end after an audience member called out "It's not funny. That's why you're a reject, never had no shows, never had no movies - Seinfeld, that's it."

The 57 year-old actor - comedian immediately began to feel the backlash of his behavior; claiming that his behavior was not only inappropriate but came as a shock to him as well. "I'm not a racist, that's what's so insane about this," said Richards. Following the unfortunate incident, Richards appeared on the "Late Show with David Letterman" Monday night via satellite from Television City, California, to publicly apologize for his actions. "For me to be at a comedy club and flip out and say that crap... I'm deeply, deeply sorry," said Richards.

While Richards continues to apologize, many are left wondering how sincere his apology truly is. According to veteran publicist Michael Levine, comics are often heckled however it's essential in this business for them to be able to keep their cool. Something Richards was clearly unaware of.

When asked by Letterman if Richards' response would have been so harsh had the hecklers been of another race, he replied, "It may have happened – I'm a performer. I push the envelope - I go into character. I don't know. In view of the situation and the act going the way it was going, I don't know. The rage did go all over

the place - it went to everybody in the room." The repercussion for Richards' remarks is one that will continue to emerge as time goes on. As it stands now, the public as well as industry colleagues are in no rush to accept Richards' apology. Said fellow comedian Paul Rodriguez: "Once the word comes out if your mouth and you don't happen to be African American, then you have a whole lot of explaining - freedom of speech has its limitations and think Michael Richards found those limitations."

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# **Sleep: The Original Full-Body Makeover**

(NAPSA)-If you want to look better, close your eyes. Getting more sleep is one of the best ways to improve the appearance of your skin, eyes and hair. It also improves health and overall well-being. In fact, you can think of sleeping as a repair shop. Your body enters its maintenance phase-or its own private operating room-when you sleep, going to work on cellular damage, rebounding from external stressors such as UV rays and improving circulation.

Because millions of people cannot reach deep sleep on a regular basis, they lose out on visiting this "repair shop." As a result, their skin, eyes and even hair may not look as good as they could.

Of course, the benefits of sleep aren't only skin deep. There's evidence indicating a good night's sleep can help with weight loss and even slow a process known as arterial aging, which refers to a decline in heart and blood vessel functioning. So what's the best way to find dreamland? Try these tips:

 Monitor caffeine consumption. Caffeine can stay in your body up to about 14 hours. So if you drink a cup of coffee at noon and are still awake at midnight, that might be the reason. If you have already had too much caffeine, try eating some carbohydrates such as bread or crackers to help reduce the effects.

- Relax before bedtime. Stress not only makes you miserable, it wreaks havoc on your sleep. Develop some kind of pre-sleep ritual to break the connection between all the day's stress and bedtime. These rituals can be as short as 10 minutes or as long as an hour.
- Avoid long naps. Napping can only make matters worse if you have problems sleeping at night. If you do nap, keep it short. A brief 15-20-minute snooze about eight hours after you get up in the morning can actually be rejuvenating.
- Think about when you exercise. If you are the type of person who gets energized or becomes more alert after exercise, it may be best not to exercise in the evening. Still, be sure to get your exercise in each day. A recent study found that even morning exercise can help relieve insomnia.
