Three In Race For SC Presidency; Students To Vote On Two Referenda

Two referenda will be on the ballots in tomorrow's Student Council elections. The first concerns a constitutional amendment to change the meeting time for Council sessions. The second brings the question of the newly adopted \$1.00 athletic fee before the student body.

Referendum number one states: Resolved, that Student Council shall meet on Wednesdays at 4. (The voter may answer yes or no.)

This was placed on the ballot as a result of petitioning carried on by Hillel. The organization received the signatures of more than the 10% of the student body which was necessary in order to have the question on the ballot. This referendum was called for because an orthodox Jew cannot, by the tenets of his creed, participate in Council activities on Friday night.

Referendum number two reads: 1—Do you favor paying a \$1.00 fee for the support of athletics?

2—Do you favor paying a \$1.00 fee for the support of inter-collegiate athletics with the understanding that this fee shall entitle the student to free admission or discounts to all athletic contests?

3—If there is such a fee, do you think that it should be part of a—the student Activities Fee or a separate athletic fee, both of which must be submitted to student referendum? or part of b—The General Fee, which is not bound by student referendum?

A "yes" or "no" answer is to be supplied for each of the four points.

Meeting of Seniors Today in Great Hall

All seniors are requested to attend an important Class of '52 meeting, to be held today at 11 in Great Hall. Professor John S. Peck (Civil Engineering), Chief Marshal, will speak about the commencement ceremonies. Notices have been sent to all instructors requesting them to excuse seniors at that hour.

Today is the deadline for payment for social affairs, and for cap-and-gown rentals. Seniors may pay either six dollars for the "package" which consists of the Numeral Lights Dance (Thursday, June 12), the Farewell Ball (Saturday, June 14), featuring Art Mooney's Band, and the cap-and-gown rental; or \$2.50 for the cap-and-gown rental alone. Money is being collected at the Senior Office, 109 Army Hall.

I agree with the "Platforms" of the other candidates; but I have read the same promises before every student election, yet little is ever accomplished. Everyone is in favor of low fees, academic freedom, better course critiques, higher budget appropriations, better student government... etc. Among the platforms of the various candidates there is little conflict. Therefore, I think it is quite deceptive of a candidate to utter these admirable promises as if his opponents were opposed to them. The real issue is who will really accomplish these ends which all agree are desirable.

The most valid gauge of what the candidates will do is what they have done: their ability, service, and training in student government—not their abilities and train-

Last week three candidates withdrew from the elections and issued a statement supporting Clancy in which they claimed him to be "uniquely qualified."

Actually, these three, who have frequently expressed the idea that they alone are the most qualified, have, in a manner reminiscent of Tammany Hall, joined together in an ignoble alliance against me and my program of academic freedom. After two days of political wrangling, during which time each of them tried to get the nomination for himself, they finally picked a dark horse candidate.

This candidate has not been connected with C.C.N.Y. student government for three years; he favors the fee increase and opposes Robeson's appearance in the Great Hall. Unlike Clancy, I have throughout

My name is not on the ballot. In order to vote for me you will have to write-in my name under SC President.

The reason for this, as you may know, is that I felt that due to the withdrawal of three candidates last Monday the voter was not receiving an adequate choice in the Presidency.

Although I made my intentions known too late to be on the ballot, my program is not hastily thought out. Such points as restoration of the Presidential Forum, where the President and a Dean met with interested students weekly to discuss school problems are not only possible but probable.

Marked by last minute withdrawals and write in campaigns, the Student and Class Council elections will take place tomorrow morning at 11.

The elections will see 80 students competing for 44 positions.

Ballots for the election will be distributed in 200 classrooms tomorrow at 11 by the Alpha Phi Omega group. Voting will also take place in the cafeteria, Lincoln Corridor and Army Hall until three in the afternoon.

The "Student Council Election" Stub of the Student Activities card must be attached to all ballots, in order to make them valid.

The most hotly contested post in the elections will be for SC president. Lenny Lederman '53, Gary Schlessinger '54 and Ray Hamilton '54, who withdrew from the presidential race last week, are "wholeheartedly" supporting Joseph Clancy '53 independent candidate for the post, as the "best qualified for the post."

Student Council observers assert that their withdrawals were made to "prevent powerful leftist-dominated control of Student Council." Lisle Greenidge '53, Clancy's opponent, running for president on the Students for Academic Freedom slate, called their move an "attempt to band against me by Tammany Hall chicanery."

The race for SC president is further complicated by a vigorous write-in campaign being conducted by Dave Silver '53 who withdrew his candidacy for SC Veep last Thursday.

His withdrawal in turn, leaves Manny Halper '54 unopposed for the vice president position.

A three way race for secretary is being waged by Horace Manner '53, Norma Schliessel '54, (SAF) and Hank Stern '54 (Service Slate).

Jerome Koenig '54 (S) is competing with Jerry Kramer '53 for the position of SC treasurer.

District Attorney Frank Hogan yesterday appointed an Assistant District Attorney of the Indictment Division to fully investigate any possible bribery of policemen in relation to the sale of ice cream on the College campus.

In a statement to this newspaper, District Attorney Hogan said that he fully agreed that this small case of corruption is as bad as any case of wholesale corruption. "We will not stand for any penny-ante larceny just as we will not stand for grand larceny," Mr. Hogan said.

Assistant District Attorney Carl Rubino, who will investigate and report in this case, said that the only way to halt all types of corruption is to "nip it in the bud." Mr. Rubino promised an early report and quick action after all witnesses are questioned.

Now, no longer holding down a regular job after school hours, JOSEPH CLANCY is ready to once again devote his boundless energies to Council affairs. He must be given the opportunity.

Before CLANCY had to take on a full-time after-school job, his tireless work on Council was a source of unending amazement to the Council members. It brought their deepest respect. So strong was the devotion with which CLANCY served Council, that once after having broken his leg as a result of a football game he made his way around the College on crutches carrying out his Student Council activities. Such a man must be elected to the position of Council president.

In his work with the National Student Association and with SC, JOSEPH CLANCY has demonstrated the qualities of maturity, intelligence and leadership which cannot help but restore Council to its former position of dignity and usefulness to the student body. Student Council has had a great deal of criticism directed at it this semester. The cause of much of this rests with the Council members. A great deal of the blame, however, also rests with the President, whose job it is to direct the members' energies toward constructive activities. Because we are sure that he will fulfill the duties of the office in the best possible way, we wholeheartedly endorse JOSEPH CLANCY for Student Council President.

In all fairness to Lisle Greenidge, it must be said that we do not question the basic sincerity of his beliefs. However, we strongly question the sincerity of those who motivate him to those beliefs, namely, the members of Young Progressives of America.

MANNY HALPER is unopposed for the Student Council Vice-Presidency. We are sure that he will do as good a job in this office as he has done as Chairman of SC's School Affairs Committee.

The first, if approved, will change the meeting day of Student Council from Friday to Wednesday. The second deals with the recently-imposed one dollar increase in the General Fee.

This newspaper has already expressed its belief that a change in the Student Council meeting date would go far towards eliminating much of the time-wasting now so prevalent at the Friday night get-togethers. There is, however, a much more basic argument and one which cannot be ignored. It is utterly unfair to prevent certain students from being members of Student Council because their religious beliefs do not permit them to be present at Council meetings. We urge all students to vote to change the SC meeting day.

The fee referendum is divided into three parts. The Campus favors the payment of a one dollar fee to support intercollegiate athletics. We do not, however, believe that free admissions to all sports for students are at present feasible if the athletic program at the College is to be financially sound. We feel that whether this fee is to be part of the Student Activities or General Fee is irrelevant.

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Beavers Win Again, Beat NYU, 6-2

Neuberger, Nacinovich Excel; 'Nine' Meets Redmen Today

The College's baseball team combined the five-hit hurling of Warren Neuberger and the long-ball belting of Paul Nacinovich to defeat NYU, 6 to 2, yesterday for its fifth Metropolitan Conference win. The team's over-all record is 9 and 10.

The game was originally scheduled for Macombs Dam Park last Monday, but was rained out and played at the Violets' Ohio Field. The Beavers acted as home team.

The Violets took a quick 1-to-0 lead in the first inning, but the Lavender tied the score in its half on three walks sandwiched around a single by Julie Glassman. The Beavers forged ahead in the second as Nacinovich homered, Neuberger walked, Dick Dickstein doubled him to third, and Ted Solomon hit a scoring fly.

Another run was added in the third when Nacinovich rammed a single to right-center to score Jerry Cohen from second.

Nacinovich belted Violet starter Vinnie Lupica for a two-run homer in the fifth, Paul's second round-tripper of the game.

Neuberger, who fanned ten and walked only three while registering his second victory of the year, had a two-hitter until the seventh, when the Violets scored their final run.

Today, the Beavers play their final Conference game, meeting St. John's at Dexter Park. The Redmen, as of yesterday, were tied with Manhattan for the league leadership. Each team has won seven and lost two. A victory would put the Beavers in a tie for third place with NYU, which has now ended its Conference schedule.
