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

Prof. Strappe came to the College after a one-year stay at the University of California at Berkeley. He teaches six graduate courses based on the works of

the CIA operative on campus, an unnamed professor in the Numismatics Department, ordered him to "hide in a supposedly 'out-oforder' soda machine in South Campus cafeteria so that I could monitor the conversations of dis-

sidents." "An agent is one thing," he said, "but a spy is something else again."

#### Dolitical kace; Y ermack Drops

By ABBY LINCOLN PREEN Citing "undue political pressure," Student Government Treasurer Larry Yermack withdrew his candidacy for SG President in the forthcoming May elections last night.

Yermack, who announced his candidacy last week as the leader of an anti-war slate, said he only made the withdrawal after "a lot of deep thought," but knowledgeable observers were speculating as to unspoken reasons for the sudden, dramatic move.

"It is well known that there are factions on this campus which would go to any extent to see an anti-war slate stopped at the start," said Barry Shrage, a member of Council's so-called New Left. He refused to expand on the statement but the implications were far-reaching.

When reached for comment at home, Dean Leo Hamalion (Curricular Guidance) noted an "astounding lack of interest on the part of the student body for Student

Government and it would be quite easy for a small group of extremists to go to any lengths to accomplish their aims. without arousing the anger of the students."

Steve Schlesinger, a council member, noted for his opposition to the Yermack clique on Council said: "If the student body lacks interest in Council, but some retain an interest, it's up to those who still retain that interest to do what they want to make a better campus government, if they feel like it. I don't believe in forcing people to be coherent." Schlesinger refused to speculate on the nature of any action taken against Yermack.

Yermack's withdrawal leaves Barry Ostrager and Joe Korn, Educational Affairs Vice President, the only two candidates left for the SG Presidency. Ostrager, a council member, said, "I note with sorrow Yermack's withdrawal and yet welcome the opportunity to be the leader of the liberal faction."

Korn, who was the first to announce his candidacy, said he had not thought much about the withdrawal but noted that Yermack "had such confidence a short while ago, and now he's copping out. I wonder where his lousy friends are?"

"I am concerned, but it's lunchtime," said another.

"I'm bewildered," said still another. "I can't understand it at all. It's beyond my ken." Bitting his nails, he ran down the corridor.

Yermack's plans for the future are unspecified, but he said he would like to spend his time "just being a student and acting under the dictates of my student life."

Smelly Sochs, present SG President and a staunch supporter of Yermack's bid for election, has reportedly taken Yermack's withdrawal quite personally.


Dr. Bull Giggler, president of the College, said yesterday that that the German Department has been noted for "kooks and kookettes" among its instructors, but




