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Two referenda will be on the ballots in tomorrow's Student Council elections. The first concerns a constitutional amendment to change the meeting time for Council sessions. The second brings the question of the newly adopted $\$ 1.00$ athletic fee before the student body.
Heferendum number one states: Resolved that Student Council Resolved, Counci shall meet on Wednesdays at 4 . The voter may answer yes or no.)
This was placed on the ballot as a result of petitioning carried on by Hillel. The organization received the signatures of more than the $10 \%$ of the student body which yas necessary in order to have the question on the ballot. Referendum number two reads 1-Do you favor paying a $\$ 1.00$ fee for the support of athletics? 2-Do you favor paying a $\$ 1.00$ fee for the support of inter-collegiate athletics with the understanding that this fee shall entitle the student to free admission or discounts to all athletic contests? 3-If there is such a fee; do you think that it should be part of a-the student Activities Fee or a separate athletic fee, both of which must be submitted to student referendum? or part of b-The General Fee, which is n.t bound by student referendum? A. "yes" or "no" answer is to be supplied for each of the four points.

The elections will see 80 students competing for 44 positions. Ballots for the election will be distributed in 200 classrooms tomorrow at 11. by the Alpha Phi Omega group. Voting will also take place in the cafeteria, Lincoln Corridor and Army Hall until three in the afternoon
The. "Student Council Election" Stub of the Student Activities card must be attached to all ballots, in order to make them valid. The most hotly contested post in the elections will be for SC president. Lenny Lederman '53, Gary Schlessinger '54 and Ray Hamilton '54, who withdrew from the presidential race last week, are "wholehcartedly" supporting Joseph Clancy ' 53 independent candidate for the posi, as the "best qualified for the post."
Student Council observers assert that their withdrawals were made to "prevent powerful leftistdominated control of Student Council." Lisle Greenidge '53, Clancy's opponent, running for president on the Students for Academic Freedom slate, called their move an "attempt to band against me by Tammany Hall chicanery.
The race for SC president is further complicated by a vigorous write-in campaign being conducted by Dave Silver ' 53 who withdrew his candidacy for SC Veep last Thursday
His withdrawal in turn, leaves Manny Halper ' 54 unopposed for the vice president position.
