

Quintet Completes Poorest Year in Holman Regime

26-12, but the Canadians provided the Lavender with unexpected, stiff opposition. With Hodesblatt at the tap-off position and Raskin breaking into the line-up instead of Goichman, the local hoopsters were trailing the Canadians 14-9 when the first bell rang.

A sudden spurt in the final period, and a last minute shot from the side by Irv Goldberg tied the score at 25-25, sending the game into an extra period. In the last five minutes a rejuvenated varsity took the floor and showing real power for the first time that evening, scored nine points while holding the McGill basketekers to a lone foul.

On Jan. 9, the quintet travelled to Fordham to meet a powerful maroon five that was thirsting for revenge of its defeat the year before. For the first time in the season Hick Rubinstein started the game at the center berth with Raskin at forward.

A furious first half ended 12-11 in the College's favor, but the Ram was undaunted and led by Johnny White and Zakszewski gained a six point lead in the last three minutes that the Lavender could not overcome. The final bell sounded with the count at 29-33 and sent scores of chortling Fordham cahoots into a frenzy of glee. Raskin played the best brand of ball seen that evening with Mac Hodesblatt fighting with a mad grimness on the floor.

Franklin and Marshall was the Lavender's next antagonist and was speedily despatched with, to the tune of 31-24. The following week the team played host to Catholic U. who in the last few minutes overcame a four point lead, sent home three goals from the floor and romped off with 25-23 victory, the third defeat of the varsity and the second on the local field.

Lavender Wins Second Contest
The Ram invaded home territory on the thirteenth for a return engagement, confident and expectant of victory, only to be turned back by a desperate Lavender five that overcame a five point lead two minutes before the final gong broke a deadlock at 23 all with a long shot by a substitute, and staggered to the finish with a 26-23 victory that will ring down in history.

The following Wednesday the Convent Ave. quintet travelled to Manhattan College and in the poorest played game of this season, threw away all chances for the Metropolitan championship by a 44-27 defeat.

Ursinus and Union were met the following week-end and the College overcame the first 21-15, and romped off with a triumph over the second to the tune of 34-29.

The defeat at the hands of N. Y. U. last Saturday rang down the curtain of the 1925-1926 season, and terminated the career of Hodesblatt and Irv Goldberg as bearers of the Lavender in basketball. Starting late, and never once heading the Violet, the varsity dribblers fell before a superior height team by a 34-23 tally. It was the eleventh victory for the N. Y. U. hoopsters and fully avenged last year's defeat of 34-24.

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GREENSTEIN THIRD IN POLO SCORING

Places Second in Foul Goals Talled—Captain Goldberger Seventh

Nat Greenstein, whose flashy work was much in evidence last Friday in the Columbia contest, has clinched third place in the individual scoring with a total of seventy-eight points. Matalene, of Princeton, one of the best forwards in the game, leads the scoring with 247 points and Lutz, of Yale, is in second place.

In the number of field goals scored Greenstein takes second place with 19, while Matalene again takes first place with 24 goals. Greenstein is also tied with Supplee, of Penn, for number of thrown goals scored, falling but one behind Sutherland, of Penn; who has four goals to his credit.

Captain Emerin Goldberger has placed seventh in the scoring list with a total of thirty-five points, consisting of seven touch goals. Mintz, playing forward on the varsity sextet has clinched ninth place with twenty-eight markers, made by three touch, one thrown and ten field goals. Halpern appears in the scoring column with but one touch goal.

By virtue of its recent triumph over the Columbia mermen, the Lavender water polo team has clinched third place, in the final league standing, the highest ever attained with the exception of second place won by the 1922 aggregation. Last Saturday night Yale broke the tie with Princeton in the league and now remains the undisputed leader in first place.
