This often taxes the resources of the examine In the case of a timid or frightened child, funny toys or enticing pictures are useful in leadiner him into a frame of mind and mang happie that the subsequent only part of a examination only part of a game.
A complete record of each case ex amined in the Clinic is compiled. Thi record includes the significant fact of personal history, of school record of physical condition, of mental sta fus, and the recommendations madr for care and treatment. A brief o such record is furnished to those re sponsible for the child's welfare.
In order to understand the natur of the child and the characteristics which made him exceptional or differ. ent from other children, he is given a thorough and comprehensive examination. This examination entails a great deal of time and care and consists of several parts, each of which essential for the final diagnosis.
