Segregation, Dr. Gallagher went on to say, is a "caste notion" which exists today in our society. He said, "Its purpose is to perpetuate segregation." Integration, he concluded, is the only possibility for eliminating discrimination in this country.

Later, while delivering a report to Student Council on the NSA Convention and the structure of that organization, Scheer again referred to Dr. Gallagher's address.

He said it was in "bad taste" to air City College affairs at # national conference, and that the President created a hostile attitude and an "atmosphere of hysteria" by his statements.

Committee Set Up **To Evade Ruling**

Student Council, last night empowered Student Governnient President Bart Cohen to establish a committee for the purpose of circumventing the compulsory membership list ruling. The resolution was passed by a 12-2-2 vote.

The Committee will be composed of eight student leaders who will "sign the membership lists of all those campus organizations who wish to submit their lists to them."

This is the second time action of this type has been taken by resolution was passed, Council show the College administration that the present system of membership lists is not workable."

Last year the General Faculty voted for membership lists, without safeguards, for a period of one year, at which time an outside advisory committee chosen by President Buell G. Gallagher was to give an evaluation of lists at the College.

The three man committee was chosen and Friday, Oct. 4, 1957 was selected as the day that they would submit their reports. At a press conference yesterday, Pres. Gallagher declined any comment on membership lists, declaring that any action he would take would be before the end of the semester. He also declined comment on when the Advisory Committee would present its report.

For students who present either systes or Chemistry the requiretent is three courses. Four semesis of science are required for use who have had neither Physics Chemistry in high school. Formerly it was required for eral Arts students to take four mesters of science subjects readdless of what they had taken high school.




