AN EDITORIAL

Vote Part A

The Observation Post is smug and confident today. It thinks it has, by blatantly turning its pages into a propaganda sheet, killed a single daily newspaper at City College. The student body must prove OP wrong when it votes tomorrow.

Forty-nine colleges and universities in the United States have single daily papers: Columbia, NYU, Harvard, Yale, Princeton. City College, with the largest undergraduate body in the country—it is the third largest school—definitely needs and deserves one daily newspaper also.

OP has been misused by persons who think that there will not be enough editorships on a new paper. Last week OP slurred and attempted to degrade those persons who favor the daily; today it is trying to distort the issue by screaming "freedom of the press."

The Campus has presented the reasons for one single daily in previous issues: less money, a much better quality paper, much more coverage for all clubs and organizations. We will not stoop to OP's level to squander the entire paper—the student's money—for purely propaganda purposes.

Election Campaigning Ends Tonight; Students to Vote on Five Referenda

Daily Paper, Trip to Russia on SC Ballot

Five referenda dealing with the daily newspaper, a student trip to Russia and the tenure of major Student Council officers will appear on the election ballot tomorrow.

The first referendum asks the students to indicate whether they believe daily newspaper coverage is desirable.

The second referendum pertains to whether daily coverage is to be affected if the student body thinks it is desirable. Students will be asked to favor one single daily newspaper or the continuation of The Campus and the Observation Post on alternate days.

The Campus and OP have split on the single daily issue. Campus has proposed one paper appearing daily while OP favors the two newspapers publishing on alternate days.

Referenda (3) and (4) deal with the plan proposed by Swarthmore College to send College students to Russia. The third referendum asks if the student body is in favor of such a tour and the fourth referendum concerns the financial arrangements. The student body will be asked if it is willing to finance such a tour and how much it is willing to contribute.

Halper, Klosk, Lotter Compete For President

Student Council presidential aspirants Manny Halper '54, Ira Klosk '55 and Phil Lotter '54 as well as seventy-three other candidates running for class council posts will wind up their election campaigns today and await the decision of the student body as it goes to the polls tomorrow.

Ballots will be distributed during the 11 o'clock class tomorrow by the Alpha Phi Omega fraternity. In order to vote students must attach the stub marked "Student Council Election" from their activities card to the ballot. A voting booth will be set up opposite Knittle Lounge from 11 to 3.

The race for major SC offices has been overshadowed by the debate over the student referendum calling for one single daily which also appears on the ballot.

All three presidential contenders have stated that they are against the "one single daily" plan and believe that their personal qualifications are the major issue. Halper feels that he is the most "experienced," Klosk claims he is the most "intelligent" and Lotter says he is the most "mature."

A three-way race for vice-president features Art Pittman '56, Philip Stutzel '56 and Arnold... (Continued on Page 4)

Halper for President

MANNY HALPER is the most qualified candidate for job of Student Council president.

As president of the Class of '54, as chairman of numerous SC committees and as vice-president of Student Council, Halper has shown that he is a hard, capable worker, that he has ability and ideas and, most important, that he has the qualities of leadership absolutely necessary in the president of Student Council.

Halper's only drawback is that his aggressiveness sometimes antagonizes people. However, if he is elected along with good Council he would make student government at the college mean something to every student; he would make SC vibrant, respected body.

Weingold for Vice-President

ARNOLD WEINGOLD is the best choice for vice-presidency. He is a mature person who thinks before he talks and can work with people. He is a senior and does not consider the vice-presidency as merely a stepping stone to the presidency; he realizes that the vice-presidency is often a thankless and difficult job, requiring much work.

Art Pittman has much drive and has leadership ability, he considers Student Council a game. If elected he would probably spend more time campaigning for the presidency in fulfilling his obligations as vice-president; this position requires long hours and conscientious work.

Phil Stutzel, the third candidate, is not at all qualified for SC vice-president.

The vice-president must coordinate all SC committees and must work closely with the president. Weingold has the ability to accomplish the first point and the maturity to fulfill the second.

Bernstein for Secretary

ABRAM BERNSTEIN is the better candidate for secretary. As an SC rep and as vice-president of Hillel he has shown himself to be a clear thinker and a competent individual.

He was one of the leaders in the successful attempt, a few terms ago, to have Council meetings changed from Friday to Wednesday evenings.

Martin Gruberg, his opponent, has worked hard on Council, but is not yet mature enough to serve as an executive officer. He is now a lower sophomore and could some day be a leader on Council if he learns to think and listen a little more and to talk a lot less.

Bernstein has served in positions of responsibility and has shown that he is willing to work.

Loewenstein for Treasurer

HOWARD LOEWENSTEIN is the better candidate for treasurer. He has had much more experience for this position than his opponent, Susan Fuld.

The treasurer of SC is responsible for the allocation of student fees—over \$10,000—to student organizations. (or she) must be an individual thoroughly acquainted with the need of every student group. Howard Loewenstein, in two years of experience on the Student Faculty Fee Committee, realizes the problems of these organizations.

Further, he will not be pressured into making appropriations he does not believe just, no matter if the interested party is a club president or the editor of a newspaper.

Pollak for Senior President

HARRY POLLAK has done an excellent job as senior president this term. The Class of '54 is one of the most active or classes in many years. And for the first time in two years there will be a senior prom. His opponent has in no way shown himself qualified for this high position.

Pollak should be returned to office with a strong vote of confidence.
