Two referenda will be on the ballots in tomorrow's Student Council elections. The first concerns a constitutional amendment to change the meeting time for Council sessions. The second brings the question of the newly adopted \$1.00 athletic fee before the stu-

Referendum number one states Resolved, that Student Council shall meet on Wednesdays at 4. (The voter may answer yes or

Marked by last minute withdrawals and write in campaigns, the Student and Class Council elections will take place tomorrow morning at 11.

The elections will see 80 students competing for 44 positions. Ballots for the election will be distributed in 200 classrooms tomorrow at 11 by the Alpha Phi Omega group. Voting will also take place in the cafeteria, Lincoln Corridor and Army Hall until three in the afternoon.

The "Student Council Election" Stub of the Student Activities card must be attached to all ballots, in order to make them valid,

The most hotly contested post in the elections will be for SC president. Lenny Lederman '53, Gary Schlessinger '54 and Ray Hamilton '54, who withdrew from the presidential race last week, are "wholeheartedly" supporting Joseph Clancy '53 independent candidate for the post, as the "best qualified for the post."

Student Council observers assert that their withdrawals were made to "prevent powerful leftistdominated control of Student Council." Lisle Greenidge '53, Clancy's opponent, running for president on the Students for Academic Freedom slate, called their move an "attempt to band against me by Tammany Hall chicanery."



The first, if approved, will change the meeting day of Student Council from Friday to Wednesday. The second deals with the recently-imposed one dollar increase in the General Fee.

This newspaper has already expressed its belief that a change in the Student Council meeting date would go far towards eliminating much of the time-wasting now so prevalent at the Friday night get-togethers. There is, however, a much more basic argument and one which cannot be ignored. It is utterly unfair to prevent certain students from being members of Student Council because their religious beliefs do not permit them to be present at Council meetings. We urge all students to vote to change the SC meeting day.

The fee referendum is divided into three parts. The Campus favors the payment of a one dollar fee to support intercollegiate athletics. We do not, however, believe that free admissions to all sports for students are at present feasible if the athletic program at the College is to be financially sound. We feel that whether this fee is to be part of the Student Activities or General Fee is irrelevant.

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
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
