The Day's events will commence at 10 AM with a forum in Townsend Harris Auditorium and will culminate in a ball that revening in the Finley Center Grand Ballroom.


Among the many attractions will be an art exhibition. Paintings, sculpture and mobiles, submitted by students, will be shown in Goethals Hall.
