After Opening Manhattanville

House Plan will be discontinued upon completion of the Student Center in Manhattanville at the end of this year, announced Pres. Buell G. Gallagher yesterday.

The College's Centennial Fund, which has been subsidizing HP, will now be used to meet the costs of running the Student Center by providing the money for equipent, decorations and farnishings. The new Center, to be located the Academy Building, will house all of the College's 200 clubs and organizations in its 40 rooms. "Since there will be a shortage meeting rooms," President Gallagher said, "it will be necessary for several organizations to share one room, unless a more satisfactory plan can be found." He called for suggestions from the students for solutions to the problem since he would like the student body to have a voice in operating the Cen-


