But the fee committee didn't see it our way, and Tech News was granted over a thousand dollars of your money. They didn't bother asking you because, well, you were only footing the bill.

Now Student Council has, quite rightly, put the entire matter into your hands.

When the Tech News first applied for funds, Observation Post opposed the newspaper's creation. Although it presented no threat to us, since our own fee allocations would not be changed, we felt that the newspaper's existence would tend to make an unreal and dangerous split between the Schools of Liberal Arts and Technology. We felt that there was no need for Tech News, that the two existing newspapers were well equipped and perfectly willing to cover tech activities. We said that if engineering students wanted to move into the field of journalism, there was plenty of room for them on OP or The Campus.

Since the time we first made our stand clear, five issues of Tech News have appeared, on a rather erratic basis and at a rather fantastic cost. They have written nice feature stories about tech fraternities; they have complimented themselves on their existence numerous times, and their issues have been clean and rather neat on the whole. But, alas, they have done nothing to make us change our minds about the importance, need or indeed, the desirability of their existence.

But we ask you to make up your own minds. We ask you to judge on the basis of what Tech News has produced, what its potentialities are and whether it's worth the money you are paying for it.

The decision is yours to make. The important thing, as far as we are concerned, is that you should make it.


Shorr Scores Record 37 Points As Lavender Tops Hunter, 89-77 Paced by the record-breaking scoring performance of Captain Merv Shorr, the College's basketball team rolled to an easy 89-77 victory over Hunter College last night on the loser's court. In the opening game, the Beaver

freshmen trounced the Hunter cubs 75-55.

Shorr scored thirty-seven points, breaking the old mark of thirty-six, which he set against Montclair State Teacher's last season. Hitting for eleven field goals and fifteen fouls, the Beaver's "baby tank" was virtually unstoppable.




