

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

As a sophomore, Forte averaged 22.4 points per game and repeated that average last year before he was stopped after sixteen games by a gentleman in the Dean's office. Now back in good graces after his scholastic probation, Forte is being counted on by Lion coach Lou Rossini to "do the bulk of the scoring for us."

Starting along with Forte in the Columbia backcourt will be 6-1 Ted Dwyer. Dwyer has a good set shot and is a fine dedensive player. Ralph Schefflan, who displayed an accurate array of set and jump shots against Hunter in scoring twenty points on nine of thirteen shots from the field, will oppose Dwyer.

In the forecourt, the Lavender will hold a decided height and experience advantage. Coach Dave Polansky plans to start 6-3 senior Bill Lewis and 6-5 junior Bob Silver at the forwards, and 6-9 senior Syd Levy at center. Levy "played his greatest game ever for City College," according to Polansky, in the opening win, scoring twenty-five markers and grabbing twenty-one rebounds.

Bob Lehner, 6-2 senior, and Ted Harvin, 6-4 sophomore and freshman squad, will open at the starting center.

"Milkey is going to be our big lacks endurance."




