SC Elections Begin Tomorrow at Eleven; College Students to Vote on Two Referenda

Membership Lists, Makeup of Exec. On Referenda

Referenda on compulsory membership lists and the election of Student Government Secretary and Treasurer will be put to the student body tomorrow.

The membership list question, as it appears on the SG ballot, is: "Are you in favor of the ruling requiring full membership lists from all organizations on campus?"

Passed last November by the Student-Faculty Committee on Student Affairs, the ruling has since been a source of controversy at the College.

On April 21, the General Faculty Committee on Student Affairs denied an appeal made by three political clubs that the ruling be abolished.

Also on the ballot will be a referendum originally proposed by SG president Martin Gruberg '55. It is in the form of an amendment to the SC constitution.

The proposal requires that SG Secretary and Treasurer be elected by an absolute majority vote of the Student Council and that they serve for periods of "good conduct" being removable by a two-thirds vote of the member-

If the proposal is accepted, SG's executive committee will consist of president and three associate vice-presidents elected by the student body, and three representatives-at-large elected from and by the Student Council. This would go into effect next semester.

Kingsley, Schwartz Run For Prexy; Trio Seek VP

Gloria Kingsley '57, Student Government secretary, opposes Stuart Schwartz '56, former House Plan president, for the position of SG president in the main contest of tomorrow's Student Government elections.

The positions of SG vice-president, secretary and treasurer, class officers and Student Council reps from each of the four classes will also be filled in Fridays balloting.

A three-way race shapes up for SG vice-president involving Jerry Karp '57, former Council rep and past chairman of the SG Finance Committee, Joel Resnick, '56 treasurer and House Plan veep, and Barry Weinberg '57.

Fred Boretz '56, former Council treasurer, opposes Bill Brown '57, SC rep, for that position. Iris Goldstein, SC rep and former secretary of the class of '56, is running unopposed for the office of SG secretary.

The post of senior president is uncontested—Dave Pfeffer being the only candidate. Bob Kahan vies with Howard Sherman for the office of senior veep, and Murton Brown and Larry Warick are the candidates for class of '55 secretary. Marilyn Blumberg and Al Zirkes are running for the position of treasurer.

The candidates for the four major '57 offices are unopposed. They are Sheldon Scherr for president, Donald Holzager for veep, Pearl Anderman for secretary and Robert Stanfield for treasurer.

Herb Goldberg and Shephen Stone are the candidates for the sophomore class presidency. Norma Bresnick, Marcel Brysk and Al Sarnotsky compete in a

Council Outlines Makeup Of SU Board of Managers

Student Council last night passed a by-law setting up the makeup of the Student Union Board of Managers in accord with the system suggested by the SU Board of Directors.

Under the by-law, which was introduced by Stuart Schwartz '56, the Managing Board will con-

sist of a director, assistant director, the chairmen of the Student Government Social Functions Agency, Facilities Agency and Club Coordinating Agency, and four other students, not more than three of whom may be members of Student Council.

Iris Goldstein '56 was elected vice-president of the Student Government by acclamation. Bob Shore '55 was named to take her vacant seat on the SC Executive Committee.

All-College Prom

A report by Sid Lawrence '56 and Helen Benson '58 stated that the Baruch School is planning to hold its All-College Prom during intersession, and asked that the College agree to hold its affair at the same time in order to obtain the Waldorf ballroom at a cheaper rate.

A request that the prom be held off until the spring term was made a week ago and was referred to the Service Committee. Action was deferred last night since the report was not yet available.

Another innovation is a variety show featuring minstrels, folk-singing and skits which have been planned for the three-hour journey upstream. A dance band has been hired, too.



Kingsley for President

In tomorrow's election, there is only one candidate really qualified to serve as Student Council president. In her time on SC, GLORIA KINGSLEY has proven beyond any doubt that she has the knowledge, the ability and the capability which are absolutely necessary to fill the presidency as it should be filled.

GLORIA KINGSLEY envisions council as a body representative of the entire student body. Under her leadership, as under no other, SC can finally achieve the position of respect and leadership in the College community undertaken a year ago by Ira Klosk. She is not concerned with any one aspect of the work of SC but, rather, with making it a functioning body in all areas, the social as well as the legislative, the intellectual as well as the governmental.

Personally, through her activities as vice-chairman of the Metropolitan Region of the National Student Association and as College director of the World University Service drive, she has gained the respect of college leaders all over the country. She will add her personal prestige, if elected, to that of her College. CAMPUS has no hesitation whatsoever in giving its wholehearted endorsement to GLORIA KINGSLEY for SC president.

Resnick for Veep

Of the three candidates for the SC vice-presidency, only one has proven that he has the ability to handle the job. JOEL RESNICK is our choice for veep.

Though we have not always agreed with his views, we believe that JOEL RESNICK has a clear margin over his opponents for the position. Of the three, he alone has devoted time to working with SC during the past year. He alone has an understanding of the comprehensive administrative program begun this term under Martin Gruberg. Moreover, RESNICK will never allow his personal views on non-student government affairs to interfere with the faithful and capable fulfillment of his duties in the best interests of the College.

Goldstein for Secretary

In the past semester, IRIS GOLDSTEIN has achieved for herself a reputation for integrity and thoroughness in her work on Student Council.

Although she is running unopposed, we feel that we can take this opportunity to voice our support for her. Never afraid to defend a minority viewpoint in which she believed, IRIS GOLDSTEIN will continue the change which has seen the position of secretary go from a clerking job to a responsible policy-making position.

Boretz for Treasurer

On the basis of superior experience and a more thorough knowledge of what the job requires than his opponent possesses, we endorse FRED BORETZ for the position of SC treasurer.

BORETZ, who held the treasurer's job before entering the army, is thoroughly acquainted with the demands of handling the Council's treasury. He is well qualified to continue the policy of eliminating unnecessary red tape for fund-seeking organizations which was so well begun by this term's treasurer, Jared Jussim.

We are convinced that the College's student organizations can be best served by

the election of FRED BORETZ as SC treasurer.

NO on Membership Lists

We urge the student body to vote NO on the membership lists referendum which appears on tomorrow's ballot.

The referendum asks "Are you in favor of the rule requiring full membership lists from all organizations on campus?" This is a poll of student opinion, nothing more, nothing less. It has no binding power on any of the committees which are responsible for the membership lists ruling. The real effectiveness of this referendum lies in the fact that it will give these committees, for the first time, a true index of how students feel about this ruling.

A major argument of those who favor membership lists has been that agitation against the lists has been carried on by "a small, vociferous group of political and religious organizations who do not represent the entire student body." The results of this vote will give the committees concerned a true indication of the wishes of the students.

Our arguments against membership lists are fourfold:

Such lists violate the student's right to privacy. They require him to divulge his political and religious beliefs.

They endanger his chances of getting a job after graduation and making such information available to employers. There is still no guarantee as to how these lists will be handled, and, although specific information is supposed to be kept secret, there is always the possibility of a leak.

Third, the existence of such lists makes an individual responsible for all the actions taken by his group even though he might strongly oppose some of them.

Fourth, these lists will stifle student activity. Three groups have already been dissolved on campus, allegedly because of the requirement that they fill out lists. When any student organization, oriented politically or otherwise, is frightened out of its existence by a rule, we call that rule bad.

What all this adds up to is a violation of the meaning of academic freedom: the right of any group in a college to meet and to discuss any subject freely and without fear of reprisal.

Vote NO on the membership lists referendum.

NO on SG Changes

Although the idea behind the referendum concerning the makeup of the Student Council Executive is basically sound, some of the provisions included in it are so dangerous as to make a NO vote on this proposal the only wise vote.

We fully endorse the idea of having purely administrative officers on SC elected by those who are most familiar with his qualifications. However, we cannot support a proposal which would permit a group of nineteen people (2/3 of the maximum SC membership) to determine the fate of the treasurer, the person most responsible for seeing that student organizations get sufficient funds to carry on their programs.

The proposed amendment would permit a situation in which a person of mediocre capabilities could retain his position as secretary or treasurer for as long as three years, even though there are others of greater ability, because enough votes could not be garnered to remove him from office.

We suggest, instead of the present proposal, that a referendum be voted on next term which would establish some definite term of office for the treasurer, making provision for the student body to affirm or reject his selection in each election during his term of office.

The Candidates Speak

Student Government is at once a belief and a hope. It is a belief that the individual human being can regulate his own affairs. It is a hope that the democratic ideals upon which this school is founded will continue to be fostered. It is a belief that students can only learn about the democratic processes through experiencing them.

In order to fulfill these beliefs the leadership of student government must work toward them consciously. Certainly the responsibilities which Student Government already has, should be carried out. Services such as proms and boatrides should be expanded.

However, the area in which Student Government can make its greatest contribution is in the area of curriculum development.

I will try to bring students, faculty and administration to the point where they realize the inherent importance of the philosophy involved in the Student Governing activity.

Stuart Schwartz

Some people think Student Government is a debating society. Others consider it an ideal through which it is hoped students will eventually govern their own affairs completely. I happen to see Student Government as an extra-curricular activity whose function it is to govern student affairs in cooperation with the faculty, for educational as well as governmental purposes.

My conception of Student Government means that I am less concerned with the ultimate goal of student self-government than some of the other candidates. When Student Government demonstrates that it is the accurate voice of the student body, and that it can provide services for students more efficiently, the added responsibility will come.

My only promise as candidate for the presidency of SC is that I will provide the leadership necessary for increased efficiency. I feel free to ask you to vote for me on this basis alone.

Jerry Karp

The Vice-president of the Student Government administers the committee-agency system and I intend to see it operating at maximum efficiency while I am in office. I intend, for instance, to put a motion before the Civil Liberties Committee recommending the abolition of compulsory membership lists.

As Vice-president, I will do my utmost to see that Student Union will be administered in a way that is most fair to all concerned.

Joel Resnick

For the past three years I have given a great deal of time and energy to this college—but I have gotten much more in return! In these years I have developed a sense of pride in CCNY, in its faculty and alumni.

I seek office to be better able to add my efforts to the task of building, here at City College, a good student government, a better student government, a better student activities program, and the best Student Center possible.

Barry Weinberg

By the time you receive your ballot tomorrow I hope you will have decided to vote for me, Barry Weinberg, for SC Vice-president.

If you will look at my qualifications and read my program you will understand why I can benefit the student body. Voting for me will give you, the students, a voice on Student Council and on SFCSA.

Remember Good Government is no mistake, it has to be planned.

A referendum is before you to abolish the position of Secretary. The term Secretary is really a misnomer. What is needed is not so much a clerical assistant but a policy maker. On the issue of allocations, I would like to use student allocations handled by students. I also plan to revise the fee application. There will be instruction sheets, which will facilitate the filling out of the forms.

The possibility of getting Fee Plan funds for a SG Leadership Training Encampment and for a Student Directory will be investigated. I also advocate a revision of the whole "agency" system to make it function more efficiently.

Runners Rip Adelphi, 94-46; Establish Five New Records

In a gala record-breaking afternoon during which two College records and three Lewisohn Stadium records were shattered, the Lavender track team rolled to its third consecutive dual meet victory yesterday by crushing Adelphi College of Garden City, Long Island, 94-46. Coach Harold Anson Bruce's squad took the track events, 51-26, and the field events, 43-20.

The two College records were set by Jack Kushner in the shot put and Joe Gold in the 440. Kushner's winning toss of 50 feet 1 inch, marked the fourth time this spring that he has set a new outdoor standard in his event. He also holds the indoor mark of 50 feet 2 inches.

Gold sped to a record shattering 0:50 victory over highly-rated John Terranova. His performance erased the old marks of 0:50.2 (College record) and 0:50.4 (Lewisohn Stadium record), both established by Don Spitzer in 1950.

The third Stadium mark to go by the boards was in the hammer throw. Adelphi's hefty Gordon McMillan threw the hammer a distance of 133 feet 8 inches, breaking the old record of 128 feet 6 inches, set in 1953.

Gold, Kushner, Werfel and Spencer were all double winners for the Beavers. Besides his record-smashing victory in the quarter-mile, Gold also beat Terranova in the 220. His time of twenty-two seconds was originally announced as a new Stadium mark, but upon rechecking the course it was found that the runners started from the wrong spot and the distance covered was only 215 yards.

In addition to his shot put triumph, Kushner also captured the discus throw. His heave of 117 feet 6 1/4 inches was an inch and three-quarter's better than that of Adelphi's Stan Kellner.

Werfel cleared the bar in the pole vault at eleven feet. Since he has just gotten over an injured knee, he did not seriously

attempt to go higher, not wishing to further aggravate the knee and possibly eliminate himself from the Collegiate Track Conference Championships on Saturday. Werfel also scored an easy victory in the javelin throw.

Spencer won the mile in 4:41 defeating Bill Humberg of Adelphi by twenty yards. He also beat Humberg in the half-mile run.
