City University Bill Vetoed By Rockefeller; Gallagher Resigns in Protest Against Action

Council Resolution Praises Pres.

Acting in a late session last night, Student Council passed resolutions to "congratulate" Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller's action in vetoing the City University Bill, and to "heartily congratulate" Dr. Buell G. Gallagher for his "courageous and principled stand" in resigning as president of the College.

The first resolution, introduced by SG President Bob Saynomaw, expressed "concern over the future expansion and improvement of the college without the opportunities provided by the City University."

The resolution expressing Council "regret" over the "loss of its most administrator in a time of great need," was introduced by Bruce Markens. It was heatedly debated before being passed, 17-5.

Student Council realizes the great amount of courage embodied in the President's action, and commends him for this," the resolution stated.

The resolution will show those in Albany that we are not to be trifled with," said Ted Sonde, during passage of the motion.

Peter Steinberg said: "The President's stand is only the culmination of the superb manner in which Dr. Gallagher has conducted himself during his years at the College. It is probably the best and most significant thing he has done thus far."

In stating his opposition to the measure, Herb Berpowitz said, "Although I have the greatest respect for President Gallagher's integrity, I do not concur in his judgement in this matter."

Another resolution passed urged Dean James S. Peace (Department of Student Life) to "follow the example that has been set and uphold the long tradition of courage."
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President Buell G. Gallagher announced his official resignation yesterday after the bill creating a City University was vetoed by Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller.

The news of his resignation was issued at his weekly press conference held yesterday.

The ex-president issued an eighteen page resignation statement entitled "On Principles, Promises and Presidents," in which he said, "I offer my resignation as a protest against the death blow to the future of graduate education and research issued by the Governor."

The resignation threat was made last week at a dinner for Dr. Joseph J. Klein, president of the City College fund.

He declared, "without equivocation," that if the City College is not enabled to go ahead with graduate work and research, she can look for someone other than myself to preside over her decline."

The City University bill was one of 7,941 bills passed unanimously in the closing hour of the State Legislature Friday.

The City University bill was one of the first measures to be acted upon after the Governor's return from a week's vacation in Puerto Rico.

Gov. Rockefeller indicated in a

private telephone interview that he vetoed the measure "Because it did not include provisions for bomb shelter basements to be built on the City University grounds."

"This is a threat to national security," he said.

Pres. Gallagher declared that "I stand on my statement. I am a man of principles. I said I would resign, and therefore I must resign."

"Even if Gov. Rockefeller had not vetoed the City University measure, I would have resigned anyway."

"The bill did not include the five provisions which I consider to be indispensable to the formation of a City University."

These were:

- Elimination of the regulation forbidding students from giving teachers Christmas presents.
- Barring of all professors with PhD's from the teaching staff.
- Establishment of tuition for undergraduates.
- Funds for the fiscal autonomy

• Formation of an investigatory admissions body to exclude from entry all starry-eyed sentimentalists and power mad cynics.

A student petition, urging Pres. Gallagher to "reconsider" his "hasty" decision and remain at the College was signed by 8,947 of the 9,000 students enrolled at the College.

The former President Gallagher said, "this is not a representative cross-section of student opinion. When I get a wider cross-section of student opinion I shall adhere to its mandate."

"My only regret in leaving the College" he said, "is that I will no longer be able to be paternal."

"While I still have faith in the City College students, there will no longer be anyone to maintain academic freedom here by purging the campus of Communists and their propaganda."

In his farewell statement he advised students to be interested in good social causes. "But only good ones," he cautioned.

Student Council last night authorized a "Youth March For Gallagher." Demonstrators will walk to Albany to protest both the veto of the city university and to ask the State Education Department to reinstate ex-president Gallagher. They will leave Monday and plan to return by final exam week.

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Stat. Termed Prejudiced; Clause Rejected by Exec.

The membership clause of the Kappa Ku Kappa (KKK) fraternity was attacked as discriminatory last night by the Student Government Executive Committee.

The provision states that "Membership shall be limited to all male students who believe in the necessity of eradicating the nation of the Negro-Communist conspiracy which has jeopardized the country's prestige in the world and made a mockery of the democratic concept of government."

The clause is restrictive, all SG President Bob Saynomaw solemnly declared. "Those who disagree with the clause are, in effect, expelled from membership."

The Executive Committee has upheld its decision granting temporary charter rights to the fraternity. Final approval must come through the Student Faculty Committee on Student Activities.

Joseph Link Stonebad, KKK's Grand Wizard, the group's president and spiritual advisor, harshly denounced the charges. "Of course Communies would..." he began. A uniformed colleague

of his beckoned to him to calm down.

"You've got the whole thing all wrong," Stonebad began again. "We are a patriotic group of young Americans who are going to save this nation from its doom—at any cost—even if it does not think it must be saved." As the Grand Wizard spoke, his face reddened, his dark eyes protruded, and he impulsively pounded his pudgy fist on the desk.

"We feel that the Kappa Ku Kappa constitution outlines practices which would lead to the arbitrary exclusion of certain persons from their group," an Executive Committee resolution issued yesterday states. "We would like to invite all interested students at the College to write letters to us expressing their opinions on the matter."

Nick Lewin decried both the

Handel Faces Dismissal For Violation Of Tenure

Professor Samuel Handel's tenure has been revoked, the Political Science department revealed yesterday.

The former Political Science department chairman, who has been on a leave of absence this term, will not be asked to return to the College because, according to a department spokesman, "He doesn't spend enough time teaching."

"Prof. Handel has been devoting most of his time in recent years to working for his PhD degree and to writing scholarly articles for publication," a report of the Political Science department to the Board of Higher Education (BHE) states.

"Although such out-of-classroom activity is not to be condemned per se, we have always felt it is the primary duty of a college teacher to teach. In neglecting this vital duty, Prof. Handel has not fulfilled the terms under which he was granted tenure," the report continues.

It concludes: "We therefore have reluctantly decided to release Prof. Handel from the professional staff of the City College."

This drastic action by the College's Political Science department marks the second time within a month that a controversy over tenure has arisen. Three weeks ago it was announced that Mr. Norman Rosenberg (Political Science) will

not be asked to return next semester after teaching at the College for a decade.

Asked to comment on his dismissal, Prof. Handel declared that he was "shocked" by the College's decision.

"I always thought that they [the College] only wanted faculty members who have impressive degrees and write obtuse articles for journals that nobody reads," he said. "At least that's the way we

geous leadership, at the College," by submitting his resignation.

Introduced by Irwin Pronin, the resolution stated that "the total decimation of the ranks of the teaching staffs of the College will serve to convince those in Albany of the futility and wrongness of this action."

Pronin explained that the Deans name had been mentioned "because it is perhaps in this particular resignation that the College will most benefit, as Dean Peace's standing in the school will carry great weight, and his absence will do no great harm."

Another resolution urging that the President of Student Government also resign was ruled "dilatatory and frivolous" by the Chairman.

KKK constitution and the mild treatment it received from SG. "The Inter-Fraternity Council (IFC) will never grant KKK recognition," he said.

A mass demonstration thus far sponsored by Hillel, Marxist Discussion Club, Phi Kappa Theta, Zeta Beta Tau, Pershing Rifles, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, and the Railroad Club will be held on the South Campus Lawn tomorrow at 2 PM to demonstrate opposition to the KKK constitution.

"We will win," Stonebad exclaimed. "We will win over you misguided idealistic youths..."

However, Pres. Gallagher warned students about participating in the protest march. "The whole thing is planned by Communists. While the cause is an excellent one, we must not give Communists an opportunity to infiltrate."

A General Faculty resolution congratulated the ex-President for his "fine record at the College."

Among his achievements are:

- Attendance at 1300 conferences and committee meetings, 1500 luncheons and 6000 dinners.
- Bankruptcy of the City College Press Corporation, of which he is President.
- Printing and distribution of 6000 copies each of a fifty-six page pamphlet "On Freedom Power and Responsibility," an eighteen page "Invitation to Discussion and Debate Before Decision" and nine pages on "The Not so Silent Generation."

In other actions, he condemned seventy-five students for being Communist dominated, twenty-six for being Communist inspired and fifty-nine for being Communist duped.

He has preserved and consistently upheld the democratic principle of academic freedom and maintained himself at all times with "dignity and sincerity."

DSL Has An Offspring Baby Div. to Aid Babies

The College's Department of Student Life (DSL) will expand next term to handle an expected increase in the number of pregnant co-eds. The new department will be called the Department of Student Pregnancy Services (DPS).

The expected influx of mothers-to-be stems from last month's revocation by the Board of Higher Education of a 100 year old by-law which had prohibited pregnant women from attending classes at the Municipal Colleges.

According to Dean James S. Peace (DSL) of the new department, the main concern will be to guarantee a "healthy political outlook" in both mother and child.

"We believe in sound politics in a student body," the Dean said yesterday.

"We want our young ladies to feel that they can count on us to help them with any problem. You know I really feel very fatherly towards many of them, and you never can tell, can you? Besides," he added, "it's consistent with our policy of Paternalism."

The Dean stated that he felt personally responsible for any girl at the College who had "made a mistake." "I do my best," he said. "I point out at every meeting of the Board of Managers that the fourth floor of Finley is always covered with contraceptives."

Dean Peace suggested getting rid of the couches in Finley Center, the abandonment of co-ed hygiene classes and admitting only married students to lectures at the Christian Association as a possible solution to the problem.

According to the Dean, the DPS will require the expectant mothers to sign "maternity cards" at the beginning of each semester. He stated that this regulation would have to apply to all pregnant co-eds including "sensitive cases."

The cards will be kept under my personal safeguard. They will be available to no one except the Margaret Sanger Clinic, Baby Food Companies, the College's Biology Department, and Campus editors."

Farm on South Campus Supplies Food For Cafs.

Carrots, stringbeans and alfalfa will be planted on the South Campus lawn within the week by students and faculty, Mr. Kenneth G. Flemming (Building and Grounds) announced yesterday.

The College's newly initiated Farm Project (CFP) is a direct result of the poor quality of food being served in both the North and South cafeterias. "It appeared as if the only way the student body could assure itself of a variety of pure and wholesome food was to grow its own," Ted Sonde, SC Cafeteria Committee Chairman, said emphatically.

As part of the plan, students and faculty alike will pitch in with the crops to have them ready for the fall semester. Simultaneously, livestock, primarily of the smaller variety, such as rabbits, goats and hogs will be raised in Room 123 Finley and in nearby Bittenweiser Lounge.

The Department of Student Life will be enlarged to include the Division of Animal Management and Nutrition (DAMN).

The heifers and Guernsey cows will be kept temporarily on the fourth floor of the Morris Raphael Cohen Library. "Students were always asking me why the ramps were built into the Library," Jerome K. Wilcox (Librarian) said slyly. "It's obvious now, isn't it?"

Mr. Wilcox also announced, regretfully, that the Library would have to "be kept open around the clock" from now on. "The cows must be fed, you know," he de-

In defiance of President Gallagher's ban more than 100 academicians accepted student gifts of liquor last Christmas, Observation Post learned today.

Clandestine seasonal offerings ranged in quality from Chivas Regal scotch to six-packs of beer.

Professor B. S. Whirlwind (English) helped to compile a list of errant faculty members, after being caught last night by a Burns guard in an attempt to drag cartons filled with bottles to his car.

Christmas gift tags found in the boxes pointed to student involvement.

Nero Spillane, the Burns guard, reported that "at 11:30 PM I noticed Prof. Whirlwind hauling something out the front gate. Naturally I offered to help."

"But when I picked up a box, I could hear bottles clanking.

"Prof. Whirlwind suddenly grabbed the carton from my hands and it accidentally fell, spilling liquor bottles and beer cans on the sidewalk," he said.

Mr. Spillane soon discovered to his "horror" that every bottle was empty. And that one holiday card was signed by "your English Lit. class."

Prof. Whirlwind was joined by two colleagues, Professor Alvin Gettleluce (Pol. Sci.) and Professor Nathan Timeman (Eco.), who "stealthily appeared from behind a mailbox," Spillane said.

"Then the three teachers tried to bribe me," he added "I was offered the money I'd get from turning the bottles in to Ben's Broadway Liquor Store."

"I flatly refused the offer," Spil-

lane declared.

Professors Whirlwind, Gettleluce and Timeman subsequently listed more than a hundred faculty recipients of Christmas cheer.

Investigatory action by the General Faculty seems unlikely. A majority of its members are on the liquor list.

Those students implicated in the "Christmas spirit of giving" appear to be exempt from disciplinary action. In the darkness, Professor Gettleluce managed to swallow all gift tags.

Ex-president Buell G. Gallagher, whose name was not on the list, was available today for only brief comment.

"Students involved were apparently organized by left-wing groups," the former President asserted.

"The liquor was tainted," he said.

Goldberg's Hat in Ring Again; Urges War to End Cold War

Stuart Goldberg, head of the End of the Cold War Party and a "nihilist who believes only in frogs" jumped into the Student Government presidential race for the second time in as many terms.

Goldberg, who finished fourth in a field of four last term, croaked that "This time I will go before the electorate with far more than the purely intellectual concepts I used in the last election."

The gangling senior emphasized that although his party is not currently in office they still have been active.

"Just last week we greeted an exchange group of Russian milkmaids from the city of Hovencovitz by throwing pails of milk and cottage cheese in their faces. Then, to make them feel at home, we sang several choruses of 'Kzlmnoq Rausch Mullek,' an old dairy maid drinkingsong, which, freely translated, means Don't Cry Over Split Milk."

Fingering a button reading 'Stop Nuclear Testing, Let's Bomb Russia,' Goldberg promised that "by the end of my term of office we will see the rockets' red glare and bombs bursting in air." After unpledging his heart and sitting down, the man who "changes his underwear every day and is proud of it," enumerated his proposals:

"I will ask Student Council to set up a standing committee. This committee will stand on pier 33 and chuck rocks at Russian sailors and boats.

"I will ask Council to picket all establishments selling Chinese Fortune cookies. Our slogan will be 'Spare the Cookies and save the mainland.' Since I'm an honors history student, I didn't at first realize the Cookies are made here and not in Red China—contemporary facts, you know. However, I will continue with the program, since it's the thought that counts," he said.

"I will, by executive order, have the SG Flight Agency bomb La Universidad de Habana during Havana's Thursday 12 Noon to 2 PM break. The Civil Aeronautics Board has guaranteed me a charter and Dean Peace says I may use the College's name.

"I will instruct the Student Government Cultural Agency to spill crank case oil on stage during the Moiseyev Ballet Company's next appearance in this country. These cultural exchanges have got to stop—too damn much understanding," he asserted.

judged a teacher when I was chairman," he acknowledged.

Among the most notable articles written by Prof. Handel, who taught courses in Russian government at the College are: "An Analysis of the History and Method of Election of the Three-Member Town Council of Slobodskoi, USSR" (1950); and "Bulganin—The Next Stalin" (1956).

The only voice raised in opposition to the decision of the Political Science department regarding the release of Prof. Handel was that of his colleague, Mr. Rosenberg, who would like the dapper professor to remain "even though he fired me." However, he added that "a rule is a rule."

Prof. Handel, who intends to appeal the department's action before the BHE, implied that the grounds for his dismissal may not have been entirely objective ones.

"If only there wasn't so much politicking going on in the Political Science department," Prof. Handel lamented.

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New Team Scandal Rocks College; DA Has Quintet Under His Custody

The College was shaken yesterday by the uncovering of a major rifle scandal here which will "dwarf the two basketball scandals," according to District Attorney Frank Hogan.

The five stars of the College's rifle team were charged with "failing to clean their weapons during the last two months of the season, and leaving themselves liable to goof because of this negligence."

For such slovenly behavior, this quintet was paid sometimes as much as the week's carfare by a husky man who seemingly posed as the team's coach.

It made no difference to the District Attorney's office that the team went through its entire regular season without a loss.

According to a spokesman "The thorough investigations being made have left no stone unturned, no clue unfollowed, nobody alone."

"The fact that the team did not perform up to the best of its capabilities is our main reason for the arrest of these five boys. Their getting paid isn't so bad. We also have reason to believe that one of the team's members was admitted to the College with an IQ of less than 130. This attests to gross commercialism of athletics."

"It's true," wailed Don Nunns, Bernie Renois, John Hirth, Tom Picunke, and Jim McCusker in chorus at Magistrates' Court late yesterday afternoon. "We didn't mean it, but that's the way the bullet flies."

The administration and faculty, as well as the students, viewed the situation in much the same way.

"Oh, damn" was President Gallagher's first statement upon learning of the scandal which could

mean the death of the sport in collegiate circles.

"What this now means," Dr. Gallagher went on, "is that we'll have to go through with what we've been threatening for a long time."

"Yeah, we're gonna have to start a complete de-emphasis of sports. From now on, the rifle team will play only cub-scout outfits and maybe occasionally, the College's ROTC. No more of this nonsense about Brooklyn Poly Evening and Stevens Tech. When temptation beckons, some few will always rush in," he concluded, giving his spectacles a knowing tug.

Nat Holman had some advice to

offer. He put forth that a special national committee be formed to guard against "irregular practices" in college riflery.

District Attorney Frank Hogan could not be reached for further questioning, but it appears that the rifle team will get off with perhaps only a couple of years at hard labor each.
