Clancy, Greenidge, Silver Run for President In Tomorrow's Elections; 2 Referenda Set

Meeting Day, Fee Increase On Ballot

Two referenda will appear on tomorrow's ballot, one dealing with the fixing of Council's meeting day, and the other dealing with an athletic fee.

The student body will vote on constitutional amendment which would set Wednesday as Council's meeting day. Council now meets on Fridays. Proposals changing SC's meeting day have repeatedly failed in Council.

The second referendum, which deals with an athletic fee, contains three questions:

1. Do you favor paying a \$1.00 for the support of inter-collegiate athletics?
2. Do you favor paying a \$1.00 for the support of inter-collegiate athletics with the understanding that this fee shall enable the student to free admission accounts to all athletic contests?

If there is such a fee do you think that it should be part of:

- a. The Student Activities Fee or a separate athletic fee both of which must be submitted to students referendum or part of
- b. The General Fee which is not bound by student referendum?

Only Two Get IFC Backing

Manny Halper Unopposed For V-P

A three-man battle between Joseph I. Clancy, Jr., Lisle Greenidge, and David Silver for Student Council President will be the feature of tomorrow's SC elections. Silver, who had filed for Vice-President, withdrew in order to campaign as a write-in candidate for President.

The elections will be conducted in classes during the eleven o'clock hour and in a booth outside Knittle Lounge until three o'clock. SC's Elections Committee and Alpha Phi Omega will distribute and count the ballots.

Two Slates on Ballot

There will be two school-wide slates in tomorrow's elections: Service (S) and Students for Academic Freedom (SAF). Lisle Greenidge heads the SAF slate and Manny Halper, Vice-Presidential candidate, heads the Service slate. Halper is unopposed in

his quest for the Vice-Presidency as a result of Silver's withdrawal.

Three candidates are running for the post of SC Secretary: Horace Manner, Norma Schlissel (SAF), and Hank Stern (S).

Jerry Koenig (S) and Gerry Kramer are the two aspirants for the office of Treasurer.

Two Run for NSA

In the National Students Association race there are but two candidates on the ballot, Gerry Kramer and Hank Stern, for three positions as NSA alternates. Students, if they wish, may write in a third name. Ray Hamilton is conducting such a write-in campaign.

Louis Kavanau, Bernard London, and Walter Urban are the candidates for Senior Class President. All three are former class officers. London and Urban were class presidents and Kavanau served as Vice-President for three terms.

Two old opponents, Fred Queller and Bernard Rotaman (S), will again battle for the '54 presidency. The last time they op-

Referendum on SC Meeting Day

Whether or not its a good idea to change the meeting date of Council from Friday to Wednesday, as proposed in the referendum on tomorrow's ballot, we feel that it would be a very poor procedure to change the meeting date by amending the Council constitution.

The student body should not be asked to settle something that is purely a matter of Council's internal procedure: the students do not have the necessary information, and they should not be asked to shoulder the responsibility of doing what the members of Council should do for themselves—arranging the Council procedure in an efficient manner.

Observation Post urges everyone to vote NO on the referendum. Let the job be done by those who can and should do it—Student Council itself!

Referendum on Athletic Fee

Since we believe that intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the life of every college student, *Observation Post* is in favor of asking students to pay a one dollar athletic fee. This is part of the price for the "de-emphasis" of basketball at the College and the consequent cessation of gate receipts from Madison Square Garden.

We therefore urge students to vote YES on questions 1 and 2 of the referendum on an athletic fee.

We firmly believe, however, that an athletic fee should not be imposed without student consent, as it has been by the Board of Higher Education. The fee should be part of the Student Activities Fee, or a separate athletic fee, subject to the approval of the student body. We urge that on question 3 of the referendum you check part a.

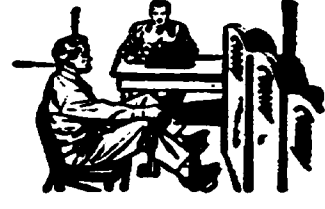
