

# Eruption Causes 20 Arrests

Twenty students were arrested yesterday at Manhattan Community College in the culmination of a month of student activism.

Eight students were arrested when they attempted to meet with school president, Edgar Draper. The remaining students were taken into custody in the school auditorium, and charged with criminal trespass.

The students had previously received permission to use the auditorium by the President to hold an anti-war rally.

Among those arrested were the President of the Student Government, the Chairwoman of the Work Studies Committee, and the leader of a Black group on campus called the "Golden Drum."

Students involved had been demanding adequate child care facilities, and the restoration of the Work Study program.

Approximately half of the student body was employed in the Work Study program before it was eliminated this past semester.

Student leaders were quoted as saying that "every time three students go anywhere near the President's office he calls the cops." It was charged that police have been called on campus thirty times in the past semester.

Yesterday's arrest began when eight students attempted to meet with Dr. Draper to discuss their grievances. Reportedly, Draper told them he had nothing to discuss and that they had five minutes to leave his office or the police would be called. The students refused and were subsequently taken into custody.

A crowd of about 150 students gathered outside of the President's office. When they refused to disperse additional police were called in.

Students then moved to the auditorium, where an anti-war rally was in progress. At that time the President and the Dean of Stu-

dents moved through the crowd in the auditorium and pointed out individuals to the police. Those students were then taken into custody and charged with criminal trespass.

A spokesman stated that "there was absolutely no basis for arresting the twelve students in the auditorium. Draper had given us permission to use the auditorium, so how could we be trespassing?"

The twenty students were taken to the 18th Precinct and booked. A crowd of about 400 students followed, and held a demonstration in front of the station house. However, the police erected barricades in order to keep students away from the entrance of the precinct.

Student leaders ordered the school closed for the remainder of the day. In addition they have made plans to set up picket lines to boycott today's classes, and hold a noon rally in the school auditorium.

## Pressures Cause Mothers To Raise More Finances

Sandra Small, Vice-President for Community Affairs, along with several mothers from the City College Child Care Center, organized and held a food and rummage sale late last week in an effort to raise money for supplies, children's furniture, and lunches.

Sources close to this newspaper disclosed hints of administrative pressures being applied to the Child Care Center.

Bernard Sohmer, the Dean of Students, allegedly stated that money made from the upcoming concerts could be used in whatever form the Concert Committee and the Student Senate deemed necessary so long as no part of that money be channeled to Child Care.

The items for sale, which included fried chicken, rice and beans, Nigerian stew, books, tools and clothing yielded a gain of close to three hundred dollars.

Presently, the Child Care Center is located in the Webb room of Shepard Hall.

The placement of the Center in the Webb room has caused several inconveniences to the children, mothers and staff of Shepard Hall.

The room, located on the fifth

floor, has no running water and is two flights away from the nearest bathroom facilities.

There is no refrigerator in which to store milk, juices and lunches. The room is scheduled to be cleaned by the maintenance staff only four times a year.

The mothers have not been allowed to use the kitchen facilities of the faculty dining room on the fifth floor. Larry Bartolotto, Food Service Director, said

that the reason for this is that the College insurance does not cover cases of injury to children or students in the kitchen areas.

He further stated that the waitresses were too busy during the lunch period to get water or to take things out of the refrigerator for the mothers.

In order to help the mothers, Bartolotto personally brought up lunch for the children, consisting

## Young Workers Investigated

The Subversive Activities Control Board (SCAB) is conducting hearings today at the Federal Office Building, 26 Federal Plaza, at 2 p.m., to determine if the Young Workers Liberation League (YWLL) is a Communist front.

The YWLL plans to boycott the hearings, and has announced that a counter demonstration will be held in front of the Federal Office Building an hour before the hearings begin.

The SACB is a five man committee that was established by the McCarran Act, which requires that all persons considered to be subversive to the American government be registered as such.

The Board investigates various groups and individuals to determine if they are subversive, and, if their findings are substantiated, the names are then placed on an un-American listing.

The five members of the board receive \$36,000 a year in salary, plus expenses and administrative personnel.

The YWLL was described by Bob Heisler, a CCNY student and member of the organization, as a "Marxist-Leninist youth

organization made up of Black, Brown, and White workers and students."

Their primary energy is devoted to finding jobs for unemployed youths, and demanding the total withdrawal of U.S. military aid to Indo-China. In the past few months the YWLL has been conducting demonstrations for the release of Angela Davis.

The SACB has charged that the YWLL is a communist front (Continued on Page 8)

## Peace March This Weekend

A march for peace will take place in Washington D.C. this coming Saturday, April 24. The Student Mobilization Committee is sponsoring the march.

However other coalitions, such as the National Peace Action Coalition, United Women's Contingent, and the Concerned Officers Movement will also be represented. The march will essentially focus on the total withdrawal of U.S. troops from southeast Asia and an end to the draft.

At press time it was learned that the SMC will hold a meeting at the Holy Apostle Church (located on 28th Street and 8th Avenue) to give instructions to those people interested in serving as marshalls at the peace

march in Washington D.C. The meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m.

The importance of the marshalls is reflected in the fact that they are to be relied upon to keep the march peaceful, which the sponsor explained as "being essential for the success of the event."

The march is scheduled to begin at ten o'clock on the 24th, with a noon walk along Pennsylvania Avenue. The march is expected to end with a rally.

Some of the guests and speakers expected will be Mrs. Coretta King, Senators McGovern, Muskie, Hart, Hughes, Hartke, and Tunney.

In the evening a religious service will be held sponsored by the Concerned Officers Movement.

The Student Mobilization Committee urges all concerned parties to attend the demonstration in Washington. Buses will be provided by the SMC with a round-trip ticket priced at \$10.

The march in Washington D.C., precedes a planned demonstration which will be held in Bryant Park on May 5th. This demonstration will focus on the anniversary of the Kent State and Jackson State killings during the Laos invasion by the United States.

Volunteers are also being sought for this demonstration. Those desiring further information concerning either march should contact the New York office of the Student Mobilization Committee, located at 135 W. 14th Street, by phoning 675-8465.

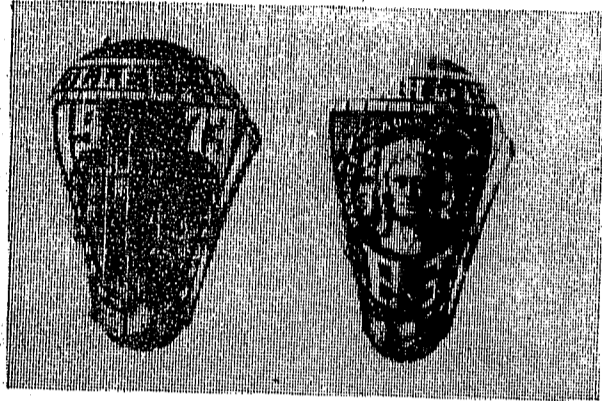

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# Reviewing The Jewish Scene

The Jewish Community is being led in a reactionary direction. There was a time, not so long ago, when Jews all over the Western world were a severely oppressed minority.

At that time, the Jewish people were a center of progressive politics. The Jews provided far more than their share of fighters for social justice, against racism and oppression. (Remember the Jewish-Communist conspiracy?)

With the end of World War II and the defeat of Hitler's Germany, anti-semitism became uncool, and overt oppression lessened.

Now American society at large offers Jews a piece of the pie, and a stake in the Establishment. But many influential American Jews with short memories and flexible backbones are suggesting that it is time for Jews to give up their traditions of concern for justice and take the side of the (oppressors) all over the world.

To many, it is still not clear that the various isolated positions that these members of the community ask them to take are tied together.

Yet these positions follow a very definite pattern; the directions in which the Jewish Community is asked to move on many individual issues add up to support for the American Status Quo; a reactionary position, both domestically and internationally.

As is often the case among ethnic groups in America, this attack from within upon the Jewish cultural heritage takes the form of a militant "nationalism," a narrow appeal to "national self-interest," which sees the interests of Jews as opposed to those of other peoples here in America and abroad.

Right-wing Jews argue that Jews have been too concerned with "other people;" that it is time to concern themselves with their own "survival."

It is, perhaps, true that had Jews not so often concerned themselves with social justice and ethics, they would not have been persecuted so much, but they would not have been Jews either. It is a thinly disguised assimilationism that attacks the finest qualities of a people on the grounds that they would not be persecuted as much if they dropped them!

The self-hatred of the right-wing Jews is revealed by their continual complimentary reference to how the non-Jews behave.

"The Goys understand the significance of physical strength; therefore we should become strong too." "The Goys launch aggressive invasions; so can we."

The attack upon the left-wing tendencies inherent in the Jewish tradition has taken three main roads: support for American racism, support for imperialism in Vietnam and the Middle East, and an attempt to fan the flames of the cold war by manufacturing an anti-Soviet movement.

Attempts of varying degrees of success to incite Jews against Blacks (and vice versa) have mainly centered around the school system.

Due to historical circumstance, many Jews have ended up in the school system, mainly as teachers. The characteristic Jewish love for learning has certainly played a part in the higher level of education of the

# Bowker Resigns Post

Albert H. Bowker resigned from the post of Chancellor of the City University last week and announced his acceptance of a position similar to that of president of a college at the University of California at Berkeley.

In contrast to media reports that his resignation was "un-

expectedly sudden," and unknown to members of the Board of Higher Education (BHE), the Chancellor explained to members of the Student Press that "though it wasn't official until (last) Friday, I had informed the (Berkeley) search committee that if they offered me the position I would accept it. Over the past month I've had the

privilege of visiting the Berkeley campus twice, and met with several administrators."

Asked if the present budget crisis influenced his decision to accept the post, Bowker said, "No. The idea of returning to the campus scene was irresistible. I've stated before that I didn't believe anyone should hold the position of chancellor for more than ten years, and I've been here eight."

He further explained that he receives offers from colleges and universities six times per year, and that, though he did not give any of the others serious thought, a university "as noteworthy as Berkeley, I couldn't resist."

Regarding the CUNY budget crisis, Bowker stated that he intends to "lead the fight this year regardless of my decision to leave." He explained that the budget fight was too important to ignore and stated that at least four hundred million dollars is needed for the City University to be able to function properly during the next fiscal year.

He added that the tight budget may possibly endanger the Open Admissions Program, as well as the "perennial danger of adjusting students to monies available, as opposed to the other way around."

Bowker, who came from Stanford University where he served as dean of the Graduate Division for five years, took the office of Chancellor in October, 1963. At that time the CUNY system included four senior colleges, (City, Hunter, Brooklyn and Queens), and five community colleges (New York City, Staten Island, Bronx, Queensborough, and Kingsborough). Since then, five more senior colleges (Baruch, John Jay College of Criminal Justice, Richmond, York and Medgar Evers), and three community colleges (CC No. 9, LaGuardia and Hostos), along with Mt. Sinai School of Nursing, have been added.

Special programs such as Open Admissions, SEEK, College Discovery and others have been credited to the Chancellor's ability as an administrator.

Presently, the Board is organizing a search committee to find a replacement for the vacancy, and Albert H. Bowker is expected to begin his new career at Berkeley on July 1st.

Jewish segment of the population, and its corresponding high representation in literate jobs.

As a result of the institutional racism of our society, the schools in large cities are understaffed, badly equipped, and insensitive to the needs of the children and their parents.

The Jewish teacher, caught in this situation must make a choice. He can support the school bureaucracy, (his employer), which prevents an education from taking place by its endless regulations, banned books and petty red tape.

Or he can support the fight of community groups to make the schools decent places both for him to work and for the children to work.

His interests clearly lie with the community. He has to fight the school administration every time he wants to get anything done, and unless he is a sadist, he gets little pleasure out of

running a school like a prison.

Many teachers see this, but many others are either scared for their jobs, or blinded by racism. The fact that some of these teachers are Jewish, and are fighting Black Community groups is used as an excuse to whip up racism among Jews.

The second mainstay of the attempt to turn Jews into reactionaries is the international scene with respect to Israel and Vietnam. When Meir Kahane spoke here at City College recently, he indicated that he had supported the war in Vietnam because he was afraid that America would lose the "will to fight," and fail to support Israel in a pinch. In other words, a victory by those who oppose militarism here might cause America to withdraw from its outpost, among which Kahane counts Israel.

Now, it is well known that within Israel there is intense

disagreement about the present aggressive course being followed by the Israeli government. Kahane and his followers support it, and clearly depend upon American assistance to maintain Israel's aggressive position. The connection he sees between American Imperialism in Indochina and in Israel is no mistake; it is no accident that Golda Meir has repeatedly expressed support for the American war in Vietnam.

Kahane's faction within Israel is the most reactionary one, the one which sees Israel as an American satellite.

Jews in America have been reluctant to see the situation in the Middle East in this light, largely because of close emotional ties with Israel.

Yet it has been remarked by many visitors to Israel that the Israeli people are less enthusiastic about endless war with

of soup and sandwiches. The mothers felt that the lunches were unsatisfactory, claiming that the sandwiches were stale, and this service was discontinued after a week.

In addition to these administrative difficulties, there have been several problems within the Center itself. Several volunteers began psychological studies on the children without the permission of the mothers.

Another difficulty is that there is little direction in the Center. There is no full-time staff and no one mother or volunteer is at the Center long enough to coordinate or direct activities.

A general lethargy and lack of cooperation among the mothers

has also hampered progress at times.

The Webb room was only meant to be a temporary site for the Center and a committee to find a suitable building, headed by Professor Silverberg, has been at work for several weeks.

At a meeting of the committee on Friday, it was reported that the Alumni Association is willing to lease or sell a building it owns in the Hamilton Terrace area to the College for the purpose of housing the Center.

The College could either buy the brownstone right away or lease it for five years. If at the end of the time the College was interested in purchasing the building, twenty-five percent of the rent paid would be deducted

from the price.

The problem with this proposal is that the house has to be renovated before occupancy. The house would not be ready until next December. Until that time the children would have to remain in the Webb room.

The mothers are hoping to run the Child Care Center during the eight weeks of summer session. Sandra Small stated that she would like to have the Center located in Finley center for the eight weeks but as yet no definite arrangements have been made.

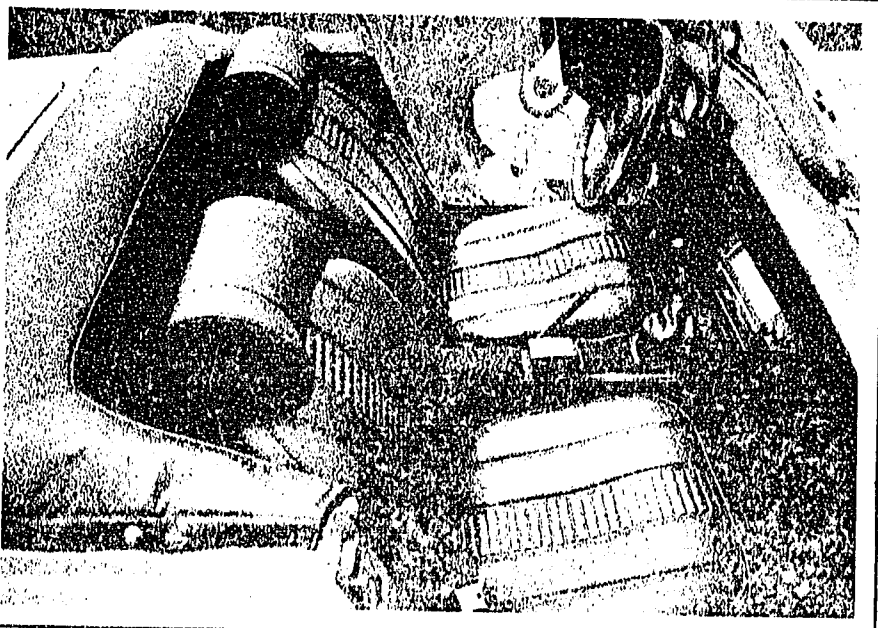
Miss Small, along with the mothers, is interested in using Finley Center because of the availability of meeting rooms with adjoining kitchens.

Rockefeller tries to stick it to Lindsay by slashing the budget for higher education. Tuition doesn't even stir the emotions of the lounge crowd. Why should they give a shit. "Daddy" will write the check out in September.

A drug commission takes four months to tell us that there are a lot of drugs around, and since it is a national problem there really isn't very much they can do about it.

At the same time the pushers who got locked up in November are out of jail and back on campus. They're the ones with the glassy eyes who sit on the window sills outside of the snack bar. We didn't need a drug commission to give us solutions. The windows are open, all you have to do is shove the motherfucker's out.

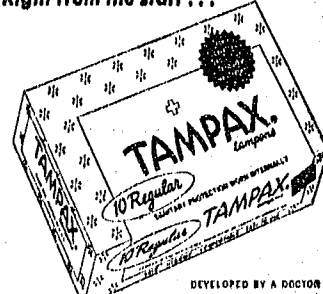

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## Open Letter

### To Asian Students

The American anti-war movement has largely concentrated on the American losses of life, money, equipment, prestige and honor in Southeast Asia. The focus of the movement, even now, remains, "Bring the troops home," while the effect of the war on Asian people is glossed over.

It is the borders of Asian countries that have been violated and invaded; it is Asian people who have been the victims of forced evacuations; it is the destruction of Asian peasants' farms and homes and countryside by indiscriminate artillery and air bombardment, defoliation and napalming.

My Lai was a massacre of Asian women and children; it is Asian women being raped and prostituted; it is the Asian people who have suffered the grief and sorrow of over 1,500,000 lives lost.

The American government arrogantly claims to be liberators and denies genocide while the peace movement plays it down and our people, Asian people, continue to die by the thousands.

As Asians, we have remained silent through many crimes, big and small, which have been committed against us. Many of us have taken to thinking of ourselves as Americans first and Chinese, Japanese, or Korean second.

Yet America's true attitude toward Asians is demonstrated by this country's long history of racist crimes perpetrated, even to this very day on Chinese, Japanese, Korean, and Filipino minorities.

At this moment, America is busily going about the bloody business of committing its most heinous crime against Asian people in the biocide of Southeast Asia.

I'm tired of hearing the myth that Asian lives are somehow less valuable than the lives of other people, e.g. "My God, there's so many of them, what's a few million here or there?" I'm tired and angry to hear people say that Asians view themselves cheaply. These myths serve only to justify the continuing slaughter of Asian people.

There are many Asians in America who've been against the war, but who have been isolated, passive, or feeling very impotent. Some of us have been speaking out, moving first as individuals and then getting and moving together. We are saying our lives and those of our families and people are valuable. We refuse to condone the American slaughter of Asian people by remaining silent.

We, as Chinese, Japanese, Korean or Phillipinos are representatives of Asian people here in America and must bring to the American public the suffering, misery, grief and death that is the fate of Cambodians, Laotian and Vietnamese people because of the continuing violations of their sovereignty, interests and will.

We must build an Asian role and voice within the American society that will address itself to the oppression of Asian people, wherever they may be. Asian lives are not cheap and it must be Asians who must make that statement.

There will be an Asian contingent in the anti-war march in Washington on April 24. If you as an Asian are sick of the biocide being perpetrated on Asian people, then join us in Washington on the 24th.

There will be buses leaving from Chinatown, here in N.Y.C. on Friday, April 23 at 6:30 p.m. and Saturday morning, April 24 at 6:00 a.m. from 50 Madison Street (near Madison and Catherine St.) on both days.

Round trip bus tickets will be sold for \$10 and \$9 for the Friday and Saturday buses respectively. Accomodations will be provided for the people on the Friday evening bus; just bring your sleeping gear.

There will be an Asian contingent headquarters set up in Washington to co-ordinate all Asians coming in for the march on the White House and the Capitol building.

If you're tired and sick of the stereotypes America has of you, of the killing, raping, and maiming of Asian people, then say so, and let's say it together! We'll raise our voices not as Japanese, Chinese, or Koreans but as Asians, demanding a stop to the genocide of Asian people! March with us and reclaim the humanity which is being denied to you and your people!

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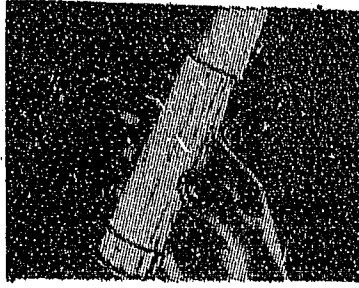

 the Arabs, and the death and destruction that it entails, than are many American Jews. One does Israel no favor by supporting the present government there, any more than one helps America by supporting Nixon. Once again, the American Jew must make a choice; to support the forces of reaction internationally, or to support the needs of oppressed peoples all over the world. Those who say that it is in the Jewish interest to support reaction prefer, for the first time in history, to associate Jews with the extermination in Vietnam and the oppression of Arabs.

It is sheer sophistry to argue that becoming a cut throat in the eyes of the world is a means to survival.

The issue of Soviet Jewry has aroused the passions of many people who are otherwise quite left. The support for the movement by (once again!) the Jewish Defense League and associated groups does not seem to arouse suspicions in people whose honesty is beyond doubt.

People involved in this movement seem unaware of the situation in the world today. Kahane suggests that his purpose is to sabotage peaceful relations between the United States and the USSR; to this end his supporters place bombs at concerts, beat up hecklers, attack newspaper offices, bomb Communist Party headquarters, etc.

Whether they will succeed is doubtful, but there is no doubt that the efforts of Jewish right wingers are devoted to fanning the flames of the cold war to a higher level, and spreading anti-communist doctrine that

was prevalent during the McCarthy era and still prevails among the most reactionary groups in the United States.

Claims of Anti-semitism in the USSR raised by Kahane undoubtedly have some basis in fact, but his argument that anti-semitism is a policy of the government, and that the Soviets are planning to exterminate the Jews ("never again") are not backed by any evidence.

Indeed, the evidence that has been presented does not add up to an indictment of official policy towards Jews, and seems to indicate that Soviet oppression of Jews, if it indeed exists, does not approach the American persecution of minorities.

Arguments center around book publications and immigration statistics; no reference has been made to heroin being distributed among Soviet Jews, National Guardsmen shooting innocent people in Jewish communities, stores overcharging Jewish customers or excluding them, or Jewish leaders being shot down in the streets.

The concrete question of the type of oppression suffered must be dealt with to put things in some sort of perspective.

The movement to "free Soviet Jews" has been produced mainly for the purpose of rejuvenating a type of rightist political atmosphere that is dying in this country, owing to the barbarities of the "free world" across the globe.

To say the least, it is a distraction from the issues that concretely confront Americans now.

In each case, American Jews have a choice between support for a status quo in America,

whose barbarity and immorality have only been exceeded (maybe) by the Nazis, and support for the forces of change.

Historically, Jews have supported change; now that their own oppression has become less, they are faced with the tougher chal-

lenge of maintaining their ethical tradition in the face of assimilationist trends.

Those who think that support for the oppressors is the safest road to follow will rightly be despised by the decent opinion of mankind. If Jews as a group allow themselves to be associated with these elements, they may be responsible for a resurgence of anti-semitism, one that will be hard to combat.

The tide in the world is turning against the rulers of America, against war and racism. Human decency, as well as long term survival, demands that Jews and all people should not be divided, but should come together to fight their common enemy.

 organization. In a preliminary hearing held two months ago Jarvis Tyner, the National Chairman of the organization, read a statement to the board members which condemned their investigation as being repressive.

Tyner immediately left the hearing after completing the text of his statement. Members of the YWLL are allowed to participate in the hearings by questioning witnesses and challenging any and all testimony.

The bulk of the testimony comes from Federal agents who have infiltrated the group, and paid informants.

Heisler said that "the board likes to give the aura that the hearings are being conducted in

a courtroom style with all legal rights given to the defendants." Heisler said that this was far from the fact and therefore the YWLL decided not to participate in the hearings.

Charging that the SACB's role is "political repression of Labor, Black Liberation, and the entire freedom movement," the YWLL calls for all people to defend the right to dissent by participating in the demonstration.

The announced speakers for the demonstration, which will be held at 1 p.m. at 25 Federal Plaza, are Jarvis Tyner, a representative of the United Farmworkers Committee, and David Poindexter, who has recently been cleared of Federal charges in the alleged harboring of Angela Davis.

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
