Kingsley, Schwartz Vie for Prexy; Two Referenda Appear on Ballot

Two referenda will be on tomorrow's election ballots. One will ask the question "Are You Favor of Full Membership Lists for All Clubs?" The second is a proposal by Student Council President Martin Gruberg to replace the elected positions of SC secretary and treasurer with two associate vice-presidents. The secretary and treasurer would, under this plan, be appointed by Council. The referendum on membership lists was put on the ballot after an **Observation Post** petition obtained 1013 signatures. At least 650 signatures are necessary on a petition to place a referendum on the ballot. Council had voted against putting the question of lists on the ballot.

The Gruberg proposal reads: The composition of the Student Government Executive Committee shall be the President, Vice-President for Student-Faculty Relations, Vice-President for Communications, and Vice-President for Internal Affairs, elected by the student body and three representatives-at-large elected from and by the Student Council.

"The positions of secretary and treasurer shall be elected by absolute majority vote of the Student Council. They shall serve for periods of 'good conduct' being removable by two-thirds vote of the membership Council. Both shall be non-voting members of the Executive Committee. This referendum would go into effect as of the Fall semester."

The second Student Council election in College history to feature a girl candidate will be held tomorrow. SC Secretary Gloria Kingsley and '56 Representative Stuart Schwartz are the contestants in the first race of its kind since Beverly Rubin ran for the top Council post in 1950 Miss Rubin lost.

Miss Kingsley, winner of the Murray Waldman Unity Award, presented annually by Beta Delta Mu, is a former SC rep and a regional National Students Association leader. Schwartz has served as president and vice-president of House Plan.

The candidates are in direct opposition on the question of compulsory membership lists. Miss Kingsley opposes lists and Schwartz supports the ruling.

Candidates for VP

Three candidates are vying for the vice-presidential post. They are Jerry Karp, Joel Resnick and Barry Weinberg.

Weinberg is a former Council rep, Join-A-Club Week Committee Chairman, and associate vice-president. Resnick, an alternate to SC, is former vice-president of House Plan. Karp is a former SC rep.

The race for treasurer is also contested. Fred Boretz, a returning serviceman who served as SC treasurer in the spring term of 1952 opposes Bill Brown, 57 rep to Council.

Iris Goldstein, '56 SC rep and newly appointed vice-president of Council, is running unopposed for SC Secretary.

Class President

Two candidates for class president are running unopposed. They are Dave Pfeffer, twice president of the Class of '56, who is running for a third term and Sheldon Scherr, '57 SC rep, who is the only candidate for '57 president.

In the Class of '58 Herbert Goldberg, '58 Vice-President, is facing Stephen Stone, Dramsoc Technical Director, for the presidency.

Henry Bregman of the SC Public Opinion Bureau and Arthur Grenen, a House Plan student leader, are opponents for '59 president.

Okay SU Board of Mgrs. As Student Council Agency

A nine-man board to coordinate and regulate the day-to-day activities of the Student Union, was set up by Student Council last night. SU will be the recreation site of the Manhattanville Campus.

The group, to be known as the Board of Managers, will be an agency of the Student Government. It will consist of three representatives from the newly-formed Club Coordination Agency, including the director of the agency. The other two representatives will be elected by Council from a group of five nominees submitted by the Agency.

Two other members will be the directors of the Student Government's Facilities and Social Functions Agencies. The remaining four members will be elected by Council with the stipulation that only three of the Board's members may also be on Student Council.

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Why...

Observation Post is spending a good deal of your money to present this election issue. Why? It has often been said that very few students are concerned with Student Council elections, and that use of funds in this way is wasteful and unnecessary.

We know that only a small minority of the student body is currently interested in the outcome of tomorrow's elections. At the same time, we respect other valid interests which students have which prevents them from becoming involved, either actively or passively, with the struggles of student government at City College.

Nevertheless, Student Government does have two important functions, which neither the Administration nor any Committee may deny. SC is the one group elected by and responsible to the student body. It should represent and express the opinions of the student community.

SC Treasurer

Money is an important matter—even at City College. But
 the last few semesters this fact may have been difficult to
 believe, since the post of Student Council Treasurer frequently
 went uncontested.

This year, however, there are two people running for
 treasurer. An officer who has a lot to say how your money is
 spent. We say running, but not contesting, because it is really
 a contest. One of the candidates, FRED BORETZ, is far and
 away more experienced, qualified and mature than his opponent
 Bill Brown.

Boretz has not only served four times on the Student-Faculty
 Committee but he has also been Student Council Treasurer.
 Brown has served only briefly on this important Committee and
 has demonstrated no extraordinary ability.

We believe that you, if you look at the qualifications of
 these candidates, you will arrive at the same conclusion we did.
 FRED BORETZ is the man for the job.

Vital Decision

Tomorrow you will have the opportunity to vote your
 opinion on a matter we believe to be one of the most important
 ones debated at the College in recent years: whether or not
 clubs should be forced to submit complete membership lists.
 We believe this issue to be one of vital concerns to every
 student—since every student has the right to join a club—we
 thought and were successful with your help in having the question
 on the ballot.

As soon as the ruling was passed last year by the Student
 Faculty Committee on Student Affairs, all the political clubs
 with the exception of the Robert A. Taft Young Republicans
 and Students For Americanism voiced the fear that the ruling
 could not only lead to further apathy at the school but might

be a deathblow for many of them. Apparently they were right.
 Today, there are three fewer political organizations on a campus
 which has seen its political activity decline to a shadow.

The reasons the proponents of the ruling give, never have
 and never will stand up under close scrutiny. These are their
 main contentions.

1. The ruling will prevent students from fraudulently list-
 ing themselves as members of organizations they never belonged
 to when they file applications for a job. We maintain that
 voluntary lists, verified by Student Life with the officers of
 organizations, could prevent such fraudulent claims.

2. The ruling will prevent organizations from "jacking up"
 their membership lists in order to obtain higher appropriations.
 We maintain that the Student Faculty Fee Committee already
 has proven safeguards to prevent such occurrences.

3. The ruling will prevent students or non-students from
 posing as members of existent or non-existent organizations,
 groups and sponsoring drives or movements which are derogatory
 to the College. We maintain that there is no guarantee that
 an unscrupulous person will worry about lists and not do
 this anyway.

4. The ruling will "make everybody stand up and be
 counted" for what he believes in. We maintain that no one is
 forced to reveal how he votes in elections, and the inviolability
 of our political beliefs has always been one of the cardinal tenets
 of democracy.

Observation Post considers this ruling unworkable and a
 threat to the College community, in which individuals should
 have the right to think as they please, and not be fearful of the
 consequences of joining any organization—political or non-
 political.

Tomorrow you will have the opportunity to strike a blow
 for democracy at the College by voting against this ruling. We
 hope you will do so.

Needed Change

There is also another much less controversial referendum
 on the ballot. It provides the Student Body, however, with an
 opportunity to institute a reform long overdue in its Student
 Administration.

This referendum asks for the elimination of the positions of
 Student Council Treasurer and Secretary as elective posts. In-
 stead, these jobs will be filled by people chosen by Student
 Council, who are specially trained in financial and secretarial
 duties. To fill the executive gap left by this reform, two asso-
 ciate vice-presidents would be elected directly by the students.

This is a sensible, logical plan for choosing a Treasurer and
 Secretary which is employed in virtually all democratic gov-
 ernments including our own. Having these positions filled
 through election—by persons who may be popular but many
 times unqualified to handle their specific duties—is obviously
 a mistake which leads to power politics and poor government.
 No silver-throated orators are needed for these positions but
 students who won't quail at the thought of double entry book-
 keeping or stenciling a vice-presidential report. Let platform
 and policy be the concern of our elected legislators and leave
 the posts of SC Treasurer and Secretary to those who can best
 do the job.

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College Track Team Sportnotes . . .

College Track Team Tops Adelphi, 94-46

The City College Baseball team will play three games in the next few days. Tomorrow it will meet Manhattan, on Saturday Brooklyn, and on Monday Hofstra.

The College's track team rolled over Adelphi, 94-46, yesterday, and broke four records in the process. The trackmen took fourteen of the sixteen events in the dual meet held in Lewishohn Stadium.

Jack Kushner broke the College and Stadium shotput record for the fourth time this season with a mark of 50 feet, 1 inch, and Joe Gold ran a 0:50.0 quarter mile, eclipsing the old Stadium and College records. Kushner also won the discus throw.

In the two-mile run, the Beavers' Bill Kowalski (10:25.2) and Rick Hurford finished one-two, while City's mile relay team of Shelley Roach, Jim Spencer, Jim Teahan and Joe Gold won in 3:28.4. Other winners for City in individual events were Spencer (mile and half mile), Bill Brown (high jump), Bob Marsh (running broad jump), Ants Tomson (120

yard high hurdles), Abe Blum (220-yard low hurdles) and Joe Werfel (pole vault and javelin-in throw).

The meet, a tune-up for Saturday's Collegiate Track Conference championships, at New Britain, Connecticut, gives the Coach Harold Anson Bruce good reason to be confident about the team's chances there. The defending CTC champ is the same Adelphi team.

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
