The strike began early last Monday morning as pickets walked in ment of the entrances of the Colbre buildings. At about nine steleck, the police decided to limit the number of pickets in front of the main building to four. The nickets, however, refused to have their numbers cut. This difference e opinion led to an argument, which the police won by pushing the protesting students into panol wagens and hauling them down to the station house.

On Tuesday, the strike continued. as effective as previously, except for the Tech School, which went mek to class on a recommendation from TIIC. However, a Strike Committee report said that 65% of the students were still out.

Wednesday saw the strike procond in a quiet and orderly fashim. Nobody rioted and the cops ëdn't arrest anybody. Picketing was called off at 8 P.M. so that ereryone could go down to City Hall to picket. A delegation tried to see the Mayor, but he refused to see them.

Trials for D. & K. **Asked of BHE**

Formal charges of racial and religious bias were leveled against Prof. Knickerbocker and Mr. Davis at last night's regular monthly meeting of the Board of Higher Education by William Fortunato. chairman of the Strike Committee and president of the Student Council. Coupled with these charges were formal requests for trials "since no trial(s) have been held upon these charges by any legally constituted body." Suspension of he two, pending the trials, was also requested.

Fred Sonnenfeld, a member of the Strike Committee, told the BHE that it had failed to "offcially recognize racial and religious bias as grounds for dismissal on the same level as other immoral social acta."

Galperin reported that Robert C. Killough, Director of the Counseling and Law Division of the State Education Department, told the delogation that "it is possible for the Commissioner, under his original jurisdiction, to take up the matter at City College and ask the BHE to institute a trial if he considered the altreation at the College an indication that there is a breakdown of normal educational Processes."

"In the light of Killough's statement," said Galperin, "It is the opinion of the sub-committee that if the students stay out for another two days, the Commissioner will be forced to take up the matter himself."

The students who went to Albany yesterday report that Commissioner of Education Spaulding will be forced to step into the situation here at the College since it is "a breakdown of normal educational processes."


Already our concerted action has resulted in the Commissioner's pushing up of the date of hearings on the Knickerbocker case to "within two or three weeks."
