

Schiffres, Schlessinger, Walpin, Vie for 'Top Spot'; Merger Big Question

Twenty candidates, running on four slates, will compete for nine major positions; and a host of other candidates are vying for the many offices in student government in tomorrow's semi-annual student elections.

Highlighting the many contests will be the bid of SC

President Jerry Walpin to become the second president in two years to succeed himself. Walpin, running on the Student Needs (SN) slate will be opposed by former vice-president Irwin Schiffres (Prosperice) and by SC Secretary Gary Schlessinger (Quo Vadis).

Major Offices

Henry Krisch and Lenny Lederman are the candidates for vice-president, and Fred Boretz and Harry Pollak are hoping to be treasurer. Three candidates are trying for the office of secretary: Ray Hamilton, Phyllis Schwab, and Leo Bodner. Campus editor-in-chief Mark Maged, along with Marty Dubin, Stan Ross, and Dick Fields, is trying for the Senior Class presidency.

One of the more controversial questions in student affairs will be decided by the student body in the election: the problem of whether to maintain the present two-newspaper system, or go back to one student newspaper. In the last referendum held on this topic, back three years ago in December, 1948, the vote was against merger and for two papers. The referendum on the ballot this term will ask, in addition to the question of merger, how many times a week the new merged newspaper, if established should be published.

College's Reps

The annual vote for NSA delegates will take place at this week's elections. There are four positions open on the five-man delegation which will represent the College at next summer's National Congress. The fifth member of the delegation will be next fall's SC president.

The balloting, conducted this semester, as usual, by the volunteers from APO, will be held tomorrow at 11 A.M. For those who cannot vote in class, there will be a booth at the rear of the Cafeteria open from 11 until 3.

Slates

There will be five slates all together in the voting. In addition to the three with candidates for major office, the Senior Service slate is putting up candidates for senior class officers; the Service slate will support a few scattered candidates in the classes, and the BBR (Bigger and Better Representation) slate is offering choices in the freshman class.

In the race for president of the junior class, Walter Urban is unopposed. Manny Halper and Fred Queller are vying for '54 president. Sandra Gonick and Morton Ozer are after the top spot in '55.

In addition to the candidates for a total of 40 offices, there will be six names on the ballot—the one on the list receiving the highest vote will be an honor for a Council "honorary" award.

Bring Stub!

Got a gripe about your student government? The "Student Council elections" stub on your gray student activities fee card can go a long way toward settling your problems. It's the ticket that will let you vote in the Council elections tomorrow, Friday, December 14.

Voting will be conducted in the classrooms at 11 A.M. by the busy beavers of APO. For those who can't vote then, a booth in the rear of the Cafeteria will be open from 11 until 3.

Elections will be held for the major officers and the entire membership of Council, all class officers, and four NSA delegates. A merger referendum is on the ballot.

Student Council Roll-Call; Guide to Intelligent Voting

As a service to the student body and an aid to intelligent voting, OP is printing the records of those persons running for office this semester and their voting record in Council as it has been recorded on certain issues.

The motions themselves are printed below with the vote following. The numbers run in this order: for—against—abstain—absent. The records of the individuals follow the list of motions. The numbers in their records correspond to the numbers given to the specific motions.

- Motions:**
1. Bylaw: It is the stated policy of SC that it should confine its discussion and business to those matters that affect students as students. Questions of outside politics shall not enter into the discussion. Vote: 17-6-1 (Passed).
 2. Resolve, that SC looks with disapproval and condemns Gerald Walpin for his article in the October 11 issue of *Campus* in which he called three members of Council obstructionists and SC asks that he refrain from making such statements in the future. Vote: 12-14-3 (Defeated).
 3. SC looks with extreme disapproval upon the refusal of

SFCSA to grant Paul Robeson the use of the Great Hall. In view of this we can only consider the SFCSA action an abridgement of academic freedom. We urge the SFCSA to reconsider its stand on the matter. Vote: 28-4-1-1 (Passed).

4. Resolve, that SC affirm its support of the letter sent by the Executive Committee to Pres. Ordway Tead and Pres. Harry N. Wright in relation to the use of NIF funds. Further resolved, that SC direct the Executive Committee, and the committees thereof, to use all the methods at its disposal to bring about a change in the disposition of these funds. Vote: 22-0-1 (Passed).

5. SC instructs the Executive Committee to appeal the ruling of the SFCSA to the General Faculty Committee. The ruling in question is the refusal of SFCSA to allow Paul Robeson to appear in the Great Hall. Vote: 20-3-2-1-1 (Passed).

Vote NO on Merger!

There is no doubt that a merger of the *Observation Post* and *Campus* would be disastrous. It would serve to waste the students' money; it would serve to stifle freedom of expression at the College; finally, it would undermine the democratic principles of diversity of speech and thought upon which this country was founded.

Under the proposed plan, the merged newspaper would publish three or four times weekly. It would be impossible to fill three or four issues a week with news of interest to the students and still maintain even the lowest journalistic standards. A brief glance at any college daily will assure the most casual observer of the low quality of the publication.

Under the present two-newspaper system, each serves as a check upon the other. In this way, each paper sincerely tries to better its news coverage, its feature material, its appearance. The element of competition is a strong factor in the betterment of any institution. Were there only one paper, there would be nothing to prevent its deterioration. We can not let this happen!

Perhaps the most important reason for our wholehearted opposition to merger is the obvious one. There would be only one opinion expressed. The purpose of a college newspaper is to reflect and mold student opinion. How democratic would it be, when ONE paper, ONE group, ONE faction controls the opinions of thousands of students? As long as we live in a democratic country, we have the right, indeed we MUST have the right, to be presented with both sides of every issue affecting us as students. This right can be maintained ONLY if we have more than one newspaper at the College. OP strongly urges that you, all of you, VOTE NO on merger.

The Real Problem

Marvin Sandler has been reinstated in his Ed. class. Does this mean that academic freedom has been reinstated in the School of Education?

One student has been allowed to return to one class. Aside from this nothing much has been solved.

How much free discussion will be allowed in this class and other classes? Where does the line between disagreement and disloyalty stand? How are issues of this type to be dealt with in the future or will Dean Turner continue to say that there is no set means of appeal for one who has been branded "disloyal?" These are the questions to which the reinstatement of Sandler gives no answers. With the answers to these questions lie the future of academic freedom at the College.

What is needed now is a reaffirmation of the maintenance of academic freedom on the campus. And more than that we want assurance that no student will ever have to fear intimidation from an instructor or a member of administration because of any point of view he may hold. Students should feel free to discuss every aspect of every situation which arises in their classes. They must know that they can disagree with the instructor and know, at the same time, that their marks, their futures, and their records will not suffer from this disagreement.

Sandler's ability to teach does not rest upon his belief that there are no slave-labor camps in the Soviet Union. The methods used by the School of Education to determine the teaching competence of students need a thorough "going over." There is a lot of cleaning to be done and the house should be given a thorough washing very soon before the dirt becomes so thick that the house will have to be demolished and a new one built.

Right now we have a system which makes every instructor a potential "informer." Is this academic freedom, Dean Turner?

The Compromise

OP regrets that Paul Robeson will not be allowed to speak in the Great Hall in the manner originally requested. We feel that granting him permission to speak would strengthen democracy and the reputation of academic freedom held by the College. To force him to submit to a unique and dangerous precedent-setting procedure is an insult and completely unwarranted.

The compromise offered by Student Council and accepted by the faculty proposes a debate between Mr. Robeson and three members of the student body. The fact that it is a compromise does not make it good, but we urge its acceptance as the only way Paul Robeson will be allowed here, and the only way the students will ever get a chance to make up their own minds.
