## SFCSA Election Tomorrow; Nine Vying for Four Posts

Nine candidates will seek election tomorrow in the first direct College-wide election of students to the Student Faculty Committee on Student Activities (SFCSA).

Four members to the SFCSA will be elected. The two nominees receiving the highest number of votes will serve for

one year and the two receiving the next highest number for one semester. Only the Student Government (SG) President, the fifth student member of SFCSA, will not be directly elected to the Committee.

The candidates vying for the four positions are Murray Beja, former President of Alpha Phi Omega; Joe De Maios, former Interfraternity Council President; Arthur Diamond, Chairman of Pick and Shovel; Robert Ellison, President of Technology Inter-Society Inter-Fraternity Council (TIIC); Henry Grossman, former Editor-in-Chief of The Campus; Joel Resnick, former SG Vice-President; Michael Rizzo, President Class of '57; Louise Shacknow, former SFCSA Secretary, and Charles Waldauer, Vice-President of Zeta Beta Tau.

SFCSA originally adopted the system of direct student elections by a unanimous vote last January. This plan, however, was not approved by the General Faculty Committee on Student Activities until late last semester. Previously the five student representa-

tives of the Committee were chosen by virtue of office, specifically the President and Vice-

ernment will be fully realized by the student body. I feel that this will be a first step in having all student-faculty committees elected by the student population," he concluded.

The popular election of students to the SFCSA "should have come about a long time ago," Howard Schumann, SG Vice-President, said. He looked forward to a time when "Student Council would have the powers of legislation and SFCSA would be an appeals body."

The polling procedure will be the same as that followed for Student Council elections. Balloting will take place during the 11 o'clock class hour. For those students unable to vote in class, booths will be established outside Room 151 Finley Student Center on the South Campus and opposite Knittle Lounge Shepard Hall on the North Campus between 11 AM and 3 PM.

In order to vote, students must present their Photo Identification cards and attach the number one stub of their Activities card to the ballot.

## Council Urges GFCSA to Let Brophy Abstain

Student Council last night urged the General Faculty Committee on Student Activities (GFCSA) to permit Dean Daniel F. Brophy (Student Life) to disqualify himself from voting in future elections on the membership lists.

The vote was 13-2. The council also passed by a large majority two measures which reversed its previous stand against membership lists and created a special sub-committee Student Government (SG) to study the lists use.

The motion on Dean Brophy's SFCSA vote, introduced by SG Vice-President Howard Schumann, called for a letter to be sent to Professor Michael Kraus (Faculty) chairman of the faculty committee. The letter cites the Dean's "willingness to refrain from voting on the issue of compulsory lists" by Dean Brophy, and urges the GFCSA to "accede to Dean's request."

### Should Not Vote

The Council motion reasoned that since it is "generally agreed that GFCSA is an impartial appeals body," the Dean should vote on the membership list because of his position as highest administrative offi-

cer of the Department of Student Activities (DSA).

This position would tend to make Dean Brophy an improper judge, Schumann charged, because the DSA has "heretofore taken a definite partisan stand in the matter of lists." The argument that the Department has actually taken such a stand was challenged by Joel Resnick, Speaker of Council.

### Wermuth Opposed

Mel Wermuth, '58 representative, opposed the letter on the grounds that it represented "undemocratic means of doing away with the undemocratic practice of compulsory lists." Dean Brophy should not be disqualified from voting, Wermuth declared, merely because of his stand on the issue.

Voting on the matter of lists itself Council reaffirmed its stand of previous terms in urging the repeal of compulsory lists at the College.

### At Last 2 Meetings:

## Brophy Asked To Vote By GFCSA Members

Dean Daniel F. Brophy (Student Life) said yesterday that he had tried to disqualify himself from voting on the membership lists issue at the last two meetings of the General Faculty Committee on Student Activities (GFCSA).

He said he had cast a vote at these meetings at the request of the other members of the committee.

At the last meeting of GFCSA, the safeguards on membership lists were removed by a 5-4 vote. Dr. Brophy voted with the majority.

The committee did not accept his request to disqualify himself, the Dean said, because the members "felt that the committee would not be complete if I did not cast a vote. The members felt that I would be more valuable to the committee by casting my vote," Dr. Brophy said.

Student Government Vice-President Howard Schumann urged Dean Brophy Monday to disqualify himself from voting on the lists issue when it comes before GFCSA next week.

Commenting on Schumann's request, President Buell G. Gallagher yesterday said the question of voluntary self-disqualification rested with each individual but "we ought not to assume the holding of a definite opinion disqualifies a person from participating in a decision."

Such an assumption, the President said, "would disqualify Mr.

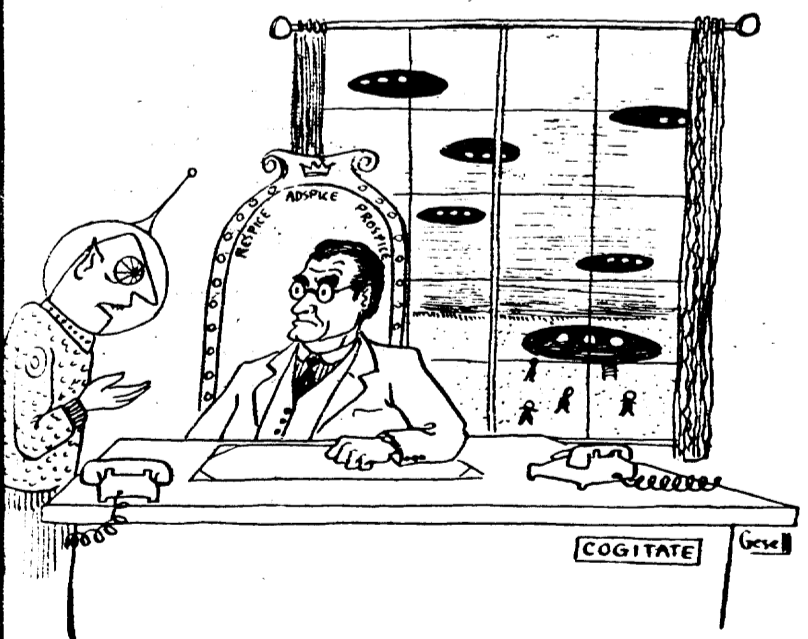
## Member Lists Should Be In Next Friday

## It's Our Move Now

Tomorrow marks a milestone in student affairs at the College. For the first time there will be a school-wide election of the student members of the Student Faculty Committee on Student Activities. This has come about only after long and vigorous agitation by the newspapers and student leaders, a special student referendum, and much passage of time—but finally it has come about. In this issue at least, unlike the others that are beginning to calcify in the College's closet, the student body's voice was heeded.

This election will mean that for the first time there will be direct representation of the students on SFCSA. The Student Council President is the only ex-officio member—and he is already, by the nature of his office, a representative of the student body. The undemocratic system whereby the presidents of House Plan, Technology Inter-Fraternity Inter-Society Council and the senior class "acted for all the students" who never had a chance to elect them, has wisely been changed. This is a belated but significant step in the right direction.

Fortunately, the dearth of qualified candidates that there usually is in student elections, is not the case here. All of the nine contestants have the experience and have shown an active interest in extra-curricular affairs. We feel however, that the basis for electing four of the nine candidates transcends their itemized list of qualifications. Other matters must be considered in making your choice. For the following reasons *Observation Post* endorses . . .

### Louise Shacknow

As a member and last term's Secretary of Student Government, and in her numerous other activities on the campus, Miss Shacknow has proven herself an able and sincere leader. Her unequivocal stand against compulsory membership lists, and her pro-Student Government position of making SFCSA an appeals body without the power to initiate legislation, make her one of the outstanding liberals on the Campus. She will do her job on the committee intelligently and efficiently, and will be an effective representative of the student body.

### Joel Resnick

Mr. Resnick is at present the Speaker of Council, and in the past has served in Student Government in a number of capacities. He is a former SG vice-president, member of the Student Faculty Fee Commission, and was elected, although for personal reasons unable to accept, the position of chairman of the Student Center Board of Managers. It is significant to note that Student Council unanimously elected Mr. Resnick to his present post. By dint of his past participation and proven abilities, in Student Government and extra-curricular affairs, he is a wise choice for a seat on SFCSA.

### Henry Grossman

Mr. Grossman has long been associated with the undergraduate newspaper *The Campus*. He was its Editor-in-Chief, and has been a member of its Managing Board for two years. He has also been a member of Student Council, and in all these capacities has taken a consistently firm and liberal stand. He is opposed to any kind of compulsory membership list, favors making the SFCSA an appeals body, and believes that anyone should be allowed to come to the College to speak, regardless of political affiliation.

### Bob Ellson

The election of Robert Ellson, the President of TIIC, will bring to SFCSA a leader familiar with the viewpoints and problems of more than forty per cent of the student body. We are not in accord with Mr. Ellson on all the issues that may come before SFCSA—he is in favor of membership lists with safeguards—but we feel paramount in this instance his demonstrated leadership and his ability to intelligently and objectively appraise the complex problems of our community.

Tomorrow's election is an important stride forward for the student body at the College. It is imperative that the students show their sincerity, now that the system of direct representation has at last been attained. An apathetic attitude towards "just another election" will not show sincerity. It will indicate that the students don't care, and that perhaps democracy isn't worth fighting for after all.

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# Beavers Renew Rivalry With LIU Booters Sat.

The Blackbirds of Long Island University are not expected to soar to great heights in the Metropolitan Soccer League standings this season, but reports from the Blackbirds nest in Brooklyn indicate that they will definitely be "up" for Saturday's conference encounter with the Beaver booters.

Returning entrants in the annually expanding Met loop, the Blackbirds have been pointing for their 1956 opener against the Lavender at 11 AM in Lewisohn Stadium. The clash will mark the renewal of an old rivalry between the two institutions,

### Skein on Line

The last contest, played in 1934, when LIU was a league member, resulted in a 3-1 victory for the Lavender.

Conference champions for the past three seasons, and titleholders for five of the last six years, the Beavers will place a twenty game league undefeated streak on the line Saturday. Only a 2-2 deadlock with Queens College last October 22 detracts from a perfect record.

The soccer men last suffered a loop setback to Brooklyn College, 1-0, on October 22, 1953. Army, a non-conference adversary, victimized the booters, 3-1, on November 11, 1954, at the Point, for the Beavers lone defeat since 1953.

Long Island Coach Sal Picariello, in analyzing the forthcoming contest feels that "City is too good and too strong a team for us to be contending with, no less on opening day! They shouldn't be competing in our league, they're so powerful. I hope our boys can keep the score at a minimum."

### Shortage of Players

Picariello hasn't had to perform any heavy thinking to decide on his starting lineup because of the shortage of players

on his squad—fourteen to be exact. In conjunction with this, Picariello notes, "We have never practiced two complete teams, freshmen and varsity up and back on any day. The most we've had at any workout has been eleven players."
