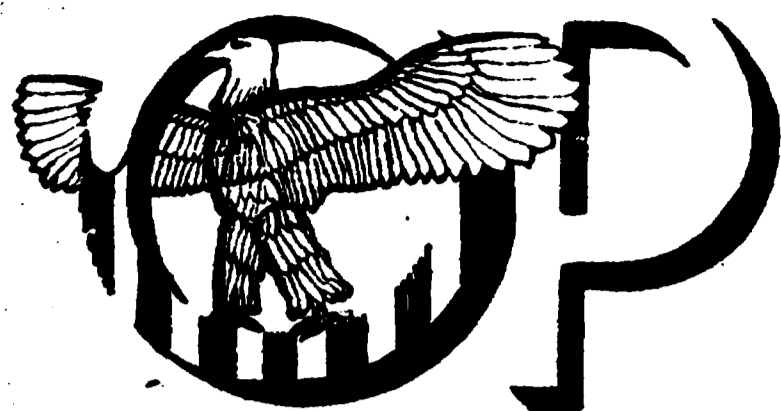

Allen, Crawley Receive New Dean Appointments

The appointment of two new deans, effective September 1, was announced last night by Dr. Harry N. Wright, president of the college. William Allen will head the School of Technology while Dr. Sumner L. Crawley is to become Associate Dean of Students. The appointment of Walter Stalb as Business Manager of the College, also disclosed last night, is retroactive to April 1, 1947.

A member of the faculty since 1933, Professor Allan currently occupies the post of associate professor and chairman of the Department of Civil Engineering. As dean of the Technology school and professor of civil engineering, he will succeed Dr. Albert B. Newman, who is retiring and intends devoting his time to teaching as professor of chemical engineering.

Dr. Crawley comes to the College from the Colorado State College of Education where, for the past eight years, he has been professor of educational psychology and director of the Department of Student Personnel. He succeeds Dr. John L. Bergstrasser, who resigned the post last year to go to the University of Chicago. The vacancy was temporarily filled by Dr. Frank K. Shuttleworth of the department of Student Life.

Walter Stalb fills a vacancy created by the resignation of John B. Goodwin last March. Mr. Goodwin is now comptroller at Creighton University, Omaha.

Rogers Bill Prospects Rise; AH Rental Decrease Studied

Residents Council, AVC, VA to Meet With Faculty Body

Not satisfied with the recent one dollar decrease in Army Hall rentals, a joint committee composed of delegates from the Army Hall Residents Council, AVC and VA, has been organized to study new means of obtaining further reductions from the administration.

The new committee will work jointly with members of a faculty group comprising Dean John J. Theobald, Administration; Director William F. Davis, Army Hall; and Walter Stalb, Bursar.

Through the joint efforts of the aforementioned individuals a supplementary appropriation was obtained from the Board of Estimate to cover the maintenance of college facilities in Army Hall. The original high rentals charged at the residence by the administration were used to defray the high operating cost of the Hall facilities. The Hall's obsolete power system and antiquated equipment is responsible for the large maintenance cost.

Reduction Justifiable

According to Max Sapatkin, chairman of the Army Hall Council, a further reduction in rentals is justifiable because the joint committee believed that the ability to pay on the part of the residents is more important than the ability to balance the books of Army Hall by the administration.

The student committee has thanked the college faculty group for their fine cooperation in the past and for their necessary assistance in arriving at an agreeable rent arrangement to take effect in the near future.

Student Committee Sets Deadline for Collection Drive

Latest cash returns on the Main Centers Student Centennial Fund campaign sent the Uptown drive over the \$2500 mark, it was disclosed yesterday by Florence Markowitz, '47 chairlady of Student Fund committee.

With May 28 set as the deadline date for Centennial book solicitations, the student fund is expected to hit the three grand figure when the final tally is made.

The campaign committee has set up a booth under the clock in Lincoln Corridor where student may return all money from 10 A.M. to 3 P.M. daily.

Nomination applications for the Athletic Association Executive Board will be accepted in the AA office until Thursday. Elections for the Presidency, Vice-Presidency, and Secretaryship of the Board will be held in Lewisohn Stadium on May 29. Only AA members can participate in the elections.

Vacation Pay For 52-20 Club Clarified by VA

Veterans attending under P.I. 346 or 16 who intend to apply for readjustment allowance between Spring and Summer terms or during the Summer cannot concurrently claim leave or subsistence payments.

'Ready to Work'

According to information received by Veterans Counselor Stuart R. Clarkson from the Unemployment Insurance Section of the Labor Dept. claimants for 52-20 payments "must be ready, willing, and able to work at prevailing wages during that period."

On application for readjustment allowance a "Stop Payment Notice" will be sent to the Finance Section of the Veterans Administration. Subsequent subsistence checks to which veterans may be entitled when they go off readjustment allowance, will be slightly delayed for clearance from the Unemployment Insurance Section.

Senior Opus Set For June 21; 'Job Seeking' Course For Grads

A short orientation "course" for job-seeking seniors who expect to graduate in June 1947 has been initiated by the Placement Service of the college. The program is designed to acquaint seniors with job opportunities and techniques of "selling" themselves to prospective employers.

The course comprises a single half hour session. Mr. Robert J. Snodder, Graduate Placement Director, plans to discuss such matters as job openings for various degrees, proper methods of application, and suitable behavior during job-interviews.

Seniors who wish to avail themselves of this training are urged to attend the next session on Thursday, May 29, 12:30 p.m. in Room 022, Thb.

Lusk Announces Approval of More Vet Subsistence

Prospect for quick House sub-committee approval of the proposed Rogers Bill rose sharply last Thursday when the third member of the five-man committee, Congresswoman Georgia L. Lusk, New Mexico, declared herself for HR 870 to increase veterans' subsistence.

Rep. Lusk's announcement leaves Robert Tripp Ross, N.Y., and William D. Wheeler, Georgia, as the only opposing members on the committee at present. Chairman Homer A. Ramey, Ohio, and W. Howes Meade, Kentucky, have already signified their approval of the measure.

Upon return from Washington, where they joined the nation-wide "Operation Subsistence" pressure drive on Congress, Veterans Association delegates Max Sapatkin and Lenny Schwartz vigorously urged all veterans to continue their letter barrage on members of the Veterans Affairs Committee of both congressional houses.

Pivotal members of the Senate's Labor and Public Welfare Committee hearing the Langer Bill are freshman Senator Irving M. Ives, N.Y., and Chairman Senator Wayne Morse, Oregon. Both Senators have requested letters with specific evidence of veterans dropping or intending to leave school because of lack of funds.

In a special interview with OP during the Centennial Charter Day luncheon, Senator Robert Wagner '02, disclosed that he is in favor of both the Langer and Rogers Bills. He added: "The Langer Bill has a very good chance to pass."

Senator Claude Pepper, Fla., made the most brilliant plea yet heard in the Veterans case. Sen. Morse made a plea for keeping students in school, not only for their own good but also for the good of the nation. These two are the Veteran's real champions.

Also testifying favorably for increased subsistence last week at the Senate hearings were Gen. Omar Bradley, Vets. Administrator; Chat Paterson,

Letter to the Editors

It is with great sorrow and bitterness that I am obliged to announce my resignation from the position of Executive Secretary of the Vets Association. This resignation is caused by the insistence of the president of the Association and some of the others of the Executive Committee members, who, as directors control the policies of the newspaper OP, to attack the motives and actions of those of us who have chosen to cast our lot with the S.L.C., a political school party which opposes the party with which Mr. Brown and his friends have allied themselves. At the same time, as my last official duty, I have to announce the resignation of Mr. Frank Eichenberger from the posi-

tion of Membership Secretary and of Mr. Fred Pollak from the position of Chairman of the Grievance & Survey Committee, for reasons akin to my own.

It is indeed very painful to be forced out in such an ignominious manner from an organization with which I have been so closely associated for the past three semesters, and to which I was ready and eager to devote further service for the rest of my stay at the College. The willingness of some to sacrifice the unity and effectiveness of the Veterans Association, as well as the good name and character of their co-workers, to further their own selfish political ends, leaves me no other choice.

Operation Beaver

2. To increase respect for and confidence in Student Council by making Student Council reflect to a greater degree the opinion and thought of the student body by using Operation Beaver.

3. To work constructively for the benefit of the student body PRIMARILY in the administration of its extra-curricular activities and facilities, and to work for greater cooperation and understanding between students and faculty using the Beaver Plan.

A FEW OF THE 47 specific points which we will press for are: more basketball ticket allotments to students; use of scouting system to acquire promising high school athletes; boxing and wrestling exhibitions in Townsend Harris Hall; a prominent coach for the varsity football team; continued efforts to increase necessary supply and textbook allowances; co-education in the College of Liberal Arts and Science, provided that facilities are available to accommodate the increased enrollment; equipment and furnishings for a portion of South Hall so that it may serve as a center of student life with meeting space, lounges, recreational facilities, and a reading room (stopping the use of Student Council as a medium for political expression not in the interests of the student body; and, of course, Beaver opinion polls and regular printed reports to the student body.

This September the Constitutional Convention for a National Student Organization will take place at the University of Wisconsin. The convention will adopt the constitution and first year's program of the proposed NSO.

This meeting will be the most significant gathering of students in the history of colleges and universities in the United States.
