Discontinue HP After Opening Manhattanville

House Plan will be discontinued upon completion of the Student Center in Manhattanville at the end of this year, announced Pres. Buell G. Gallagher yesterday.

The College's Centennial Fund, which has been subsidizing HP, will now be used to meet the costs of running the Student Center by providing the money for equipment, decorations and furnishings.

The new Center, to be located in the Academy Building, will house all of the College's 200 clubs and organizations in its 40 rooms.

"Since there will be a shortage of meeting rooms," President Gallagher said, "it will be necessary for several organizations to share one room, unless a more satisfactory plan can be found."

He called for suggestions from the students for solutions to the problem since he would like the student body to have a voice in operating the Center.

Choose Nine Seniors For Phi Beta Kappa

The Committee on Admissions to Phi Beta Kappa announced that nine students have been elected to the College chapter.

Four of the nine students are physics majors. The others major in the fields of economics, psychology, music, social studies, and pre-med.

Elected to Phi Beta Kappa from the Senior Class were Philip Baumel, Allen Isaacson and Jack Schwartz—Physics; Charles F. Hummel—Social Studies; George C. Rosenwald—Psychology; and Stuart Rubenstein—Pre-Med.

Harold E. Adelson—Physics; Harry H. Birkenruth—Economics; Gerhart Reichlin—Music, were elected from the graduating class of Feb. 1953.

Plan to Change Speaker Ruling

A recommendation to rescind the rule requiring controversial speakers in the Great Hall to appear in a forum type program will be made at a meeting of the Student-Faculty Committee on Student Affairs later this month.

A committee of past and present SFCSA members and College officials interested in the issue decided to make the recommendation after meeting last week.

Prof. Kenneth B. Clark (Psychology), Chairman of the SFCSA, stated that his group had "found that the so-called forum rule caused more difficulties than it solved. We need something that is more appropriate and effective, but at the same time just and fair to all parties."

Until a new regulation is drawn up, speakers will be approved according to "the best interests of the College," as stated in the present regulation.

Austin Not Permitted To Speak Tomorrow

Richard Austin, one of the two suspended members of the registrar's staff, has been denied permission to speak at a forum tomorrow by Pres. Buell G. Gallagher.

After stating that the president is relying on a technicality to deny him the permission, Mr. Austin yesterday sent a special delivery letter to Dr. Ordway Tead, chairman of the Board of Higher Education, asking him to intercede.

Appeals Ruling

Section 903 of the New York City Charter, under which Mr. Austin and Mr. Hyman Gold were suspended, will be discussed at this forum in the Townsend Harris Auditorium at 3.

President Gallagher explained that a ruling by the Administrative Council of the BHE, made in 1950, barred suspended teachers from addressing college groups.

'They're Afraid'

Mr. Austin, in reply to the ruling said, "It is a means of hiding a person's innocence so that he can be proven guilty. They're afraid of what I have to say."

At tomorrow's forum, President Gallagher, Prof. Hubert Park Beck (Education) and Prof. Samuel Hendel (Government) will discuss the question—"Should Section 903 of the New York City Charter be revised?"

On next Monday night both Austin and Gold will appear before the BHE where their suspensions will be discussed. President Gallagher, however, has expressed the opinion that the two will be dismissed. The only evidence which could change the decision is if Austin and Gold denied invoking the Fifth Amendment, which is highly improbable, the president explained.

Attacks Wright

In discussing the case, Mr. Austin said, "There is a definite tie-up between the practices followed in the past 10 years and our suspensions. Under President Wright's administration academic freedom was stifled, primarily as an aftermath of the Rapp-Coudert hearings (at which thirty College teachers were dismissed for Communist affiliations). Students are afraid to express themselves or to join organizations," he continued.

"I honestly believe that it is a mistake to give the title of President Emeritus to Dr. Wright even though he appears to be a very genial and amiable person. It is by the principles that a man stands by, and by the administrative methods employed, that a person should be judged," Austin concluded.

The seder service will be student-led and most of the prayers will be in English. President Gallagher has been invited to attend. Reservations are limited to one hundred people, and must be made in advance at the Hillel office. The charge is 35c for members and 55c for non-members.

In estimating the effect of next September's shift to the Manhattanville campus, Rabbi Zuckerman, Hillel adviser, said that he did not think that the ten block trek from the Manhattanville campus to Hillel House would deter any of its members. Rabbi Zuckerman said, "People looking for our cultural and intellectual activities will come anyway."

Silver, Cohen Speak Today

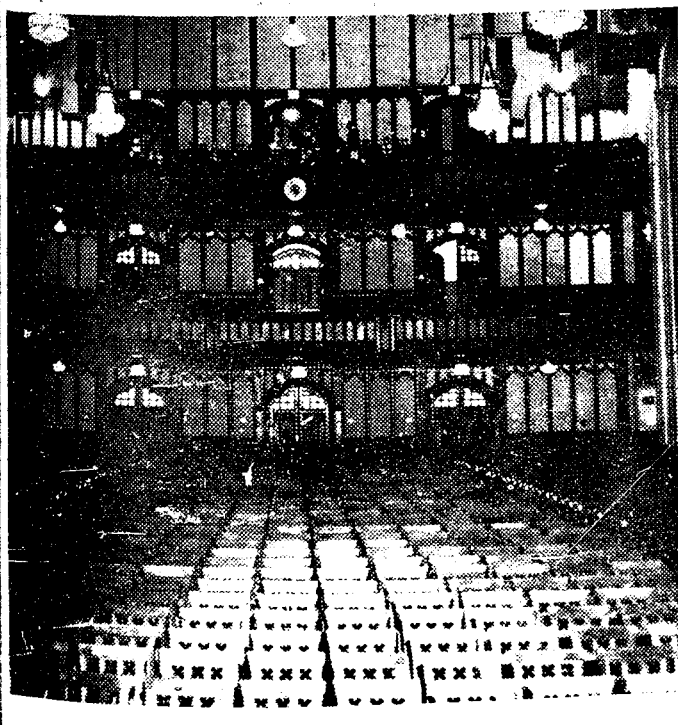

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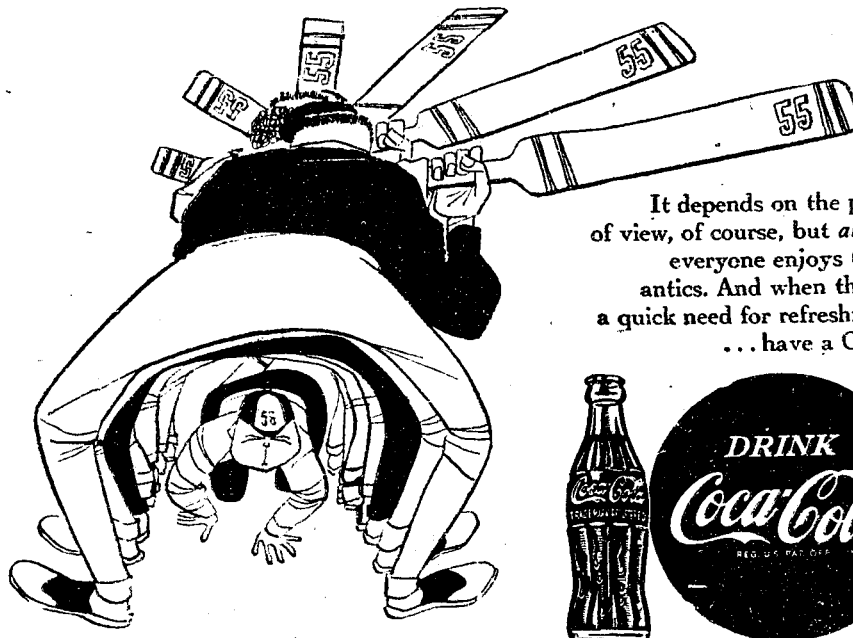


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Campus capers call for Coke



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Performance of Domershick Is Highlight of Hoop Season

Coach Dave Polansky was well pleased with the basketball team's overall performance this season. "Generally speaking we did well," Polansky stated. The Beavers compiled a record of ten and six.

Much of the credit due the team must go to Jerry Domershick, who led the team in scoring and did most of the playmaking. Domershick set a record for seasonal scoring average. His average was 17.7, eclipsing Ed Roman's mark of 17.5, set in 1950.

One of the most valuable players was Merv Shorr, the top rebounder and third high scorer. Shorr set a single game record for rebounds, securing 28 against Brooklyn.

Three players brought up from the Commerce team, Jack Chudnoff, Artie Dlott and Buss, contributed highly to the Beavers' success. Buss proved himself a potent scorer, compiling the highest per game average by a Lavender

for a .401 mark. Dlott, the hulking 6'5" senior, helped with the rebounding, grabbing 117 off the boards.

Polansky named as his all-opponent five Carson Lovett of Franklin and Marshall; Jim Grant, Adelphi; Andy McGowan, Manhattan; Ed Conlin, Fordham; and Dick Duckett, St. John's.

Howie Sets 2 Records; Beavers Third in Mets

Sparked by two record-shattering performances by Howie Schloemer, the College's swimming team splashed its way to a third-place finish in the Metropolitan Championships held last Friday night at the NYU Memorial Pool. The Violets scored 76 points to win the meet and a surprising Kings Point squad tallied 52 to wind up second. The Beavers had 47 points.

Schloemer, the Lavender's red-headed freestylist, took the 220- and 440-yard events in the respective record times of 2:18.8 and 5:03.5. He beat two of the city's outstanding swimmers, NYU's Bob Cromey and Brooklyn's Jerry Tierman, in each instance. Last Wednesday, in the Met prelims, Howie set the original marks of 2:19 and 5:03.8.

Coach Jack Rider expressed general satisfaction over his team's all-round performance. "We did pretty well in the Mets," the coach commented, "although we could just as easily have taken second place."

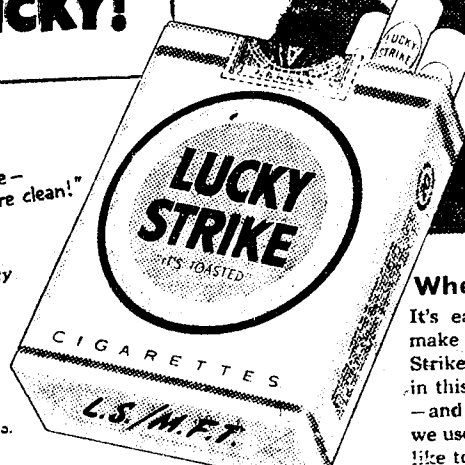

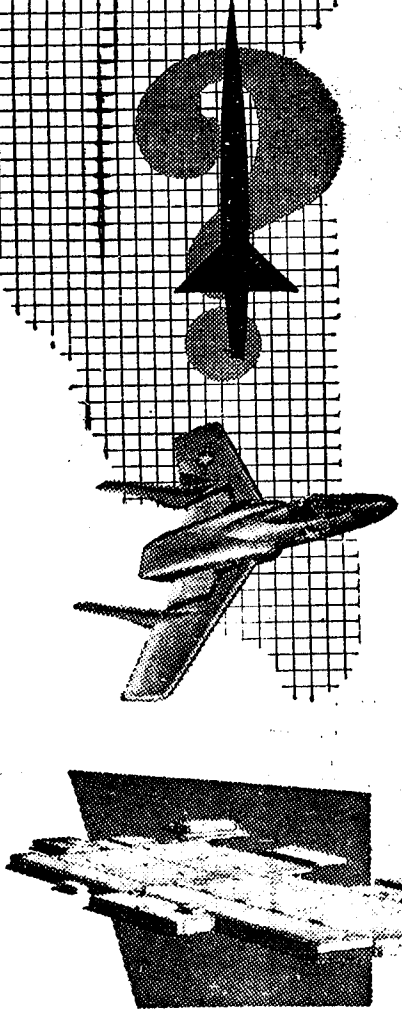
