Dean Denies Malcolm X **Speaking Priveleges**

Malcome X, local leader of the Black Muslim movement, was barred Monday from a scheduled speaking engagement at Queens College by Dean of Students James Kreuzer.

Levelling charges of rascism against Malcome X, Dean Kreuzer notified the Queens College National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) before whom Malcome X was to appear that the Muslim divinity leader would not be allowed to speak at the Queens College campus.



When the Administrative Council of Municipal College Presidents last week temporarily banned all Communist ingly human article. For some speakers from the city colleges, the danger to academic reason there was no byline on freedom became apparent. With the disclosure Thesday, of Hunter College's refusal to rent an auditorium to the editor of a conservative magazine, a trend became evident. The most recent act in the "banning" drama-the barring of Muslim leader Malcolm X from Queens College on the ground that he is a "racist" makes the present position of avadenic freedom at the municipal colleges ludicrous.

Communists may not speak. Conservatives may not Dear Editor: speak. So called "racists" may not express their views. What next? All this to protect the impressionable minds of city college students. Either the municipal college administrators think of their students as simpletons, or else they are fall. The occasion will be the yielding to pressure being exerted on them by outside appearance of the two leading groups who seek truth with blinders.

A college campus should be a testing ground for ideas. Acting President Rivlin has repeatedly emphasized the impostance of having diverse viewpoints aired, it is differences of opinion on important issues that makes the College a vital place, he has said. 

Soccermen Ride to 5-1 Romp Over Hunter On Windischmann (2), Negovetti (2) Scores

No, the party's not over yet.

Those who expected to see a worn-down, dispirited Lavender soccer team at Hunter yesterday met with faint success as the Beavers, scoring in every period, rollicked to a 5-1 victory over Hun-

ter's Hawks.

Henry Windischmann, whose pair of goals had the Beavers ahead by a 2-1 count at half time, and Tony Negovetti, who added a pair in the third quarter, led the rout. It gave the Beavers a 3-0 league record.

Earle Scarlett scored the last goal for the Lavender.

For just one fleeting moment did it appear that the Hawks, who surprised Brooklyn College last Saturday, 2-1, would send the Beavers to a second straight loss.

This came in the early moments of the second quarter when Gary Kuti, who played like a veritable one-man army, kicked a rolling ball past goalie Andy Houtkruyer.

Windischmann, with an assist from Sylvan Sidi, had sent the Lavender to an early lead, at 12:06 of the opening quarter. But Kuti's goal, which came during a period of Hawk-dominated action, seemd to place the Hawks in a favorable spot for the kill.

The Beaver defense rose to the fore at this point and held the Hawks at bay, before Windischmann scored the lead goal only six seconds before the half time break.

Windischmann broke in on Hawk goaltender Mike Magenheim, who deflected the shot to-


