## Wilkerson and Gallagher To Debate at 12 Today

President Buell G. Gallagher will debate with Doxie Wilkerson, former Educational Director of the Communist Party, and a member of the party's National Committee today at 12:30 in Room 315 Shepard. The subject will be "Is the Communist Party of America an Asset or Liability to the United States of America?"

Only students with Photo ID cards will be admitted.

This will be the first in a series of Student Government sponsored lectures and forums planned for Academic Freedom week.

In accepting the invitation, Dr. Gallagher explained that his participation in the debate "is designed to make clear the fact that student groups can invite any and every point of view to be expressed on campus." He added that "the College need not, and often does not approve the opinions expressed by visiting speakers.

"My own clear condemnation of Communism," he continued, "will be reiterated in the forthcoming

debate. Nevertheless, we must permit the expression of opinions which are repugnant if freedom is to have any reality."

Representatives of the American Civil Liberties Union, the American Jewish Congress will participate in a symposium on "Religion in the Public Schools" on Friday. As yet, the time and place have not been set.

Hyde Park Day, complete with soap-box orators, will be presented next Thursday from 12-2 PM on the South Campus lawn. The speakers will be Bayard Rustin, a pacifist and member of the War Resisters League, Joe Clark, the foreign editor of the Daily Worker, and representatives of the Independent Socialist League and the Socialist Workers Party.

## Completion of Atomic Power Expected by Homecoming Day

The College's nuclear reactor is expected to be completed by Homecoming Day, May 4, according to Dean William Allan (Technology). Upon the reactor's completion and its exhibition, the College will become one of the few schools in the country offering this type of equipment for undergraduate use.

Nuclear materials valued at more than \$100,000 have been loaned to the College by the Atomic Energy Commission for use in the nuclear assembly. The College has contributed \$8,000 for construction of the reactor and associated laboratory equipment.

Dean Allan said that, "the reactor will be used as a teaching device and not as a power or experimental unit."

The sub-critical assembly will be jointly used by the four engineering departments of the School of Technology and the departments of Physics and Chemistry of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

Originally planned to be made available last semester, the reactor's completion was delayed because the Atomic Energy Commission had not set up regulations which would determine the obligations of the parties involved, the College, the United States Government and the AEC.

The reactor will be temporarily located under the stands of Lewisohn Stadium. It will later be shifted to the new Technology Building which will be erected on the present location of the

Reference Library some time in 1959.

The assembly will consist of a cylindrical aluminum tank five feet high and five feet in diameter. Situated around the reactor will be instrumentation and other laboratory furniture.

## Lacrossemen Drop Stadium Opener As Mounties Tally in Final Seconds

The lacrosse season opened in spectacular fashion when the Beaver stickmen fought a numerically superior New Hampshire squad down to the wire before bowing, 5-4, in Lewisohn Stadium yesterday. Both teams battled evenly in the viciously-played contest

and, at half-time, the score was 3-3. It wasn't until the last quarter, with less than two minutes remaining and the Mounties ahead, 4-3, that the game reached its breath-taking climax.

The New Englanders were bombing Shelly Cashdan, City goalie, until one of their passes was deflected. Ron Bose, second attackman for the Lavender, gained possession of the ball in the ensuing melee and raced into the offensive zone. He drew the defense off and quickly passed

to Merritt Nesin, who slammed the ball by Mountie goalie Jack Carrick, knotting the score 4-4.

However, the tie was short lived. With twenty-four seconds left to play New Hampshire attackman John Wheeler carried the ball downfield and, with Cashdan out of position, whipped it into the unguarded nets. The ball hit the ground, bounded up, ricocheted off the cross-bar and into the goalmouth before spinning out, but the tally was al-

lowed. City gained possession of the ball in the ensuing face-off and swarmed into Mountie territory, but time ran out before a shot could be taken.

Hit-'em hard tactics were employed at the opening face-off as neither squad could muster an attack. City finally penetrated their offensive zone and threatened to score but an untimely interception ended this foray without a shot being taken.

## Gallagher Forms Committee To Explore Speaker Policy

A committee will be formed to investigate the rules and regulations governing visiting speakers at the College, President Buell G. Gallagher revealed yesterday.

At a meeting with student leaders on Wednesday night, President Gallagher announced that Morris Ernst, who had been

retained by the Student Government to appeal the action barring Smith Act violators from the five municipal campuses, will sit with the committee consisting of six students, four faculty members, three alumni, Dean James S. Peace (Student Life) and Dr. Gallagher. The students on the committee, which is expected to meet during the Easter vacation, will be two representatives each

from uptown and downtown Day Session, one uptown Evening Session student, and one downtown Evening Session representa-

tion. A committee with Mr. Ernst when the two met, last week. Mr. Ernst is leaving for Europe on April 28, so it is expected that the committee will meet before that time.

At a press conference yesterday, the President revealed that the ban on Smith Act violators had served to prevent a BHE ban on all Communist speakers at the five colleges.

He emphasized the second paragraph of the original decision handed down by the Administrative Council of the Five Municipal College Presidents, which reads: "On each of the five campuses the common purpose of opposing Communism is accomplished through somewhat different procedures. We reaffirm our belief that uniformity of method in dealing with Communism is not of the essence, and express our intent to respect one another in a variety of methods and procedures, each appropriate to our own circumstances."

Dr. Gallagher went on to reaffirm the right of each college to determine its own policy in dealing with outside speakers.

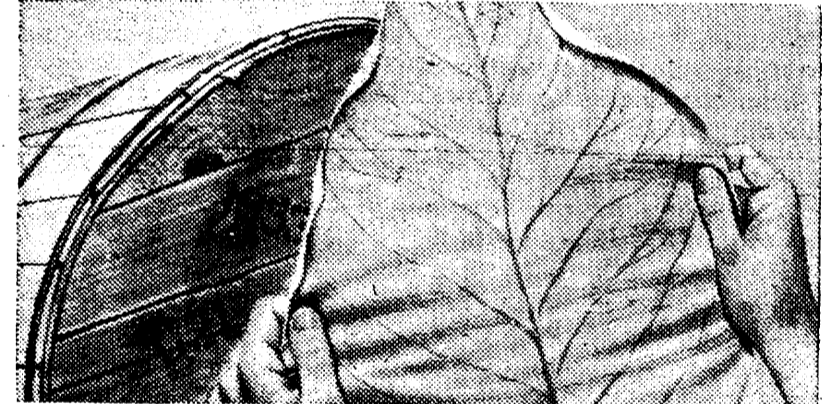

## Presley and Pogo Dethroned; Students & Profs Go Ludwig

Pogo's prime position on lapels has been usurped by a newcomer who has been around for a long time: Ludwig. Ludwig is neither a comic book character, nor is he running

for President. "Ludwig" is short for Ludwig von Beethoven, and lately his stormy mien and flowing mane of hair have been pictured in black and white on a button which is to be seen together with the inscription "I like Ludwig" on the lapels of students and faculty alike.

The buttons are a product of the imaginations of Robert Cenedella Jr., and Edmund Leites, graduates of Music and Art High School. Cenedella, a student at the Art Students' League and brother of a student at the College said that the buttons were part of an "Anti-Elvis movement."

Both Leites, and Cenedella feel that Elvis Presley has been getting far more publicity and attention than he deserves, and that good music has almost been forgotten.

Together with Leites, a freshman at Yale, Cenedella "took a chance" and invested money in their imaginative idea. Besides the initial outlay of \$40 for a thousand buttons, they paid \$100 for the design plate to the Empress Specialty Shop, the makers of the buttons.

The boys expect that their venture will at least pay for itself. "If there is any profit," Cenedella said, "we would like to donate part of it to the College Music Scholarship Fund."

Already, talk of a counter-movement is to be heard among disgruntled students and the rabble-rousing is not restricted to Presley followers. There are rumors of a counter-attack by "Peanuts" fans in the form of buttons bearing the likeness of Charley Brown—the accompanying inscription reading "I Hate Ludwig."

# City Stickmen Succumb To New Hampshire Ten

(Continued from Page One)

The Beaver stickmen regained possession of the ball and once more applied the pressure. At 5:12 of the initial period, attackman Sy Steigelfest grabbed the ball at mid-field and raced in. He fired hard but Carrick neatly swept the ball to one side. Seconds later Derek Heins of the visitors was given a one-minute penalty for tripping. Nesin then reeled off a bullet which the Mountie netminder repelled. Other Lavendermen tried their luck until the beleaguered Carrick pushed the ball out of bounds.

After 7:35 had elapsed, Mike Volpe, co-captain, was sidelined for a minute when he chopped down a New Hampshire player who tried to fight his way toward the home team's nets. This was the first break of the match. Twenty-eight seconds later Doug Mackenzie moved in unimpeded and cleanly dented the twines.

Now it was the visitors who were forcing the play. At about the thirteen-minute mark, Dick Stead received a cross-field pass behind the Beaver goal and came out from the left side. He spun around one defender and smashed a hard shot that hit the lower right bar and bounced out. City grabbed the ball and charged downfield.

Nesin flipped to Mark Rosenberg, who put the tiny orb past Carrick to tie the score at 1-1. With a minute remaining in the frame, Rosenberg dribbled the ball towards the goal but the Mountie net-tender sped over and deflected it to one side.

The Beavers finally gained the lead at 7:18 of the second stanza, when Volpe ran down the right side and passed to Rosenberg. Carrick moved out to cut down his shooting range but Rosenberg pivoted around him and backhanded the ball in. Nesin added to the City advantage minutes later when he flipped the ball into the New Hampshire goal.

It was here that the visitors made their comeback. They lured Beaver goalie Hernandez out to the right and crossed the sphere over to MacKenzie who ripped the cords.

Shortly after, Cashdan, now playing defense, was given a one-minute penalty. Thirty-five seconds later Volpe received a similar sentence for checking from the rear and a third City man was sidelined when Steigelfest

was also charged with an infraction.

No sooner had Cashdan reentered the fray when John Deware, the New Englanders' second defenseman, passed to Bill Jones, who hit the cords and the game was tied at 3-3.

Just before the half ended co-captain Lenny Fagen, who had been a stalwart on defense, suffered an injury when a Mountie attacker hit his knee-cap and forced him out of action until late in the third inning.

The visitors nearly made a route of it when they maintained a sustained attack on the Lavender cage, but Cashdan proved to be their equal with a brilliant demonstration of goal-tending on the many hard, close-up shots.

New Hampshire captured the lead when John Deware tallied from the last period's face off.

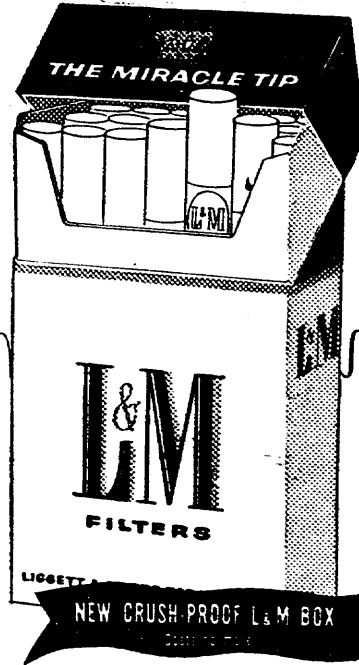
