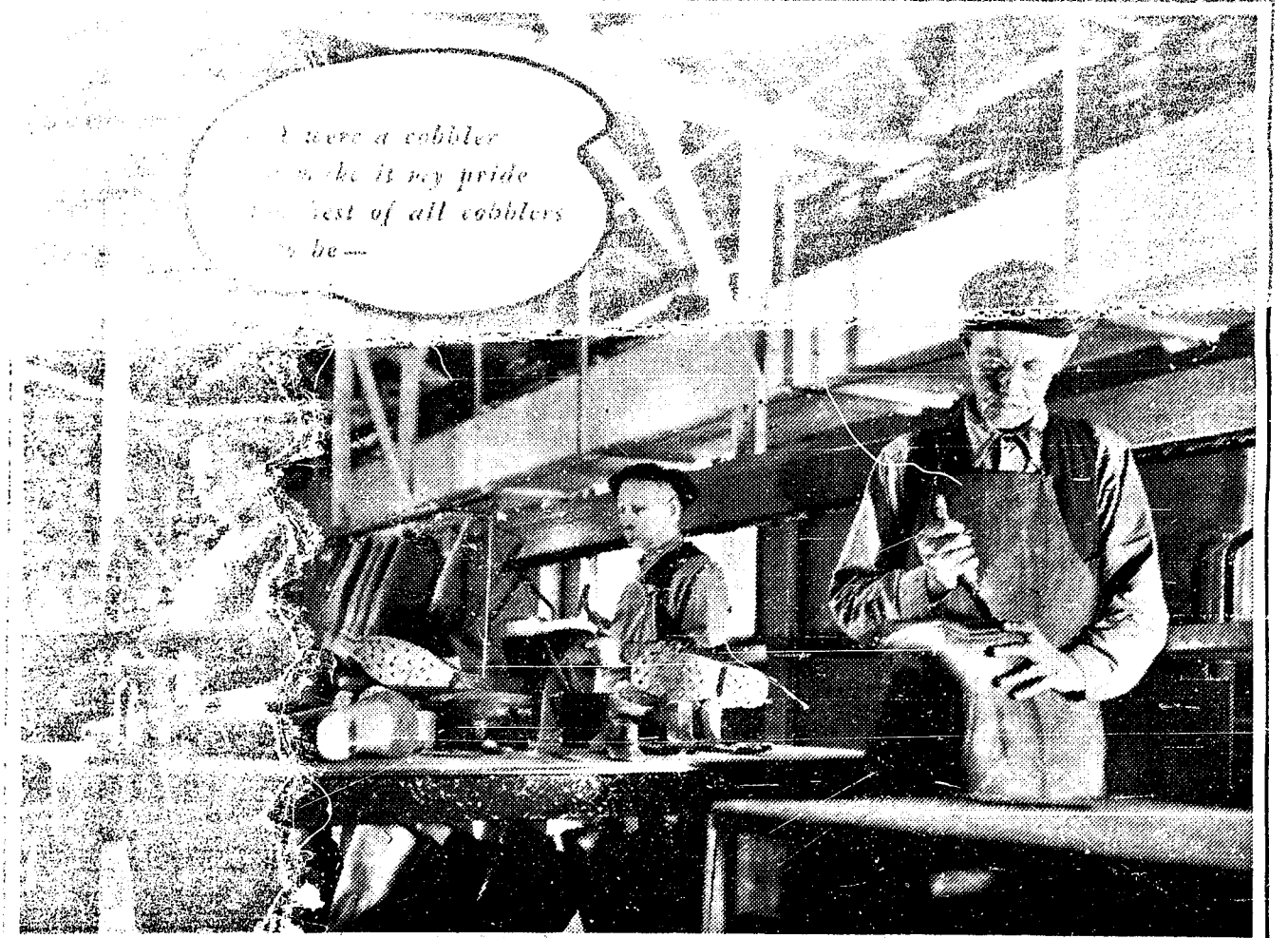

Tech-Physics Reading Room Established

Present library facilities at the College have been enlarged and improved with the removal of the Catalogue and Order Divisions of the library from the Main Building to new quarters in the Reference Building and creation of the new Tech-Physics Reading Room, Professor Francis L. D. Goodrich, Librarian, announced yesterday.

The Tech-Physics Reading Room combines the facilities of the former Tech and Physics collections which were located in the Main Building but which have been moved to the new location in the bottom level of the new THH wing.

Tables and chairs will be added to increase the seating capacity of the Reading Room to one hundred and thirty, according to John O'Farrell, Assistant Librarian. Steel racks for more books are also expected.

Physics students now have a large number of trade catalogues for reference work, Mr. O'Farrell added. All Tech periodicals and all Physics books in circulation have also been added to the new division of the library.
